# In consideration of SENATE BILL 3228 RELATING TO TOW-IN SURFING

Senate Bill 3228 proposes to allow tow-in surfing training during periods below high surf warning levels. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) offers the following comments.

The Department supports any effort that would help to reduce injuries and fatalities in ocean recreation activities. Allowing tow-in surfing training on days with smaller surf would allow participants to gradually build their proficiency, confidence, and survival strategies before they venture into larger surf.

However, the Department notes that due to the inherent danger of tow-in surfing, the current procedure to authorize both tow-in surfing and tow-in surfing training is the marine event permit process, which requires the applicant to specify where their activity will take place and also hold a minimum amount of insurance coverage. Requiring the applicant to specify the location(s) of their activity allows rescue personnel to more effectively respond in the event of distress. Requiring a minimum amount of insurance coverage ensures that the operator and participants can adequately cover costs of injuries and/or damage. This measure would effectively remove the marine event permit requirement for tow-in surfing training.

# In consideration of SENATE BILL 3228 RELATING TO TOW-IN SURFING

Conservation Council For Hawaii **STRONGLY OPPOSES SB3228**. There are currently designated training areas for tow-in surfing that have been put in place to ensure the safety of other ocean users. We have witnessed and had several complaints about jet skis beaching themselves within less than one foot of turtle nesting areas on Police Beach in Haleiwa. When we reached out to DOCARE, we were told that this group of skis had been given an open permit for training under filming, and that while they were to call in when they were training they were given open reign. Not only have we seen an increase in our threatened Green Sea Turtle nesting sites across the beaches on Oahu, our endangered Hawaiian Monk Seals have seen increased deaths due to human interaction.

The increased popularity of tow-in surfing for foil boarders has added to the safety risks of paddle surfing, SUP surfers, swimmers and other ocean goers, as well as our marine life. It would be beneficial to open more thrill craft operator courses so that those seeking to tow-in have a better understanding and appreciation of thrill craft operator rules and regulations and training areas.

To whom it may concern;

I am in strong support of SB3228.

I have worked as a safety professional in the utility construction industry for over 10 years. One of the most critical elements in any safety program is an effective and regular training program. Tow-in surfing and foiling have dramatically evolved over the last decade, and it has opened up larger areas of the existing coastline outside of the already crowded and popular surf spots. Areas that previously could only be used in high surf now can be utilized the majority of the year with the right equipment and tools to access. The ability to use PWC and rescue sled along with an experienced and qualified driver have made these sports more accessible and safer to those willing to learn. The training and repetitions you can get on smaller swells are critical for the smooth transition into high surf days where the skills learned and reinforced in training can make a significant difference for the safety of the riders and pilots.

I strongly support SB3228 for the safety of our surfing and foiling community.
