Chair Wakai, Vice Chair Misalucha and Members of the Committee

The Hawai'i Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) **supports** SB2806 that appropriates funds to the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation for the Small Business Innovation Research Program.

HTDC supports initiatives aimed at promoting technology and innovation jobs. HTDC has been providing Phase I matching grants to SBIR awarded companies since 1989 and started awarding Phase II and Phase III matching grants in FY16. A summary of the Phase II/III awards made by the matching grant program is listed below:

A chart of the federal SBIR awarded to Hawai'i companies follows. Note: the difference between the federal SBIR dollars reported in the table above versus the federal SBIR dollars charted below are due to the lag between the calendar year that the Federal dollars are awarded versus the state fiscal year that the Hawai'i SBIR matching grant is awarded. The companies are



eligible to apply for Hawai'i State matching grants while the SBIR project is active, which is typically 18-24 months.

The data shows an upward trend in the amount of federal dollars the industry is awarded each year. The federal SBIR funds are highly competitive with a fixed budget each year. Therefore, the industry is securing for Hawai'i federal funds that would otherwise be awarded to companies in other states. Every year, there have been more qualified applicants than available funds. Since the Phase II/III program started in FY16, none of the applicants have received the full eligible amount. Over time, the program is anticipated to generate the same type of metrics of success as the Phase I matching program. For every dollar invested through the Hawaii SBIR program, Hawaii companies have attracted over 20 federal dollars in return to the State, plus commercialization funding.

HTDC is working with the University of Hawai'i Office of Innovation and Commercialization to continue growing the pipeline of companies pursuing SBIR funds and with several DoD and DoD related groups on developing further commercialization opportunities for Hawai'i companies developing new technologies. Due to budget shortfalls caused by the pandemic, HTDC did not receive an appropriation for FY21.

RELATING TO THE HAWAII TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill No. 2806 appropriates \$1,500,000 in general funds for FY 23 to the

Hawai'i Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) for the Hawai'i Small Business

Innovation Research (HSBIR) Program. B&F notes that the Governor's FY 23

Executive Supplemental Budget already includes an appropriation request of

\$1,000,000 in general funds for HTDC for Phase II and III grants for the HSBIR

Program.

B&F further notes that the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

 Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

Chair Wakai, Vice Chair Misalucha, and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i (UH) supports this bill that appropriates funds to support important innovation-related programs at the Hawai'i Technology Development Corporation (HTDC).

The University of Hawai'i shares a similar vision with HTDC to help establish a thriving innovation-based sector to boost the local economy, create jobs and to develop a highly skilled technical workforce. One of the key programs available to assist startups from UH and other locally based accelerators is HTDC's Hawai'i Small Business Innovation Research (HSBIR) Phase II program, which provides matching grant funding to support a small startup firm in its early efforts to develop and improve the technology that forms the basis of the business opportunity. These funds are often crucial to assist startups in developing their new technologies to the point that will allow them to tap venture capital firms for the necessary funding to become commercially successful.

In order to build a successful innovation ecosystem in Hawai'i, all parties involved must work and support each other in their endeavors. With programs such as HSBIR, continued or increased funding for HTDC is crucial to moving innovation and commercialization efforts forward in the state.

TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL NO. 2806, RELATING TO THE HAWAII TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION Position: Support

To the Honorable Glenn Wakai, Chair; the Honorable Bernadette Misalucha, Vice Chair; and Members of the Committee:

Our company is an Oahu-based small business developing new ways to recycle waste generated in Hawaii into sustainable aviation fuel, green hydrogen, and other beneficial products such as new building materials. In part thanks to the coaching and commercialization planning assistance from the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, we received our first-ever competitive Small Business innovation Research award a little over a year ago, and have now won our first-ever Phase II SBIR award. The matching funding provided by the State's HSBIR program were critical to be able to double our number of employees (all of whom are local) and cover the commercialization and patent protection costs that SBIR awards cannot fund. We have been able to use the SBIR and HSBIR funds to hire five University of Hawaii at Manoa and at West Oahu undergraduate interns for paid internships in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) projects over the past year. Our federal funding awards to date combined total over \$900,000, and our HSBIR matching funding grant last year was \$28,000. This represents a 32-times multiple on the State's funding for our company alone.

Please accept this testimony in support of this bill. In addition to allocating base funding for the Phase I SBIR matching funding program, please also consider restoring funding to the Phase II SBIR and Manufacturing Assistance Programs, at least to pre-pandemic levels, as well. We will also continue to complete a feasibility study for a renewable jet fuel, green hydrogen, and firm renewable power manufacturing plant using the technology, processes, and community input accelerated by these SBIR awards. With the matching funding from those programs, we will be able to compete at the national level for the larger multi-million dollar competitive solicitations from federal agencies, such as the U.S. Department of Energy's \$5-8 million grants to construct pilot plants for new sustainable aviation fuel and green hydrogen manufacturing processes.

