#### Subject: <u>Senate Bill 3273: Relating to a Department of Environmental Protection</u>

The Honolulu Board of Water Supply (BWS) supports Senate Bill (HB) 3273. The bill proposes amending Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) Section 26-4 to create a department of environmental protection.

A state department of environmental protection centralizes the work to protect and preserve our environment and natural resources, which will further protect Hawaii's drinking water now and into the future. One example is the California Environmental Protection Agency that uses the latest science based information and research to develop, implement and enforce environmental laws to restore, protect and enhance the environment, to ensure public health, environmental quality and economic vitality of the state.

The BWS recommends amending the bill to require the department of environmental protection report to a seven member board in a new stand-alone Section added to the HRS, entitled "Board Oversight," that provides:

"The Department of Environmental Protection will report to a seven member board that consists of one member appointed by each of the following:

- (1) the Office of the Governor;
- (2) the Hawaii State Senate;
- (3) the Hawaii State House of Representatives;
- (4) the Honolulu City Council;
- (5) the Kauai County Council;
- (6) the Hawaii County Council; and
- (7) the Maui County Council."

#### In consideration of SENATE BILL 3273 RELATING TO A DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

Senate Bill 3273 proposes to establish a firm deadline by which a Department of Environmental Protection shall be created and creates a Department of Environmental Protection Working Group to fulfill the mandate of creating the Department of Environmental Protection. The **Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) offers comments.** 

The Department notes that last Session, Senate Bill 968 and its companion, House Bill 423 were introduced but not heard. Both bills provided an extensive history of the efforts to create a department of Environmental Protection, the reasoning for such a department, and a blueprint for transitioning existing laws and functions to a new department. Senate Bill 3273 pares everything down to 1) establishing a Department of Environmental Protections and 2) creating a working group to develop the structure and funding for the new department as well as a transition plan.

The Department suggests that the working group be the focus of this bill, and that it be expanded to include: the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the Department of Agriculture and a representative each from the House and Senate. It should also include the Hawaii Climate Change Commission Coordinator and the City and County of Honolulu Chief Resilience Officer and Executive Director of the City's Resiliency Office.

Although much work has already been done by prior working groups, the proposal still needs further discussion. Provide the working group the flexibility to ask if funding or political will are the issues, or is a reorganization required? Have we defined the problem adequately and will a new department solve the problem? If the answer is yes, are small steps better?

Members of the Working Group will find it difficult to divert staff and funding away from Executive Branch priorities. The Department also notes that since this is an election year, much of the Executive Branch leadership will change in January 2023. Without a budget, it's unlikely that the working group will get started until after the new governor chooses department heads. Both funding and timing of the start of the Working Group should be taken into consideration.

Fiscal Implications: This measure may impact the priorities identified in the Governor's
 Executive Budget Request for the Department of Health's (Department's) appropriations and

3 personnel priorities.

**Department Testimony:** The Department supports this measure's thoughtful approach to 4 5 creating a Department of Environmental Protection. There would be certain advantages, as outlined in the bill's preamble, to creating a department with the core mission of environmental 6 7 protection. However, the logistical challenges to a successful transition involving so many different existing departments and offices should not be underestimated. We believe it is 8 9 important to add to the working group a representative each from the Department of Human Resources Development, the Department of Accounting and General Services, and the 10 Department of Budget and Finance to address personnel- and facilities-related logistics in the 11 planning process. 12

To cite one example of challenges that must be overcome, the Hazard Evaluation and Emergency Response Office and branches within the Environmental Management Division of the department are still recovering from losing about 25% of their staff when these offices were moved from Kewalo Basin to Waimano Ridge less than five years ago. The offices were moved to facilities owned by the department to avoid paying costly rent and potentially facing relocation on a short timeline when the Kewalo Basin lease was ended by the new owner. If these offices become part of a new Department of Environmental Protection, will they remain in their present location? If these offices must move again, where will they go and what effect will another movehave on personnel issues, including retention and hiring?

Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Nishihara, and Members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Environmental Protection:

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development respectfully offers **comments** on SB 3273 which establishes a department of environmental protection by July 1, 2026. Creates a department of environmental protection working group to address the logistics required for the State to establish a department of environmental protection. Requires the working group to submit a report to the legislature prior to the 2025 regular session.

With the recent passage of <u>Act 45</u>, <u>Session Laws of Hawai'i 2020</u>, <u>Act 152</u>, <u>Session Laws of Hawai'i 2021</u>, and <u>Act 153</u>, <u>Session Laws of Hawai'i 2021</u>, the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development continues to transition rapidly despite the office's limited funding and staffing to meet the statewide sea level rise adaptation coordination, sustainability and climate adaptation planning and coordination, economic recovery and resiliency planning, affordable housing collaboration and environmental review requirements over the past six months.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development agrees with the preamble of the bill that the ongoing climate crisis is one of the overarching issues of modern times, the protection of the State's environment and natural resources are extremely critical. The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development believes that the State of Hawai'i's sustainability, climate change mitigation, and climate change adaptation requires a <u>multi-agency approach</u> throughout all branches, departments, and agencies of the State of Hawai'i's counties.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development believes that through strong statewide planning and coordination laws in relation to sustainability and climate change issues, including: <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §225M-2</u>, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §225M-3</u>, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes</u> §225M-8, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §225M-9</u>, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §225P-3</u>, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §225P-4</u>, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §225P-5</u>, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §225P-7</u>, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §225P-7</u>, <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §226-108</u>, and <u>Hawai'i Revised Statutes §226-109</u> provides the statewide coordination to unite this important work collectively as a State.

#### COMMENTS SB 3273 RELATING TO A DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION.
