Bill No. and Title: Senate Bill No. 2885, S.D.1, H.D.1 Relating to Advancing Civic Engagement

Purpose: Appropriates funds for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position in the Public Access Room to provide educational outreach and engagement with all schools in the State.

PACE Commission Position: Strong support

The PACE Commission strongly supports this bill to appropriate funds for a full-time position in the Public Access Room, under the Legislative Reference Bureau, to enhance the Legislature's outreach and engagement with schools. It would be highly beneficial to have such a position that could focus on engaging with students and educators to promote learning about the Legislature, understanding of and participation in the legislative process, and further interaction with Legislators. The more direct contact that students and educators can have with the Legislature and see the process in action, the more they will understand and want to be part of the process.

In years past, the Judiciary History Center coordinated student tours with a staff person at the Governor's office so students could visit all three branches of government during excursions to the capitol district. The position envisioned for the Public Access Room could hopefully help to restore such student tours once the current pandemic has subsided. Moreover, in today's virtual world, having a dedicated position in the Public Access Room would greatly assist students and educators with following bills online, watching videoconference hearings, and submitting testimony on issues of interest to them.

The PACE Commission appreciates the amendment that was made in the S.D.1 version of the bill that allows the new position to provide outreach and engagement with all schools in the State. This will promote greater access for all schools to the Legislature and enhance the potential for civic learning. The House Committee on Legislative Management heard the bill on March 21, 2022, and recommended it be passed with suggestions and technical amendments.

Brief background of the PACE Commission:

The PACE Commission was created pursuant to Rule 23 of the Rules of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawai'i, issued on January 7, 2021. The purpose of the PACE Commission is to promote and advance civic education for students and citizens throughout Hawai'i. The commission has fourteen members appointed according to Rule 23 by the following: Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, Governor, President of the Senate, Speaker of the House, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Superintendent of the Department of Education, Chief Judge of the U.S. District Court for the District of Hawaii, President of the University of Hawai'i, Dean of the William S. Richardson School of Law, Hawaii State Bar Association, Hawai'i Association of Independent Schools, and two members selected by the other appointed members.

The commission began meeting in April 2021 and meets monthly. It also has two committees, one focused on civic education in the schools and one focused more generally on civic engagement in the community. The mission statement adopted by the PACE Commission is: "To create, implement and amplify sustainable programs, resources, and practices that improve place-based, constitutionally informed and culturally sensitive civic education and engagement in Hawai'i schools and communities."

SB2885 SD1 HD1 RELATING TO ADVANCING CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

Chair Luke and Members of the Committee:

Good afternoon, Chair Luke and members of the Committee, my name is Charlotte Carter-Yamauchi and I am the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau (LRB). Thank you for providing the opportunity to submit written comments on S.B. No. 2885, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, Relating to Civic Engagement.

The purpose of this measure is to provide a full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position for the Public Access Room at the State Capitol (PAR) to provide educational outreach and engagement with Hawai'i schools, and to appropriate funds for the position.

The Bureau takes no position on this measure but submits the following comments for your consideration.

PAR was established in 1994 to help enhance the public's ability to participate in the legislative process; it became part of LRB in 1996. PAR's office and services are utilized year-round, offering equipment, services, and facilities to enhance the public's ability to participate in the legislative process. This measure provides funds for a permanent full-time equivalent position, to be placed within PAR, to provide educational outreach and engagement with Hawaii schools.

We appreciate this measure's attempt to provide PAR with additional personnel and resources. However, we note that PAR already provides <u>universal</u> community outreach and civic engagement seminars, workshops, and information that are not limited to one specific target audience, which means that students can and do already benefit from these pre-existing educational sessions and information.

If, however, the Committee would still like PAR to specifically provide educational outreach and engagement to students attending Hawaii schools, the Bureau believes that the more appropriate means to accomplish this purpose is by codifying this responsibility in PAR's governing statutes, specifically section 21G-2(a), Hawaii Revised Statutes, and amending the existing appropriation section by deleting the language that explicitly references the duties of the additional staff person. This implementation strategy is preferable to the Bureau since it will most likely accomplish the proponents' original intent while concomitantly authorizing all members of PAR staff to contribute to educational outreach objectives. This will enhance PAR's flexibility in meeting all of its statutory responsibilities. For the Committee's reference, we have provided proposed language to effectuate this recommendation below:

"SECTION 1. The legislature finds that civic engagement an opportunity for residents to involved become improving their local communities and neighborhoods. In 2021, the Hawaii supreme court enacted Rule 23 to establish the commission to promote and advance civic education (PACE commission). main functions of the PACE commission is to provide leadership, oversight, and initiatives to increase civic education community and at schools, increase citizens' knowledge and promote informed participation in government government, democracy in Hawaii.

