RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII MAUI COLLEGE, MOLOKAI EDUCATION CENTER

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill No. 3340 appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds in

FY 23 for the University of Hawai'i to purchase 14.5 acres of land in Kalamaula,

Moloka'i, to expand and relocate the Moloka'i Education Center.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the

federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that

states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds

and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

SB 3340 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII MAUI COLLEGE, MOLOKAI EDUCATION CENTER

Chair Kim, Vice Chair Kidani, and members of the committee:

The University of Hawai'i is in support of SB 3340 that proposes to purchase land for the relocation of the Moloka'i Education Center from its current location that lies in a flood and extreme tsunami evacuation zone to a Mauka location.

The Moloka'i Education Center was built in 1999 on 3 acres of land in Kaunakakai. The center has served between 250 and 100 students each year and serves as a learning center for the Moloka'i community. The 3,300 square foot facility is equipped with classrooms, a library common area, office space, and a parking lot.

Due to sea level rise, a strategy to relocate the Moloka'i Education Center is necessary. This bill will secure a viable relocation site for the Center.

In closing, the University of Hawai'i supports the intent of SB 3340 on the condition that any appropriated positions or funds do not supplant any portion of the University's Supplemental Budget Request.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **SUPPORT** of this important measure. The purpose of this measure is to support University of Hawaii, Maui College, Molokai Education Center, which is the only higher education institution on island, and preserves a space for students to pursue higher education goals.

The Maui County Council has not had the opportunity to take a formal position on this measure. Therefore, I am providing this testimony in my capacity as an individual member of the Maui County Council.

I SUPPORT this measure for the following reasons:

- 1. University of Hawaii, Maui College, Molokai Education Center is nearing capacity as enrollment continues to increase, and this measure would allow more students on Molokai to pursue higher education on their home island.
- 2. This measure would relocate University of Hawaii, Maui College, Molokai Education Center from a low-lying area susceptible to sea-level rise.
- 3. This measure furthers several Maui County General Plan policies, including the following: "Improve partnerships that utilize the skills and talents at Hawai'i's colleges and universities to benefit the County." (Countywide Policy Plan); and "Support improvements in education training programs and internships at all levels to ensure a well-educated and well-trained workforce." (Molokai Island Community Plan).

For the foregoing reasons, I **SUPPORT** this measure.

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
