RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill No. 3158, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, establishes the Electric Bicycle and Electric

Moped (EBEM) Subaccount within the Highway Development Special Fund

administered by the Department of Transportation to implement a rebate program that

incentivizes the purchase of electric bicycles and electric mopeds. This bill allocates an

unspecified portion of the Environmental Response, Energy, and Food Security Tax

(Barrel Tax) to be deposited into the EBEM Subaccount.

B&F has concerns with the deposit of a portion of the Barrel Tax to the EBEM Subaccount since the reallocation of the funding would result in a general fund revenue loss. Further, there is no special fund subaccount appropriation to support the program as envisioned in the bill.

Finally, as a matter of general policy, B&F does not support the creation of any special fund or special fund subaccount which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds and any related subaccounts should: 1) serve a

need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. Even with the proposed Barrel Tax allocation to the EBEM Subaccount, it is difficult to determine whether the proposed special fund subaccount would be self-sustaining.

Chair Luke and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General (the Department) offers the following comments.

The purpose of this bill is to establish and fund an electric bicycle and electric moped rebate program with a barrel tax contribution into a newly created subaccount of the Highway Development Special Fund (special fund) established by section 264-122, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). In order to effectuate spending of the funds deposited into the subaccount of the special fund, article VII, section 5, of the Hawaii State Constitution, requires an appropriation. The appropriation would be from the special fund because the subaccount is within it.

The Department recommends the following wording:

There is appropriated out of the highway development special fund the sum of \$______ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the electric bicycle and electric moped rebate program.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of transportation for the purposes of this Act.

In addition, according to article VII, section 4, of the Hawaii State Constitution, no grant of public money or property shall be made except pursuant to standards provided by law. The rebate program to be established by this bill will authorize the Department of Transportation to make administrative grants of public money and should specify the

standards for qualifying for those rebates. The Department recommends that a definition of "low-income" in section 2 of the bill be included within the proposed statutory wording to comply with this constitutional requirement. Examples of statutes that provide standards for existing administrative grant programs are part II of chapter 9 and sections 10-17, 210D-11, and 383-128, HRS.

SUPPORT SB 3158 SD2 HD1 RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

Chair Luke, Vice Chair Yamashita, and Members of the Committee, the Hawaii State Energy Office (HSEO) supports and requests amendments to SB 3158 SD2 HD1, which establishes the electric bicycle and electric moped rebate program and subaccount to encourage the purchase and use of electric bicycles and electric mopeds and allocates a portion of the barrel tax for the rebate program.

Emissions from ground transportation account for more than half of energy emissions as reported in the Greenhouse Gas Emissions Report for 2017¹. Ground transportation accounted for 47 percent of the reported transportation emissions. For Hawaii to meet its statutory target "to sequester more greenhouse gases than emitted as soon as practicable but no later than 2045", significant reductions in emissions from ground transportation will need to be made in the near to medium term. For significant reductions to be made all market segments in Hawaii need to be addressed. SB 3158 SD2 HD1 supports the proliferation of zero-emission mobility alternatives, which can reduce fossil-fuel powered vehicle miles traveled and related transportation emissions. Electric bicycles and mopeds can be complementary to public transit by facilitating firstmile/last-mile connections to transit stops and fill gaps in transit services. Electric

bicycles and electric mopeds also promote equity by providing a lower cost zeroemission alternative to passenger vehicles.

HSEO appreciates the amendments made by the House Committee on Transportation to SB 3158 SD2 deleting language that would have established an Electric Bicycle and Electric Moped Rebate Special Fund and instead establishing an electric bicycle and electric moped subaccount within the Highway Development Special Fund, restoring the allocation from the Environmental Response, Energy, and Food Security Tax for the Electric Vehicle Charging Station Rebate Program, and allocating an unspecified amount of the Environmental Response, Energy, and Food Security Tax for the Rebate Program.

HSEO is ready to work with the Legislature, state agencies, and stakeholders to address any issues in order to advance the decarbonization of ground transportation through support of a variety of alternative transportation modes that decrease the energy intensity of mobility.

HSEO defers to the appropriate agencies regarding the administrative and fiscal impacts of this measure.

DESCRIPTION:

Establishes the electric bicycle and electric moped rebate program and subaccount to encourage the purchase and use of electric bicycles and electric mopeds. Allocates a portion of the barrel tax for the rebate program. Effective 1/1/2050. (HD1)

POSITION:

The Public Utilities Commission ("Commission") offers the following comments for consideration.

COMMENTS:

The Commission appreciates the intent of this measure to create an electric bicycle and electric moped rebate program ("EBEMRP"). The Commission defers to the Department of Transportation regarding administration of the EBEMRP.

The Commission supports the amendment made by the previous committee to restore the allocation from the environmental response, energy, and food security tax ("barrel tax") for the Electric Vehicle Charging System (EVCS) Rebate Program. A consistent funding source is essential in maintaining confidence in the EVCS Rebate Program and avoiding disruptions to projects that are planned or are undergoing construction.