The legislature further finds that the public access room, an office under the legislative reference bureau, provides the public with information, equipment, facilities, and services to assist in research activities, educational outreach, and public engagement related to work with the legislature. The legislature additionally finds that the public access room is well-positioned to further civic engagement with the legislature in Hawaii's schools. However, the public access room currently lacks resources to provide outreach services in addition to its current responsibilities.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require the public access room to establish and maintain an educational outreach and engagement program for Hawaii schools and provide funding for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position to assist in effectuating this requirement.

- SECTION 2. Section 21G-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- "(a) There is established in the state capitol a public access room in which members of the public shall be allowed to utilize various equipment, services, and facilities to enhance their ability to participate in the legislative process. As part of its duties, the public access room shall establish and maintain an educational outreach and engagement program for Hawaii schools."
- SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to establish one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) position within the public access room.

 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the legislative reference bureau for the purposes of this Act."
 - SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
 - SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050."

The Bureau would like to note that, regardless of whether the Committee decides to accept our proposed amendments, the scope of additional activities envisioned by this measure is uncertain. If the intent is to include activities such as providing tours to school children, then PAR would need additional space within the Capitol building to ensure that tours do not interfere with PAR's current services. This would be especially critical during the legislative session when, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the PAR room was often filled to capacity.

Finally, the House Standing Committee on Legislative Management requested in its committee report on this measure that this Committee consider, among other things, whether the position being proposed in this measure should be established as a civil service position. The Bureau notes that PAR, as well as the entire Bureau, is part of the legislative branch of state government. Consequently, none of the Bureau's employees, like the rest of the employees of the legislative branch of state government, are covered under Chapter 76, Hawaii Revised Statutes, relating to civil service.

Should the Committee decide that it would like to amend the duties of PAR to explicitly provide educational outreach to Hawaii schools, and authorize PAR to have an additional full-time equivalent position to assist with this augmented purpose, the Bureau would be supportive of that intent. However, if the Committee also envisions that PAR conduct inperson Capitol tours for large groups as part of the educational outreach program once the building has fully reopened, we respectfully ask the Committee to consider the spatial

challenges that such an activity would create for PAR and provide additional space outside of the present room assigned to PAR for this purpose. We also note that, with regard to public schools, in order to truly facilitate the implementation of an effective educational engagement program as envisioned in this measure, providing a dedicated counterpart within the Department of Education to assist with this effort should be considered.

RELATING TO ADVANCING CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill No. 2885, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, makes an unspecified general fund appropriation in FY 23 to the Legislative Reference Bureau to support one full-time position at the State Capitol's Public Access Room to provide educational outreach and engagement for all Hawai'i schools.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 2885 SD 1 HD 1 RELATING TO ADVANCING CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

Hawaii Youth Services Network (HYSN), a statewide coalition of youth-serving organizations, supports SB 2885 SD 1 HD 1 Relating to Advancing Civic Engagement.

"Youth civic engagement leads to reduced risky behavior, increased success in school and leads to greater civic participation later in life. . . . Civic engagement provides young people with opportunities to gain work experience, acquire new skills, and to learn responsibility and accountability—all while contributing to the good of their communities. "1

Introducing youth to civic involvement at an early age is important because Hawaii voter turnout has declined in recent years. In the past 5 out of the past 6 presidential elections, Hawaii had the lowest voter turnout of all the states. In 2020, Hawaii was one of the 10 lowest states in voter turnout. Voter participation is at the core of active citizenship and a healthy democracy.

Hawaii Youth Services Network coordinates the annual Hawaii Children and Youth Summit, in which youth are provide recommendations to legislators about what Hawaii needs to be a better place to live, learn, and work. In 2022, 5 of the 10 recommendations have been included in legislative bills

If the youth outreach position is funded, HYSN would work in partnership with the Public Access Office to engage youth in civic affairs. The young people who have participated in the Children and Youth Summit find the experience empowering, and their involvement leads to continued engagement as adults.

I will close with some quotes from Hawaii's youth:

"This was my first experience in attending a meeting with other youths where our voices matter. . . . I want to make a difference and attending the Summit gave me the courage to step out and share everything I've learned with my fellow students. I know I will never stop speaking up for what is right."
