SCR 108, SD 1 AFFIRMING HAWAI'I'S ONGOING COMMITMENT TO THE GOALS OF THE PARIS CLIMATE AGREEMENT, THE UNITED NATIONS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS AND ENDORSEMENT OF THE FOSSIL FUEL NON-PROLIFERATION TREATY.

Chair Lowen and Vice Chair Marten, and Members of the Committees, the Hawai'i State Energy Office (HSEO) supports SCR 108, SD1, which affirm Hawai'i's ongoing commitment to the goals of the Paris Climate Agreement, the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals and endorsement of the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty.

UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, Michelle Bachelet, called on UN Member States to take bold actions to give prompt and real effect to the right to a clean, healthy, and sustainable environment described in resolution 48/13 passed by the Human Rights Council in February this year. In her plea, the High Commissioner described the triple planetary threats of climate change, pollution, and nature loss as the single greatest human rights challenge of our era¹. The resolution also underlines that the most vulnerable segments of the population are more acutely impacted.

UN HRC Resolution 48/13² is in alignment with the Hawai'i State Constitution Article XI Section 9. It also aligns with Senate Concurrent Resolution 44 (2021), which declared a climate emergency and called for a just clean energy transition to a

decarbonized economy, including action that is rooted in "the belief that people locally and around the world have the right to clean, healthy, and adequate air, water, and land, food, education, and shelter."

The Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty builds on the success of international campaigns to ban land mines and nuclear weapons by supporting a phase down of fossil fuel exploration and production consistent with a 1.5-degree Celsius global warming target in line with the Paris Agreement. In researching the Treaty, HSEO finds that the principles and actions it calls for are consistent with the above constitutional provision and concurrent resolution, as well as with Hawai'i's nation-leading laws to achieve a 100% renewable portfolio standard for electricity³, mitigate and adapt to climate change consistent with the Paris Agreement⁴, achieve net-negative greenhouse gas emissions⁵, and ending the use of coal in Hawai'i⁶.

Furthermore, HSEO believes that many of the actions the Treaty⁷ calls endorsers to undertake are already occurring in Hawai'i and consistent with state policies and activities, including:

- Publicly endorse the need for a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty or use language explicitly acknowledging the need for global cooperation and new agreements and treaties on transitioning from fossil fuels: e.g., "Call for enhanced and focused international cooperation and agreements to transition from the production of fossil fuels in line with 1.5 degrees warming and enable a globally just transition."
 - Hawai'i has already taken this action in form of language as used in the example.
- Join or convene with other governments as leading a club of countries focused on a globally just transition from fossil fuels, particularly on the elements requiring international action, cooperation, and support. This could be through existing

groups such as BOGA, new ones, or groups within existing forums (e.g., UNFCCC or UNGA).

- Hawai'i has already taken this action by participating in the UN
 Conference of Parties and by joining the Under2 Coalition, the Powering
 Past Coal Alliance, and the US Climate Alliance.
- Publicly endorse the need for a Global Registry of Fossil Fuels and support the idea that it should be hosted by an independent body such as UNEP.
 - While Hawai'i has not taken this action, a related step that Hawai'i has taken is the Legislature tasking HSEO with being a data clearinghouse that includes fossil fuels data.
- Include supply-side actions and plans for international cooperation on fossil fuel supply in submissions and proposals to the UNFCCC, including in their Nationally Determined Commitments.
 - Hawai'i has already supported international supply side actions and plans for international cooperation through activities such as joining the Powering Past Coal Alliance.
- Offer to use the good offices of the government or head of state to host a Global Commission, or global report, on the issue of the non-proliferation of fossil fuels.
 - Hawai'i has not undertaken this action but could host events to convene these discussions and further elevate Hawaii's leadership while simultaneously promoting renewable energy and tourism.
- Commit to the supply side policies listed above domestically, particularly a moratorium on new expansion.
 - Hawai'i has already undertaken this action through its renewable portfolio standards and coal ban laws.

For these reasons, HSEO supports Hawai'i joining the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty.

Aloha Chair Lowen, Vice Chair Marten, and Energy and Environmental Protection Committee members,

I am Co-Founder of the Hawaii chapter of 350.org, the largest international organization dedicated to fighting climate change. **350Hawaii.org strongly supports SCR108 SD1, and is proud our organization has formally endorsed the call for a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty** that would end new fossil fuel exploration and expansion, phase out existing production in line with the global commitment to limit warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius, and accelerate equitable transition plans.

