This measure amends Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS") §11-342 by adding a new subsection that prohibits legislators or persons acting on their behalf to hold a fundraiser during any regular or special legislative session. This amendment will prevent corruption or the appearance of corruption. The Commission recommends that this Committee consider amending the bill to apply to all elected office holders. If the Committee is not inclined to do so, the Commission urges this Committee to at least expand the fundraiser ban to all candidates for legislative office during regular and special sessions.

The Commission urges this Committee to pass this measure with the offered amendments.

Chairs McKelvey and Nakashima, Vice Chairs Wildberger and Matayoshi, and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports SB555 SD1, which prohibits fundraising by legislators or persons working for the legislator or on their behalf, during legislative sessions.

The League of Women Voters of the United States believes that the methods of financing political campaigns should combat corruption and undue influence in government. The League believes that political corruption includes among others, the following: 1) A candidate or officeholder agrees to vote or work in favor of a donor's interests in exchange for a campaign contribution; 2) an officeholder or staff gives greater access to donors.

Fundraisers during legislative sessions appear to create opportunities for 1) above, since the legislative agenda is open to action by legislators, whether to introduce or put desired wording into legislation, schedule specific bills for hearings (or not), and of course vote on specific bills which are in the interest of contributors. Further, fundraisers by their nature violate 2) above, since they provide opportunities for direct interaction between contributors and legislators which are not available to the public.

The Pono Hawai'i Initiative (PHI) is testifying in **support with suggested amendments to SB555 SD1**.

SB555 SD1 is a good start but is not enough and should be amended to emulate Virginia state law which prohibits not just the holding of fundraisers but bans the "solicitation or acceptance" of campaign contributions during the session.

(c) During any regular session or special session including any extension of any regular session or special session and any recess days, holidays, and weekends, no legislator, or a person employed by or acting on behalf of a legislator, **shall solicit or accept any campaign contribution.**

Currently, 28 states place restrictions on giving and receiving campaign contributions during the legislative session.

Va. Code § 24.2-940. No member of the General Assembly or statewide official shall solicit or accept a contribution from any person or political committee on and after the first day of a regular session of the General Assembly through adjournment sine die of that session.

Aloha Chairs Angus McKelvey and Mark Nakashima and members of the committees,

We **SUPPORT** SB555. The bill, if enacted, would prohibit legislators and employees and persons acting on behalf of legislators from holding any fundraiser during a regular legislative session or special session. We also request two amendments.

The bill in its current form does not go far enough to restore public trust that has been eroded given ongoing events. The public has been rocked by a series of illegal or unethical behavior of our elected and appointed government officials. In a recent Star Advertiser poll regarding the -corruption in the Legislature, 90% of readers responded that it was the "Tip of the iceberg; not as rare as we hope." Holding fundraiser and receiving communications during the legislative session from a legislator to donate to their re-election campaign feels like legislators are encouraging "pay-to-play".

Limiting contributions during the legislative session occurs in over half of the states across America. As of 2006, twenty-eight legislatures prohibit campaign contributions during legislative sessions (*See* States that Prohibit Campaign Contributions During Legislative Sessions National Conference of State Legislators, 2006). The following fifteen state prohibit on *any* contributions include: Alabama, Alaska, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, and Washington. The following thirteen states prohibit *only* on lobbyist contributions during session include: Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Minnesota, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Vermont, and Wisconsin.

Limiting fundraising during sessions is a first step to restoring public trust and we ask that you go further. Consider adding the following two amendments:

(1) In the current bill, add a single line "or shall solicit or accept any campaign contribution," which would read as follows:

During any regular session or special session including any extension of any regular session or special session and any recess days, holidays, and weekends, no legislator, or a person employed by or acting on behalf of a legislator, shall hold a fundraiser, <u>or shall solicit or accept any campaign contribution.</u>; and

(2) Also, add the language from the State of Utah (Utah Code 36-11-305) or something similar which makes it "unlawful" for persons to donate during a legislative session which would read as follows:

It is unlawful for any person, lobbyist, principal or political committee to make contributions to members of the legislature or the governor or to a [candidate] campaign committee of such a person during a legislative session

Adding the first amendment would further clarify that legislators are not to receive any contributions during sessions. Adding the second amendment would put the burden on contributors to ensure that campaign donations are done during the appropriate times. Pass SB555 with the amendments to help restore public confidence in our government and especially our Legislature.

Remember, "what is right is right, and what is wrong is wrong."

SB 555 SD1 - STRONG SUPPORT BANNING FUNDRAISERS DURING SESSION(S)

Aloha Chairs McKelvery and Nakashima, Vice Chairs, and Members of the Committees!

My name is Kat Brady and I am the Coordinator of Community Alliance on Prisons, a community initiative promoting smart justice policies in Hawai`i for more than two decades. This testimony is respectfully offered on behalf of the more than 3,993 Hawai`i individuals living behind bars¹ under the "care and custody" of the Department of Public Safety on any given day. We are always mindful that 1,110 of Hawai`i's imprisoned people are serving their sentences abroad -- thousands of miles away from their loved ones, their homes and, for the disproportionate number of incarcerated Kanaka Maoli, far, far from their ancestral lands.

Community Alliance on Prisons appreciated sharing our testimony in strong support of the proposed SD1 of SB 555 and we mahalo the committee for hearing this important measure. The proposed draft of this bill bans fundraisers during sessions. **We would also like to add a ban on any donations during legislative sessions that could influence the outcome of certain bills.**

Twenty-eight states place restrictions on giving and receiving campaign contributions during the legislative session². In some states, the ban applies only to contributions by lobbyists, principals and/or political committees; while other states have a general ban on contributions.

Community Alliance on prisons was shocked when the House leadership expressed surprise at the unethical behavior of its member(s). No one in the community expressed shock!

The unethical behavior of legislators deeply affects the community, yet we have been left out of discussions about ways to promote ethics and good government. The 'Commission' to look at ethics is operating in the dark. No public input and no public invited to the meetings.

How is the public to have any trust at all in government when bribery incidents happen and then the legislature appoints a black box commission to say they are addressing the problem. This just furthers the community's skepticism about government.

This is another missed opportunity for community engagement while the real problems with government are being discussed by a commission who are operating under the cover of legislatively-imposed darkness.

We urge the committee to pass SB 555 SD1 to demonstrate to the community that the legislature hears our pleas for ethical change.

Banning fundraisers and contributions during sessions is a good first step toward building trust in the community.
