A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AQUATIC RESOURCES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's aquatic 2 resources are of significant economic, ecologic, cultural, and aesthetic importance to agriculture, tourism, food production, 3 and fisheries in the State. The legislature recognizes the 4 importance of managing and conserving Hawaii's aquatic resources 5 and ecosystem for present and future generations. Careful 6 stewardship and protection of Hawaii's aquatic resources are 7 8 essential to the well-being of the State. 9 The purpose of this Act is to strengthen the penalties for 10 violations of the State's aquatic resources law by: 11 (1)Establishing a tiered administrative fine system for 12 each specimen of aquatic life taken, killed, or 13 injured; 14 (2)Establishing a criminal fine structure on a per-15 specimen basis for violations involving aquatic life; 16 Authorizing the department of land and natural (3) 17 resources to recommend community service that benefits

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1 the resource damaged when a person is ordered to 2 perform community service in lieu of a fine; and 3 Authorizing the department of land and natural (4) resources to recommend to the court that defendants be 4 5 restricted from entering specific geographical areas 6 where aquatic resources may be found, including ocean 7 waters, estuaries, rivers, and streams. 8 SECTION 2. Section 187A-12.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended by amending subsections (d) and (e) to read as follows: 10 [In addition to subsection (b), a fine of up to "(d) 11 $\frac{55,000}{100}$ A fine in addition to the fine under subsection (b) may 12 be levied for each specimen of threatened or endangered aquatic 13 life taken, killed, or injured in violation of subtitle 5 of 14 title 12 or any rule adopted thereunder [-] as follows: 15 For a first violation, up to \$5,000 or the retail (1)16 market value of the specimen, whichever is higher; 17 (2) For a second violation, up to \$10,000 or the retail 18 market value of the specimen, whichever is higher; and 19 (3) For a third or subsequent violation, up to \$15,000 or 20 the retail market value of the specimen, whichever is 21 higher.

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1	(e) [In addition to subsection (c), a fine of up to
2	\$1,000] A fine in addition to the fine under subsection (c) may
3	be levied for each specimen of all other aquatic life taken,
4	killed, or injured in violation of subtitle 5 of title 12 or any
5	rule adopted thereunder $[-,]$ as follows:
6	(1) For a first violation, up to \$1,000 or the retail
7	market value of the specimen, whichever is higher;
8	(2) For a second violation, up to \$2,000 or the retail
9	market value of the specimen, whichever is higher; and
10	(3) For a third or subsequent violation, up to \$3,000 or
11	the retail market value of the specimen, whichever is
12	higher."
13	SECTION 3. Section 187A-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended to read as follows:
15	"§187A-13 General penalty; community service. (a) Any
16	person violating this chapter or any rule adopted thereunder for
17	which a penalty is not otherwise provided, shall be guilty of a
18	petty misdemeanor and, in addition to any other penalties, shall
19	be fined not less than:
20	(1) \$250 for a first offense;
21	(2) \$500 for a second offense; and

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1	(3) \$1,000 for a third or subsequent offense.	
2	(b) A fine in addition to the fine under subsection (a)	
3	may be levied for each specimen of aquatic life taken, killed,	
4	or injured in violation of this chapter or any rule adopted	
5	thereunder as follows:	
6	(1) For a first offense, up to \$250 or the retail market	
7	value of the specimen, whichever is higher;	
8	(2) For a second offense, up to \$500 or the retail market	
9	value of the specimen, whichever is higher; and

14	amended to read as follows:

18	petty mis	demeanor and, in addition to any other penalties, shall
19	be fined	no less than:
20	(1)	\$100 for a first offense;
21	(2)	\$200 for a second offense; and

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1	(3)	\$500 for a third or subsequent offense.
2	(b)	A fine in addition to the fine under subsection (a)
3	may be lev	vied for each specimen of aquatic life taken, killed,
4	or injured	d in violation of this chapter or any rule adopted

18	than \$1,00	00. Notwithstanding section 706-669 and any other law

4 defendant to complete an aquatic resources educational class
5 administered by the department of land and natural resources in
6 addition to or in lieu of paying all or any part of any monetary
7 fine authorized by this section.

