S.C.R. 60/S.R. 55 - PROVIDING GREATER PUBLIC ACCESS TO THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS BY ADOPTING RULES TO ALLOW FOR VIRTUAL TESTIMONY, HEARING RECORDINGS, AND INTERNET BROADCASTS

The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO strongly supports the purpose and intent of S.C.R. 60 and S.R. 55 which expresses the Legislature's commitment to providing greater public access to the legislative process by adopting rules to allow for virtual testimony and recorded and broadcasted hearings.

The COVID-19 worldwide pandemic has fundamentally changed how we can and should operate. We have long supported measures and resolutions that increase the public's access to the legislative process and are pleased that the Legislature was able to pivot quickly to allow for virtual testifying and broadcasted hearings. Due to the fast-paced legislative timetable, it is often a severe financial hardship for neighbor island residents to actively participate in our democratic process. For example, when the Legislature was considering the privatization of the Maui Region of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, employees had to take time off work, purchase airline tickets - often with only 48-hours' notice - and arrange ground transportation to attend and testify in committee hearings. Many of our members chose to expend their valuable time and money to share their expertise and ensure their voices were heard, but we firmly believe many more would have taken advantage of remote testimony technology. We are confident that this same situation is all too familiar for too many neighbor island residents, regardless of the issue at hand. The continuation of virtual testifying and broadcasting hearings will ensure equal access to committee hearings no matter where a Hawaii resident resides.

The public also appreciated being able to review recorded hearings, sessions, and informational briefings when not able to watch the proceedings live. Archiving the hearings, sessions, and informational briefings has been critical to legislative transparency and accountability.

I support each house of the Legislature continuing to provide greater public access to the legislative process for the people of Hawaii "by adopting rules allowing virtual testimony, recorded hearings, and hearings broadcasted via the Internet, consistent with those that were implemented during the COVID-19 pandemic, be continued as a regular practice."
