# On the following measure: S.C.R. 2, REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO CONDUCT A SUNRISE REVIEW OF THE CERTIFICATION AND REGULATION OF COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS

Chair Keohokalole, Chair Baker, and Members of the Committees:

My name is Ahlani Quiogue, and I am the Licensing Administrator of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) Professional and Vocational Licensing Division. The Department supports this resolution.

The purposes of this resolution are to request that the Auditor: (1) conduct a sunrise review of the certification of community health workers; and (2) submit findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2023.

The Department supports this resolution as this is measure remains compliant with Hawaii Revised Statues (HRS) section 26H-6, which requires that new regulatory measures being considered for enactment be referred to the State Auditory for a sunrise analysis. HRS section 26H-6 also requires that the Auditor's analysis shall set forth the probable effects of regulation, assess whether its enactment is consistent with the

legislative policies of the Hawaii Regulatory Licensing Reform Act, and assess alternative forms of regulation. The Department would like to avoid any regulation with requirements that would adversely impact existing community health workers and the communities they serve.

The Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI)¹ supports the intent of, with one requested amendment to SCR2, which requests the auditor to conduct a sunrise review of the certification and regulation of Community Health Workers (CHW).

Since 2017, HIPHI has convened a network of CHWs from across the state and a network of CHW allies dedicated to supporting CHWs. The long-term goal of most CHWs is to have services provided by CHWs to be reimbursable. This would likely provide for more job stability and better pay for CHWs. We believe that the sunrise review will provide the needed information regarding benefits, potential drawbacks, and costs related to certification and regulation for CHWs that is necessary to build a framework for the CHW profession. To strengthen the measure and allow proper consideration of the impact of certification on CHW's, HIPHI respectfully requests the Committee to insert language requiring the State Auditor to solicit and incorporate input from CHWs as part of the sunrise analysis.

Those who hold a certification for interpretation can assist with interpretation, and those who are not trained or hold certification are more comfortable finding interpretation services.
- We want to ensure that CHW input is included when conducting the sunrise review, and
- Considerations are made regarding potential cost burdens to CHWs resulting from the certification.

RE: SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 2, REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO CONDUCT A SUNRISE REVIEW OF THE CERTIFICATION AND REGULATION OF COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS.

Chair Keohokalole, Chair Baker, and Members of the Joint Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 002, REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO CONDUCT A SUNRISE REVIEW OF THE CERTIFICATION AND REGULATION OF COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKERS.

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii's FQHCs. FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

This Concurrent Resolution would request the Auditor to conduct a sunrise review of the certification and regulation of community health workers as proposed by Senate Bill No. 2882, Senate Draft 1, Regular Session 2022.

Community Health Workers (CHWs) have long been active health care providers in rural and underprivileged communities throughout the State. However, because this profession is not licensed by the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, in accordance with Section 26H-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, among others, their services are not reimbursable under private nor public insurance. This has greatly diminished the services that they can provide, especially in areas that are experiencing a critical lack of health care professionals to provide basic services for our citizens.

During the interim prior to the 2022 Regular Session, the HPCA participated in a series of meetings organized by Senate Majority Leader Dru Kanuha with representatives from DCCA, the Department of Health, and various stakeholders, including CHWs, to investigate the feasibility of establishing professional regulation for CHWs. These discussions were extremely productive in fostering common understanding of the issues surrounding CHWs and the need for more diverse health care and human services in underprivileged and isolated communities.

The enactment of such legislation faces numerous challenges:

- (1) The "sunrise" of a new professional regulatory scheme requires going through a two-year process of adopting a Concurrent Resolution calling for a sunrise analysis on the need for regulation followed the next year with the enactment of the statutory provisions;
- (2) Even if licensure requirements are established, discussions with the insurers are needed to ensure that the CHW scope of practice will be included as part of contract law for reimbursement for services to be allowed. Only with their acceptance would CHW services be reimbursable;
- (3) For Medicaid reimbursement, CHW scope of practice would have to be integrated into the State Medicaid Plan, which would also require approval by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services;
- (4) Each regulatory program must be self-sustaining. As such, are there a sufficient number of CHWs in Hawaii to justify regulation and what fees would be levied to regulate this new profession? If there are only a few CHWs, the licensure or certification fees will likely be very expensive; and
- (5) For persons currently employed on the neighbor islands, if regulation should include educational or training requirements for certification or licensure, are there sufficient places of higher learning on these islands where current employees are able to obtain the necessary education and training needed for certification or licensure? If not, then certification or licensure would effectively force many good employees out of their profession.

