Fiscal Implications: The Department of Health (DOH) will need a staff position or funds to
contract with a consultant to support the convening and facilitation of a rural health task force.
The Office of Primary Care and Rural Health is funded solely through federal grants. The
Department requests that passage of any appropriations in this measure does not replace or
adversely impact priorities in the Executive Budget request.

Department Testimony: The Department appreciates the intent of S.B. 3180 S.D. 1, which 6 7 establishes a rural health task force within the DOH to make recommendations on registered nurse recruitment and retention in rural areas of east Maui, Molokai, and Lanai. This measure 8 9 may not be needed since it duplicates the efforts of the Hawaii State Center for Nursing (HSCN). The Department does not have the expertise and/or resources to implement the request as 10 11 outlined in this measure which includes a needs assessment at each rural health care facility; managing the ratio of registered nurses to patients in each rural health care facility; 12 recommendations for affordable workforce housing; surveying telehealth demand; identifying 13 travel nurse options; analyzing nurse retention impact on rural health care facilities, researching 14 best practices on retaining registered nurses; and preparation of a legislative report. Additionally, 15 there may be insufficient time to convene the task force, develop actionable recommendations, 16 propose legislation, and complete the report by the end of December 2022. 17 Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this measure. 18

RE: SENATE BILL NO. 3180, SENATE DRAFT 1, RELATING TO HEALTH CARE.

Chair Baker, Vice Chair Chang, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> Senate Bill No. 3180, Senate Draft 1, RELATING TO HEALTH CARE, and offers a <u>PROPOSED AMENDMENT</u> for your consideration.

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii's Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines to over 150,000 patients each year who live in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

The bill, as received by your Committee, would establish a Rural Health Task Force (Task Force) within the Department of Health (DOH) to prepare and develop solutions and make recommendations regarding rural areas of east Maui, Molokai, and Lanai, with specific emphasis on the recruitment and retention of registered nurses.

The State of Hawaii is experiencing a severe shortage of health care professionals in the workforce, especially in rural areas. Recent studies note that the current shortage of physicians is at 20% of the total full-time equivalent positions throughout the State. The shortage is especially severe in the fields of primary care, infectious diseases, colorectal surgery, pathology, general surgery, pulmonology, neurology, neurosurgery, orthopedic surgery, family medicine, cardiothoracic surgery, rheumatology, cardiology, hematology/oncology, and pediatric subspecialties of endocrinology, cardiology, hematology/oncology, and gastroenterology.

Physicians are not the only professionals in high demand. The same also applies to registered nurses.

This bill would provide the DOH with assistance from the health care providers in east Maui, Molokai, and Lanai in developing tangible action steps to assist with the recruitment and retention of registered nurses in these areas.

When the HPCA previously submitted testimony on this bill and its companion, House Bill No. 1635, we constrained our recommendation to the membership of FQHCs that were physically situated on Lanai, Molokai, and <u>east</u> Maui, as specified in the bill. However, after discussing the matter with all of the CEO's the area FQHCs, we note that four FQHCs work together as a team to provide primary care to the people of Maui, Molokai, and Lanai, in their entirety. They are:

Malama I Ke Ola Health Center; Molokai Community Health Center; Lanai Community Health Center; and Hana Health.

Because of this, the HPCA respectfully asks that membership for the Task Force be expanded to also include Malama I Ke Ola Health Center. That way all FQHCs providing services in the area will be able to participate in this effort.

With this amendment, the HPCA urges your favorable consideration of this measure.
