Subject: Senate Bill (SB) 3343 Relating to Fireworks

I am Steven Goble, Chair of the State Fire Council (SFC). The SFC offers comments regarding SB 3343, which requires importers of fireworks to obtain a license from the Harbors Division of the Department of Transportation and an annual report to the Legislature.

The SFC believes the consumer use of illegal fireworks in Hawaii continues on a dangerous and increasingly upward trajectory. However, language of SB 3343 redirecting fireworks import license fees from the county fire departments to the Harbors Division of the State Department of Transportation (DOT) may have a negative consequence on existing fireworks control programs implemented by the county fire departments. For example, fireworks import license fees are used by county fire departments to fund the salary of an auditor of fireworks and articles pyrotechnic; to support inspection and inventory checks of storage facilities; to support training for county fireworks auditors; and to support expenses relating to education and enforcement regarding compliance with the Hawaii Revised Statutes §132D.

Furthermore, it may be advantageous to contain regulation of fireworks importation, wholesale, retail, and pyrotechnical and consumer discharge under the respective county authority having jurisdiction.

Public safety and property protection remain priorities of the SFC. Therefore, the SFC supports the intent of SB 3343 to stem the flow of illegal fireworks into Hawaii and is willing to help refine SB 3343 to that goal.

Aloha Chair Baker, Vice Chair Chang and Committee Members,

On behalf of the Hawaiian Humane Society, thank you for considering our support for Senate Bill 3343, SD1, which requires importers of fireworks to obtain a license from the Harbors Division of the Department of Transportation and requires an annual report to the Legislature.

Hawaiian Humane supports any attempt to remove fireworks from residential neighborhoods by keeping these dangerous products out of our state entirely and/or enhancing enforcement.

At what should be joyous times for local families, illegal fireworks fill our neighborhoods with unexpected explosions that terrorize pets and people alike. Animals who flee their homes are at enormous risk of injury and death. An average of eight stray dogs per day came into the Hawaiian Humane Society in 2021. As the new year arrived, that number spiked to 36 between Jan. 1-2.

Hawaiian Humane has long educated our community about keeping pets safe from the terror of fireworks around New Years and July 4, but these bombs increasingly go off for months at a time. That makes it impossible for pet owners to prepare and creates sustained stress on people and animals, doing lasting damage to their emotional and physical health. Neither people nor animals should have to take tranquilizers just to survive the impacts of illegal behavior by their neighbors.

We urge the committee to pass this measure. Mahalo for your consideration.

My name is Sheldon K. Hao, Fire Chief of the Honolulu Fire Department (HFD). The HFD offers comments regarding SB 3343, SD 1, which requires importers of fireworks to obtain a license from the State of Hawaii, Department of Transportation's (DOT) Harbors Division who shall submit an annual report to the legislature.

The HFD believes the consumer use of illegal fireworks in Hawaii continues on a dangerous and increasingly upward trajectory. However, language in SB 3343, SD 1 that redirects fireworks import license fees from the county fire departments to the DOT's Harbors Division may have a negative consequence on existing fireworks control programs implemented by the county fire departments. For example, fireworks import license fees are used by county fire departments to fund the salary of an auditor of fireworks and articles pyrotechnic and support inspection and inventory checks of storage facilities, training for county fireworks auditors, and expenses relating to education and enforcement regarding compliance with Hawaii Revised Statutes §132D.

The loss of fireworks import license fees will impact the City and County of Honolulu (City), as it will realize an annual revenue loss of \$31,500. Furthermore, the City anticipates a reduction in funds received from the Federal Recovery Fund, the American Rescue Plan Act, and real property tax revenue in fiscal year 2024.

It may be advantageous to contain regulation of fireworks importation, wholesale, retail, pyrotechnical, and consumer discharge under the respective county authority having jurisdiction.
