In consideration of SENATE BILL 3019 RELATING TO THE CONSERVATION AND RESOURCES ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

Senate Bill 3019 proposes to require the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) to pursue and obtain accreditation for the Conservation and Resources Enforcement Program from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. and appropriates funding. The Department supports this bill provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Budget request.

In 2009, the Department's Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement participated in the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) formal accreditation process. The past effort was stymied by the increased amount of funding needed to implement CALEA standards statewide, the costs to continue formal affiliation with CALEA as well as frustration encountered with consultation of new policies with the employee union. Due to these issues, it was determined that continuing the accreditation effort was not feasible.

The Department is open to participating in the CALEA accreditation process again and believes CALEA accreditation will lead to a high degree of professionalism of both DOCARE and its Conservation and Resources Enforcement Officers. We note participation will require appropriate amounts of funding needed for equipment purchases, training and possibly for capital improvements to DOCARE facilities to meet CALEA's standards. Funding will also be needed to maintain formal participation and affiliation with CALEA.

RELATING TO THE CONSERVATION AND RESOURCES ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill No. 3019 requires the Department of Land and Natural Resources

(DLNR) to seek and obtain accreditation for the Conservation and Resources

Enforcement Program from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement

Agencies, Inc., and appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds for FY 23 to

be expended by DLNR for this purpose.

B&F notes that the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental

Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School

Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II

funds must maintain state support for:

 Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

Comments:

Law enforcement has a profound impact on our lives, rights, safety, society, and rightfully so, incurs some of the highest liability amongst professions. With even more visibility and emphasis on procedural standardization, it's imperative that SB3019 is passed. Why should we expect anything less from our law enforcement agencies State or County, big or small?

The State of Hawaii appears to be in the process of realizing the benefits of standardization and has created a Law Enforcement Standards Board. Separately, various other state law enforcement agencies are pursuing unification under a proposed Department of Law Enforcement which no doubt will share and standardize professionalism, capabilities, logistics, expertise, etc. via HB2171.

DOCARE is part of the Law Enforcement Standards Board, but for whatever reason is not included in HB2171. Should HB2171 pass, you will have two main law enforcement entities: the county police and the newly formed State Department of Law Enforcement. DOCARE will remain in the periphery as a law enforcement agency operating independently and outside of their standards. SB3019 is strongly needed to ensure that DOCARE is operating at standards on par with the nation and the rest of the State of Hawaii.

Comments:

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice-Chair Agaran, and Committee Members,

I support SB3019, contingent on adequate funding and staffing for DOCARE specifically dedicated to CALEA Accreditation, which is a complex and long process, and requires substantial annual work to maintain standards.

Accreditation at this level is not a "one and done" proposition - it requires expertise, consultation, collaboration with the national CALEA center, and lots (lots!) of training and reporting. All of this is a good thing, IF budget and staffing are provided. If not, then accreditation becomes a drag on already thin DOCARE resources.

In my professional capacity as a professor of law at the William S. Richardson School of Law, I have worked with DOCARE for over a decade on a number of capacity building projects, including designing the "new" DOCARE Academy and, for some time, the CALEA Accreditation process.

Regarding CALEA Accreditation, I observed and sought to assist, in a small way, the efforts of DLNR, under the leadership of then-Director Laura Thielen, to secure CALEA accreditation. DOCARE and the Law School collaborated on dedicating part of the DOCARE Law Fellow's time for several years to securing and maintaining CALEA Accreditation.

While I am in strong support of national accreditation and all the benefits that brings for professionalism and moral, and performance, for DOCARE, this kind of accreditation can be accomplished only with strong administrative staffing support, dedicated to the task, on an annual basis.
