# RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND TOURISM

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill No. 3231 establishes a state film coordinator (SFC) position within the

Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) to review,

approve, and issue permits to film in the State; appropriates an unspecified amount of

general funds for FY 23 for the position; and replaces all references to DBEDT with

SFC.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

 Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and  Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

#### In consideration of SB 3231 RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND TOURISM.

Chair Wakai, Vice Chair Misalucha, and members of the Committee.

The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) offers comments on SB3231, which establishes the state film coordinator in DBEDT to review, approve, and issue permits for film in the state.

DBEDT currently has a Film Industry Branch, also known as the Hawaii Film Office (HFO), that was established in 1978 and is currently housed within the Creative Industries Division of DBEDT. The Film Industry Development Manager is the Branch Chief of the HFO and manages four staff, two of which are civil service positions handling all facilitation of permitting for film between multiple state agencies and productions. Over 2,000 multi-jurisdictional permits are facilitated by HFO staff and state agencies each year.

If the intent of this measure is to establish a new permitting system or authority, further discussion is necessary with the Legislature as the establishment of the state film coordinator appears to replace existing permitting process and personnel. The current state film program has long-standing Memorandum of Agreement with the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), the Department of Transportation (Hawaii DOT), and other state agencies and offices that our film permit specialists work with to secure film approvals for dozens of fast-moving productions that take place across seven islands.

We appreciate the opportunity to work with the Legislature to further refine the Intent and statutory aspects of this measure. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

### **Our Background**

Island Film Group is a locally owned and operated production company. We began working in Hawaii's film and television industry in 2001 as attorneys at Goodsill Anderson Quinn & Stifel, where we represented filmmakers and other production companies. Since our formation of Island Film Group in 2007, we have been working full-time as producers of feature films such as "Princess Ka`iulani" and "Soul Surfer", network and cable

television movies and series, as well as a large number of commercial productions.

**We OPPOSE** the proposed establishment of a state film coordinator that is appointed by the director of DBEDT without regard to Chapter 76. We have worked closely with the Hawaii Film Office for more than 15 years and we are very aware that handling permitting work effectively depends in great part on the strength of the continuing relationships between the Hawaii Film Office's permanent employees and the other state and local government agencies. Stability and continuity in the role is paramount and would be difficult to achieve by designating an appointed person to such an important position.