While the HPCA greatly appreciated the opportunity to participate in these discussions, we note the absence of representatives from the insurance industry and the University of Hawaii System or other institutions of higher learning.

Pursuant to these meetings, the HPCA had discussions with DCCA to share our concerns for the plight of existing CHWs at FQHCs. These employees are key members of our teams. <u>It would truly be unfortunate if in our mutual and sincere desire to promote the credentials of this profession, we inadvertently force many loyal, hardworking, and essential workers out of their jobs.</u>

DCCA assured the HPCA that they too share these concerns and will proceed cautiously should the Legislature choose to proceed with this Legislation.

Ultimately, the HPCA defers to your wisdom on the best approach in expanding the reach of CHWs throughout the State. The HPCA continues to assert that CHWs are well skilled professionals that can perform an array of essential services. The HPCA stands committed to participating in the discussions with Senator Kanuha and willing to serve as a resource as this issue moves forward.

I was also elected as Vice Chair for the Hawai`i CHW Association Leadership Council. I am testifying in support for SCR2, requesting the auditor to conduct a sunrise review of the certification and regulation of Community Health Workers.

Conducting a sunrise review would give CHWs a better picture on how a certification process would affect or benefit our workforce. I feel an analysis should take place before any certification process is even considered for CHWs. I would recommend that if SCR2 passes that the analysis be conducted involving the voices of all CHWs in Hawai'i, as it is our workforce that will ultimately be affected. I would also like to see how this review will address the burden of cost, if any, to CHWs if a certification process is put in place as CHWs tend to earn less than traditional health care workers.

Aloha,

I have served the community of Hawaii County as a Community Service Worker/Community Health Worker for approximately 25 years. I have performed all facets of a Community Health/Service Worker including hands on direct services, community education/outreach, home visits/assessments, advocacy, obtaining and coordinating vital benefits and services for our elderly and disabled population and case management. I am testifying in support of SCR2 because I believe our State is very much in need of an established, recognized certification program that addresses the core roles and competencies of Community Health workers. I believe this is needed to further clarify Community Health Worker as a vocation, establish uniform guidelines and bring very long overdue recognition to the vital contribution the role of a Community Health Worker plays to individuals, families, our communities, our health care and

service systems. I am also hopeful that a recognized certification would help to encourage consistent and stable sources of funding for these positions.

As stated above; Community Health Workers help individuals, families, and communities to enhance access to benefits and health care services. This, in turn, allows our health care systems and various service agencies to become more effective and efficient. Community Health Care Workers are the vital link providing a wide range of services including, but not limited to, outreach, home visits, education, client-centered counseling, case management and advocacy. The work Community Health Workers preform reduces persistent inequalities, especially within disadvantaged populations.

The American Public Health Association along with researchers and advocates adopted an official definition of Community Health Workers during their annual meeting in 2009:

"A Community Health Worker (CHW) is a frontline public health worker who is a trusted member of and/or has an usually close understanding of the community served. This trusting relationship enable the CHW to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between health/social services and the community to facilitate access to services and improve the quality and cultural competence of service delivery. A CHW also builds individual and community capacity by increasing health knowledge and self-sufficiency through a range of activities such as outreach, community education, informal counseling, social support and advocacy (APHA 2009)"

In conclusion, I am in support of SCR2 in hopes that a review of the certification and regulation of Community Health Workers will allow The Legislature of the State of Hawaii to enact a Bill to establish a suitable and statewide accepted Community Health Worker Certification Program.
