
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SEX TRAFFICKING PREVENTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that sex trafficking is a
2 form of modern-day slavery. According to a 2018 report
3 published by Arizona state university and the Hawaii state
4 commission on the status of women, one out of every eleven adult
5 males living in Hawaii is an online sex shopper. The report
6 also estimated that there were 74,362 potential sex buyers in
7 Hawaii. Moreover, during the COVID-19 pandemic, a service
8 provider for sex trafficking victims in Hawaii reported seeing a
9 three hundred per cent increase in demand for services, which
10 included trauma-informed care.

11 The legislature further finds that education ends
12 exploitation. By empowering students to protect themselves from
13 harm and build healthy relationships, training school staff in
14 how to respond to at-risk youth in a trauma-informed manner, and
15 creating sexual health programs that include information about
16 sex trafficking, schools can equip students with the knowledge



1 and skills needed to prevent themselves from becoming victims of
2 sexual exploitation as minors and upon reaching adulthood.

3 The purpose of this Act is to protect Hawaii's public
4 school students from sexual exploitation by requiring the
5 department of education to offer training to teachers and school
6 staff on how to prevent and respond to potential cases of sex
7 trafficking.

8 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
10 and to read as follows:

11 "§302A- Sex trafficking prevention training. (a) The
12 department shall offer training for teachers, educational
13 officers, and school-based behavioral health specialists on sex
14 trafficking prevention and response, including:

- 15 (1) Methods used to lure children into sex trafficking;
16 (2) Identifying victims of sex trafficking;
17 (3) Effects of sex trafficking on a victim's social,
18 mental, and physical health;
19 (4) Impact of sex trafficking on children of different
20 racial and ethnic backgrounds, sexual orientations,
21 and gender identities;



- 1 (5) Strategies to assist in the prevention of sex
2 trafficking of children;
- 3 (6) Trauma-informed strategies for responding to victims
4 of sex trafficking;
- 5 (7) Informational resources for victims of sex
6 trafficking;
- 7 (8) Information on victim service providers that provide
8 services to students who have been identified as
9 victims of sex trafficking or who are at risk of
10 victimization; and
- 11 (9) Information about the importance of enthusiastic
12 consent in preventing sex trafficking and sexual
13 violence.
- 14 (b) At the beginning of each school year, explanatory
15 information about protocols that the department has approved for
16 providing services to victims of sex trafficking shall be made
17 available to teachers, educational officers, and school-based
18 behavioral health specialists.
- 19 (c) The department may coordinate and contract with any
20 state or county department or agency, any victim service



1 provider, or any other expert in the field of sex trafficking
2 prevention and response to implement this section.

3 (d) As used in this section, "victim service provider"
4 means any non-governmental organization that provides direct
5 intervention, social, medical, mental health, legal, case
6 management, educational, emergency, or housing services to
7 victims of sex trafficking."

8 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.

9 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
