DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) appreciates the

measure's intent and defers to the Hawaii Youth Commission and the Office of Youth Services.

PURPOSE: This bill clarifies that a majority of the members appointed to the Youth

Commission shall constitute a quorum to do business. Effective 12/31/2050. (SD1)

The SD1 amended the measure by:

- Deleting language that would have allowed the Youth Commission to appoint its own Executive Director; and
- (2) Inserting an effective date of December 31, 2050, to encourage further discussion.

The SD2 amended the measure with additional technical amendments.

The Department supports the mission of the Youth Commission, which is to advise the governor and Legislature on the effects of legislative policies, needs, assessments, priorities, programs, and budgets concerning the youth of the State per section 352D-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Revising the quorum will assist the Youth Commission's ability to make decisions and progress in its work.

Aloha e Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama, Members of the House Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs,

The Hawai'i State Youth Commission was first created through Act 106 in 2018, "to advise the governor and legislature on the effects of legislative policies, needs, assessments, priorities, programs, and budgets concerning the youth of the State." The Hawai'i State Youth Commission (HiYC) is in **STRONG SUPPORT** of **SB869 SD2**, Relating to the Youth Commission.

HiYC strongly supports amending section 352D-11, subsection (f) of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes to change the quorum requirements from eight to a *majority* of commission members in order to do business. This is because, in the past, the HiYC has seen some difficulty maintaining the quorum needed to conduct our mission and purpose. <u>Amending the definition of quorum to a *majority* of appointed members will enable the Hawai'i State Youth Commission to more easily fulfill its missions and tasks.</u>

There have been unforeseen conflicts and events, such as staggered start and end times for the terms of individual commissioners, which affects our ability to fill vacancies. This will be especially important in the coming months as several of the current commissioners will be ending their current terms (giving eligible commissioners the ability to go through the reappointment process again). Please **PASS** Senate Bill 869 Senate Draft 2 out of your committee.

With the fluctuation in the commissioners, changing to a majority vote is a better fit for our current situation.