The Commission has recently been alerted by the Department of Budget and Finance that the EVCS rebate program requires a direct appropriation in order for the Commission

to expend deposited barrel tax funds, and that Act 75 (2021) does not provide sufficient authority to do so. Therefore, the EVCS program is currently constrained by a \$100,000 spending ceiling for FY 2022, which was created by the "seed money" deposited from the Energy Security Special Fund through Act 75.

To ensure that the Commission is able to expend barrel tax funds as intended for the EVCS rebate program, the Commission recommends adding the following appropriation language, which would satisfy the EVCS rebate program pipeline through the end of FY 2022.

SECTION []. There is appropriated out of the electric vehicle charging system subaccount within the public utilities commission special fund the sum of \$500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 for the electric vehicle charging system rebate program established pursuant to sections 269-72 and 269-73, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

The funds appropriated shall be expended by the public utilities commission for the purposes of this part.

In addition, after consulting with the Department of the Attorney General, the Commission requests an amendment such as the following to ensure that an appropriation for the EVCS rebate program through FY 2022 does not lapse before the funds can be expended:

SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2050; provided that section 3 shall be repealed on December 31, 2027, the appropriation for fiscal year 2021-2022 for the department of commerce and consumer affairs for the electric vehicle charging system subaccount of the public utilities commission special fund shall lapse on June 30, 2024, and section 243-3.5(a), Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be reenacted in the form in which it read on the day prior to the effective date of this Act.

The Commission also recommends that similar appropriation language be added to account for expected barrel tax funds in the EVCS subaccount in FY 2023:

SECTION []. There is appropriated out of the electric vehicle charging system subaccount within the public utilities commission special fund the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the electric vehicle charging system rebate program established pursuant to sections 269-72 and 269-73, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

The funds appropriated shall be expended by the public utilities commission for the purposes of this part.

The Commission further recommends that the spending cap outlined in Section 269-72, subsection (d), HRS, be removed. This will ensure that the Commission is permitted to expend all appropriated funds.

INTRODUCED BY: House Committee on Transportation

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Establishes the electric bicycle and electric moped rebate program and subaccount to encourage the purchase and use of electric bicycles and electric mopeds. Allocates a portion of the barrel tax for the rebate program.

SYNOPSIS: Adds a new section to chapter 196, HRS, to establish the electric bicycle and electric moped rebate program. Provides that each eligible purchase of an electric bicycle or electric moped shall receive a rebate of up to \$_____, provided that no individual shall receive more than \$_____ in total rebates each fiscal year.

Amends section 264-122, HRS, to establish an electric bicycle and electric moped subaccount within the highway development special fund.

Amends section 243-3.5, HRS, to add a new earmark of ____ cents per barrel to the electric bicycle and electric moped subaccount.

EFFECTIVE DATE: January 1, 2050.

STAFF COMMENTS: The proposed measure would perpetuate the earmarking of tax revenues. Incentives for electric vehicles may be a worthy expense if considered alone. But does that justify bypassing the normal appropriation and budgeting process that also considers invasive species, unique health risks like COVID-19, and the aging infrastructure in our educational system?

Earmarking revenues from any tax type for a particular purpose decreases transparency and accountability.

Next, it should be remembered that revenues diverted for a special purpose, in this case to fund electric bicycle and electric moped rebates, will not be counted against the state's spending ceiling or debt limit and will obscure the state's true financial condition.

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food; renewable energy and clean transportation; and better management of freshwater and waste.

Ulupono <u>supports the intent</u> of SB 3158 SD 2 HD 1, which establishes the Electric Bicycle and Electric Moped Rebate Program and subaccount to encourage the purchase and use of electric bicycles and electric mopeds, and allocates a portion of the Barrel Tax for the rebate program.

Ulupono supports Hawai'i's reduction of fossil fuel use as we strive to meet the State's 100% renewable goal by 2045. However, we strongly encourage this committee to consider amending this measure to better align with earlier bill drafts.

We encourage the committee to consider reinstituting Electric Vehicle (EV) purchases within the rebate program, as previously intended. We also recommend adjusting the bill to support, or prefer, a point-of-sale rebate program such as those in Vermont and Oregon. Though such implementation may increase complexity, point-of-sale rebate programs directly reduce the initial purchase price paid and have shown to be much more effective at influencing purchasing decisions for EVs.

Ulupono finds that EVs of all kinds are an important avenue to address Hawai'i's pressing climate issues and align with the State's energy and environmental goals. EVs currently offer an effective option to advance clean, renewable ground transportation and provide immediate benefits to Hawai'i. This bill is an important measure for the State to push for the decarbonization of our economy and support for the LMI community while showing the world that Hawai'i is a clean energy leader.
