Testimony of the Board of Pharmacy

On the following measure: S.B. 473 S.D. 1, H.D. 1, RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF PHARMACY

Chair Nakashima and Members of the Committee:

My name is James Skizewski, and I am the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy (Board). The Board offers comments on this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to exempt drug manufacturers, wholesale prescription drug distributors, and third-party logistics providers of home dialysate drugs or devices from the license, registration, and permit requirements for pharmacies, under certain conditions.

The Board is concerned that the passage of this bill will eliminate existing safeguards which ensure patient specific drugs being dispensed into the State meet all required safety standards. If passed, this bill could allow for an out-of-state manufacturer to ship dialysate drugs to a local distributor, who in turn will be allowed to dispense directly to a consumer without the product being evaluated or assessed. Exempting existing businesses who supply dialysate drugs from licensing requirements for this specific drug will remove protections which ensure patient safety.

The Board acknowledges the requirements for exemption set forth in section 1 of the bill, but has concerns about the ability to ensure the proposed requirements are met. As dialysate drugs are considered prescription drugs, and patient specific, dispensers, including pharmacists, play a vital role in ensuring the safety of patients.

The Board would like to highlight that Hawaii Administrative Rules section 16-95-2, states the definition of "Wholesale distributor' means any person or entity in this State engaged in the transfer of prescription drugs to a person other than a consumer or patient…" If a business wishes to "dispense" prescription drugs or devices in this State to the end user or patient, the dispensing must occur under a permitted pharmacy and under the supervision of a licensed pharmacist.
