Blue Planet Foundation **supports SCR 176**, which encourages collaboration with other subnational governments to support the global movement towards climate action. Unprecedented levels of collaboration and information-sharing will be needed to meet the global challenge of climate change if we hope to act in time to avoid its worst impacts.

In 2015, Hawai'i became the first state in the United States to set a goal to achieve 100% renewable energy. Today, more than a dozen states and territories have set their own targets for 100% clean energy. Now eight years into the implementation, Hawai'i's clean energy transition is unfolding in important and instructive ways.
