In consideration of SENATE BILL 777, SENATE DRAFT 2 RELATING TO THE CRIMINAL DESTRUCTION OF TREES

Senate Bill 777, Senate Draft 2 proposes to establish a criminal statute for the criminal destruction of a tree on state or county property punishable as a misdemeanor. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure and offers comments.

Trees are critical for addressing the climate crisis. In addition to carbon sequestration, trees reduce ambient temperatures (urban heat island effect) and stormwater runoff, and provide wildlife habitat, human health, and quality of life benefits. New seedlings take years before they realize their full suite of ecological and human health benefits, but existing mature trees provide significant benefits now, underscoring their value and the importance of their protection.

Responding to the damage or destruction of trees offers an opportunity for education about the benefits of trees, which may minimize such activity in the future.

The Department suggests the following word changes **in bold** to accommodate undesired, invasive trees:

Original:

(5) This section shall not apply to any state or county employee acting within the scope of employment."

Suggested change:

(5) This section shall not apply to any state or county employee acting within the scope of employment or to any volunteer or service group that has permission to remove undesirable trees such as hazard trees, invasive trees, or trees harming cultural sites."

Comments:

We do need to protect our trees that sustain life as well as beautify our environment. However you might want to add some exceptions into this bill so that it would not apply, for example, to invasive trees such as albizia, if that tree presents a hazard to life or property, or to diseased trees, such as trees carrying rapid ohia death or other pathogens or pests that could infect other precious trees.