Companies that successfully complete Phase II projects often face a "valley of death" where they lack the funds to move from the working prototype developed under SBIR funding to a commercial product. This is where the HTDC matching funds can make a crucial difference for Phase II companies.

In 2016, we received funds under this program for our "Warrior Stories" software application, originally developed under contract with the Dept. of Defense. With the HTDC funding, we have hired a Hawaii-based employee, added key features to our software, and attracted new customers. Additionally, we secured additional federal funding to match the HTDC grant.

Small businesses are the innovation engine of the new economy, and supporting small businesses to develop sustainable product lines should continue to be a key priority for the State.

Premier Solutions HI LLC, a Honolulu-based, SBA-certified disadvantaged minority-owned and woman-owned small business that provides information technology, systems development and professional services to government and commercial customers, writes to offer our STRONG SUPPORT of SB2806 which allocates funding to HTDC for the small business innovation research program.

Premier Solutions HI (PSHI) has benefited greatly from the programs offered by HTDC such as the Hawaii SBIR matching grant and the bi-annual Hawaii SBIR Conference. In 2017 PSHI was awarded our first Small Business Innovation Research contract from the Naval Supply Systems Command, and progressed through Phase II with the support of the Innovate Hawaii HSBIR matching funding. In 2021, based on that original Phase I award, we were successful in winning more than 7 million in Phase III contracts from the US Navy and US Marine Corps. PSHI has also won multiple additional Phase I & II SBIR awards and is currently working on an exciting new R&D effort with the Marine Corps Warfighting Laboratory involving the application of artificial intelligence and machine (AI/ML) to help improve logistics and speed delivery of medical supplies at remote locations such as Pacific Islands.

HSBIR Phase I matching funds have been critical in our success, allowing us to travel from Hawaii to our mainland-based Navy and Marine Corps customers, build invaluable relationships with our Federal sponsors, and develop product prototypes that exceeded our customer's expectations. HSBIR funding also allowed us to make key investments in tools and training for our Hawaii-based engineering staff.

We plan to continue our growth as we build upon the new capabilities our SBIR success has provided, and are currently seeking to hire more Hawaii-based engineers. We are very thankful for the support provided by HTDC and the State of Hawaii, and respectfully ask that the legislature pass SB2806.

Makai Ocean Engineering, Inc. **STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB2806** that makes an appropriation to HTDC to continue providing grants to businesses through the Hawaii small business innovation research program.

Makai Ocean Engineering, Inc. is a locally-owned and operated technology company based in Hawaii for nearly 50 years and an active participant in the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) grant program. The SBIR program consists of three phases that encourages early stage investment and innovation in technology. Phase 1 provides a very small amount of money that is barely enough for proof of concept research. However, it is the Phase 2 and 3 funding stages that really provide a means of development for companies to transition the idea and research conducted in Phase I, to prototyping to commercialization.

According to HTDC, for every dollar invested through this program, Hawaii companies have attracted nearly 15 federal dollars in return to the state, plus commercialization funding. The Hawaii SBIR program supports projects with vetted technology backed with federal funds. The state matching funds are critical in advancing development, which helps win later phase awards and assists in getting the technology out into the market. The SBIR matching grants assist companies that have a commercially-promising project that has a difficult development plan. Carefully selected matching grants represent more of a "sure bet" in terms of a successful and highly leveraged investment in economic development for the State, and growing our tech sector.

For example, Makai's subsea cable laying software began as a Phase 1 SBIR (matched by State for \$20k in the year 2000) and then went on to Phase 2 and 3 and became the world's #1 commercial cable laying software, with over \$35 million in commercial revenues and high tech jobs for Hawaii over the last 20+ years. This is a direct multiplier of more than 1,750X for the State's investment, not counting the indirect benefits of retaining some of the world's best engineers in Hawaii and the additional technologies they have generated during this time.

Makai is currently working on a Phase 2 SBIR program focused on development of a temperature sensing tow cable. Makai was also recently awarded a Phase III for this program. In 2018 HTDC awarded Makai an HSBIR Phase I grant for this program, that we believe was a key



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reason we were selected for the Phase II and III awards. This program alone, has already resulted in a direct multiplier of more than 120X the State's investment, in federal funds. This is expected to grow as the technology transitions to the Navy fleet and commercial markets in the coming years.

In addition, Makai and Referentia were two local companies honored with a national award, the SBIR Tibbetts Award at the Whitehouse in January, 2017. This award recognizes the very best SBIR companies in the country whose technologies have made a strong economic impact in terms of high paying jobs, and displaying success in <u>actually commercializing federal R&D</u>. We need this HTDC administered program to make possible more national success stories by local companies. This is why we **STRONGLY SUPPORT SB2806**, which would provide the state matching funds for federal SBIR programs to enable companies to commercialize new technologies more effectively. Not only would this expansion of funding enable our tech industry to compete and win more Federal monies for technology development and manufacturing, it would provide highly-skilled professional jobs for our keiki here at home.
