in consideration of SB 2964 RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL DISTRICTS.

Chairs Gabbard and Inouye, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Senate Committees on Agriculture and Environment and Water and Land.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) offers **comments** on SB 2964, which would amend Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) §205-4.5 (d) to allow recreational athletic venues and cultural activities on existing golf courses within the State Land Use Agricultural District. Golf courses and golf driving ranges are allowed within the State Agricultural District under §205-4.5 (d) only if they were approved by a county before July 1, 2005. Otherwise, these are expressly prohibited uses within the State Agricultural District under \$205-4.5 (a) (6).

Recreational athletic venues and cultural activities that promote the arts are also nonpermitted uses within the State Agricultural District under HRS §205-2 (d) and HRS §205-4.5 (a). OPSD is concerned that this bill would allow a grandfathered non-permitted use within the Agricultural District, which would not be allowed if proposed after 2005, to have additional non-permitted uses. Existing State and county laws already provide ways to accommodate such uses, for example, through a Special Permit, a State Land Use District Boundary Amendment, or a county zone change.

Aloha Chairs Gabbard and Inouye, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Committees:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau respectfully offers our concerns about broadening the scope of the current exemption that allows golf courses that were previously approved within the agricultural district to continue to operate.

Allowing for open-ended, undefined "Recreational athletic venues" and "Cultural activities that promote the arts" may lead to unintended consequences that may conflict with or be incompatible with the surrounding agricultural operations, for example, due to the activities of normal farm operations that may be considered to be nuisances by these new ventures on golf courses, or former golf courses.

And because the terms are not defined, would vacation or camping facilities, for example, including temporary residences be considered to be "recreational athletic venues"? We believe that misuse or abuse of the expansion of the grandfathered golf course exemption is likely.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide our comments and thank you for your continued support of Hawai'i's agricultural community.