This resolution affirms Hawaii's ongoing commitment to the goals of the Paris Climate Agreement, the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, and endorses the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty. Climate change, like nuclear weapons, is a major global threat. And let's be clear, **the main cause of the climate emergency is fossil fuels.** According to the United Nations IPCC report, coal, oil and gas are responsible for 86% of all carbon dioxide emissions in the past decade. Scientists have made clear that we must swiftly phase out fossil fuel use or face untold suffering. We no longer have the luxury to wait to take the necessary actions to drastically reduce our greenhouse gas emissions.

In the words of Joe Moeono-Kolio, Senior Pacific Advisor for the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty:

"Here in the Pacific, the calls for a treaty banning fossil fuels at source is one we have made for decades. Climate change is no longer a distant threat - it is here, and it is now our daily, lived reality. As I walk along the shores of my village, it is hard not to notice the shrinking shoreline, as the ocean laps at the places where I once played as a child. If you walk further along this route, you will come across my father's school, where he once played as a child, now completely underwater.

I cannot help but wonder what my own son will see, when he is old enough to walk these shores one day, whether he'll still be able to walk through the land of his ancestors like his father and those before him, or, having been forced to leave due to the continuing impact of sea level rise, whether one day he'll just have to read about it in a book. This is why we do this work. **The Fossil Fuel Treaty is now our last, best hope to secure the future and to halt the march into mutual catastrophe**."

On behalf of the Directors of the Hawai'i Forest Industry Association (HFIA), I encourage you to support SCR108, specifically asking that you urge the state and counties to endorse the Fossil Fuel Nonproliferation Treaty.

We know that as both a global community and a local one, we cannot continue to burn fossil fuels at our current rate without experiencing various extreme hardships. We also know that a clean energy transition presents global, and local opportunities. A clean energy transition and refusal to continue our reliance on fossil fuels offers us numerous benefits such as job creation, reduced green-house gas emissions, limiting or reducing future extreme weather events, limiting or reducing future infectious disease outbreaks, limiting or reducing the likelihood and frequency of future food and water shortages, limiting or reducing sea level rise, limiting or reducing the frequency and severity of coral bleaching events, limiting or reducing ecological degradation and loss of biodiversity... the list goes on. If its contents are carried out successfully good will come for the environment and people both globally and locally, here in Hawaii Nei.

Dear Honorable Chair Lowen, Vice Chair Marten, and Committee Members,

As a member of the Maui County Council and the Chair of the Climate Action, Resilience and Environment Committee, a member of the Local Government Advisory Committee to the United States Environmental Protection Agency, a member of ICLEI USA, and as a recent delegate to COP26, I work on the county, state, national and international levels to combat climate change and to protect the environment. I am haunted by the dire threats facing our communities, environment, and planet and the need for increasingly drastic action to protect them.

I support adopting SCR 108 SD1. It is unfortunate that it is necessary to further affirm Hawai'i's solidarity with the scientific community's consensus that human activities are the main driver of climate change, and that more progress has not been made to further the Paris Climate Agreement's goals and greenhouse gas reductions, etcetera. In 2019, the Maui County Council adopted Resolution 19-098, Joining the County Climate Coalition and Affirming the

County of Maui's Commitment to the Paris Climate Agreement, and in 2020, the Maui County Council adopted <u>Resolution 20-64</u>, Recognizing Earth Day's 50th Anniversary and Pledging to Continue Maui County's Efforts to Build Upon the Paris Climate Agreement. I wish Hawai'i and the world were further along in meeting the 2015 Paris Climate Agreement's goals, as the planet is now in <u>"code red for humanity"</u> according to the IPCC.

Once Maui County's budget work is completed, I intend to introduce a resolution to formally endorse the call for a Fossil Fuel Non-proliferation Treaty as resolved by SCR 108 SD1. I fully support the treaty's focus on non-proliferation, fair phase-out and just transition from fossil fuel production.

Hawai'i is famous for and uniquely dependent on our precious environmental beauty, and we should continue to be leaders in environmental protection. I urge you to recommend adoption of SCR 108 SD1.
