Chairs Gabbard and Wakai, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Misalucha, and Members of the Committees:

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) **supports the intent** of SCR 140/SR 124, which urges the State Sustainability Coordinator to work with the State and County film offices to develop protocols to ensure that film and television productions in Hawai'i are utilizing sustainable practices.

The State Sustainability Coordinator applauds the Senate's efforts with this policy proposal to encourage more sustainable, decarbonizing, and climate resilient practices for Hawai'i's film and television industry. Presently, the industry has established quite a few sustainability and climate resilient, decarbonizing, initiatives which have been practice for several years. The Producers Guild of America (PGA) for example, developed the PGA Green Initiative which led to the Sustainable Production Alliance (SPA), which is comprised of major studios. The Motion Picture Association (MPA) and Association of Film Commissioners International (AFCI) all have been engaged in related initiatives to reduce their carbon and waste footprint on location and in studio productions, including those in Hawai'i.

Moreover, current practices by the Sustainable Production Alliance (SPA) include encouraging the use of electric vehicles and installing infrastructure to support fleet electrification, the use of renewable diesel and other biofuels for productions, and reducing the carbon footprint of technological and software use. Likewise, the SPA has published multiple reports assessing the "Carbon Emissions of Film and Television Production," "Lights! Cameras! Clean Energy!," "Lifecycles Emissions of Film vs. Digital," as well as shares multiple case studies and video in integrating sustainability principles on set.

The State Sustainability Coordinator agrees and looks forward to working with the DBEDT Creative Industries Division, and our state and county film offices to support industry best practices in sustainability, decarbonization, and climate resilience here in Hawai'i.

To assist the State Sustainability Coordinator execute policies like SCR 140/SR124, the State Sustainability Coordinator looks forward to the Senate's support of the State Budget, HB 1600 HD 1, and

the Governor's proposed Executive Budget to provide additional staffing and operating funds to develop the Statewide Sustainability Branch beyond the 1 state employee presently staffed in the branch.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development and the State Sustainability Coordinator are committed the sustainable development and climate adaptation of the state to meet the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations of Hawai'i to meet their own needs. - ANT-MAN AND THE WASP
- MIKE AND DAVE NEED WEDDING DATES

- THE DESCENDANTS

Each studio has a Sustainability Officer. It would be very helpful if there were a link to a directory of local resources or similar guidance that the film offices could share with productions that would support and compliment their sustainability missions while in Hawaii.

SUSTAINABILITY IN FILM & TV PRODUCTION



Recognizing the need to better our climate and wanting to contribute to climate change, the film industry created SPA (Sustainable Production Alliance). They would start to pull together the tools and resources to guide Productions on a sustainable path.

SPA partnered with the PGA to do exactly that and have come up with The Green Production Guide (GPG). A complete guide offering vendors, resources, and plans to successfully bring down their environmental impact.



To calculate a Productions carbon footprint the GPG has created a Production Environmental Accounting Report (PEAR) and a Production Environmental Actions Check List to track each department on the ground through the Production process. Prep, Shoot, Wrap.

Many of the leading streaming services and majór Śtudios are not only in partnership, but have been a part of putting the GPG together implementing the very resources offered on more and more productions.

A few of these partners are: Amazon Studios, Disney, Fox, Netflix, NBCUniversal, Sony, ViacomCBS, and WarnerMedia.

To recognize excellence and to prove the GPG's recommendations work, the EMA (Environmental Media Association) awards companies with Green and Gold seals showing a Production has met sustainable criteria. This list is growing each year. See a list of 2020 recipients and the EMA website here:





A few changes most implemented: digital distribution, LED lighting, using real plates/cutlery instead of single use plastic, recycle bins, refillable water bottles, stop idling cars, using sustainable wood, reusing/repurposing sets, props, and wardrobe, source material and food from local vendors directly.