8 [(d)] (e) The environmental court may direct the defendant 9 to perform community service as administered by the department 10 of land and natural resources in lieu of paying any monetary 11 fine authorized by this section [-]; provided that if community 12 service is ordered pursuant to this subsection, the department 13 may recommend to the environmental court an order of community 14 service that benefits the resource that was damaged. 15 (f) The department may recommend to the environmental 16 court that the defendant be sentenced to probation with 17 probationary terms and conditions consistent with sections 706-18 623 and 706-624, including but not limited to restrictions on: 19 (1) Entering specific geographical areas where aquatic 20 resources may be found, including ocean waters, 21 estuaries, rivers, and streams;

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1 (2) Engaging in certain or all fishing activities; and 2 (3) Handling, operating, or possessing certain fishing 3 gear or boating equipment." 4 SECTION 5. Section 189-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended to read as follows: 6 "§189-4 Penalties. (a) Any person violating any of the 7 provisions of this chapter for which a penalty is not otherwise 8 provided, or any rule of the department adopted thereunder, 9 shall be quilty of a petty misdemeanor and punishable as 10 provided in subsection (b); provided that in the case of a 11 corporation violating any of the provisions, only the fine shall 12 be imposed, but any officer of the corporation who wilfully 13 procures or permits the violation of the provisions by the 14 corporation shall be punishable as in the case of an individual 15 violating the same. The punishment, in addition to any other penalties, 16 (b) 17 shall be a fine of not less than: 18 (1)\$250 for a first offense; 19 (2) \$500 for a second offense; and 20 (3) \$1,000 for a third or subsequent offense.

(a) Any person violating this chapter, 6 any rule adopted pursuant thereto, or the terms and conditions 7 of any permit issued under section 190-4, shall be guilty of a 8 petty misdemeanor and punished as provided in subsections (b) 9 $\left[\frac{\text{and } (c)}{c}\right]$, (c), and (d). 10 (b) The punishment, in addition to any other penalties, shall be a fine of not less than: 11 \$250 for a first offense; 12 (1)13 (2) \$500 for a second offense; and 14 \$1,000 for a third or subsequent offense. (3) 15 (c) A fine in addition to the fine under subsection (b) 16 may be levied for each specimen of aquatic life taken, killed, or injured in violation of this chapter or any rule adopted 17 thereunder as follows: 18 19 (1) For a first offense, up to \$250 or the retail market 20 value of the specimen, whichever is higher;

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1 (2) For a second offense, up to \$500 or the retail market value of the specimen, whichever is higher; and 2 (3) For a third or subsequent offense, up to \$1,000 or the 3 retail market value of the specimen, whichever is 4 5 higher. 6 $\left[\frac{1}{1}\right]$ (d) The court may require the defendant to complete an aquatic resources educational class administered by the 7 department of land and natural resources in addition to or in 8 9 lieu of paying all or any part of any monetary fine authorized 10 by this section. $\left[\frac{}{}\left(\frac{}{}\right)\right]$ (e) The court may allow the defendant to perform 11 community service as administered by the department of land and 12 natural resources in lieu of paying any monetary fine authorized 13 14 by this section [-]; provided that if community service is 15 ordered pursuant to this subsection, the department may 16 recommend to the court an order of community service that 17 benefits the resource that was damaged. 18 The department may recommend to the court that the (f) 19 defendant be sentenced to probation with probationary terms and 20 conditions consistent with sections 706-623 and 706-624, 21 including but not limited to restrictions on:

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1	(1)	Entering specific geographical areas where aquatic

3		estuaries, rivers, and streams;
4	(2)	Engaging in certain or all fishing activities; and
5	<u>(3)</u>	Handling, operating, or possessing certain fishing
6		gear or boating equipment."
7	SECT	ION 7. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
8	matured,	penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
9	begun bef	ore its effective date.

12	SECT	ION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
