A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO IDENTIFICATION CARDS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the federal REAL ID 2 Act of 2005, P.L. 109-13, requires states to comply with 3 federally mandated eligibility criteria in issuing driver's 4 licenses and identification cards, which are often referred to as "REAL ID compliant". However, the REAL ID Act specifically 5 allows states to issue driver's licenses and identification 6 cards that do not comply with the requirements of the REAL ID 7 8 Act.

9 The legislature recognizes that many residents who are 10 young adults, elderly persons, houseless persons, undocumented 11 immigrants, or lawfully present non-immigrants do not drive and 12 are also unable to meet the stringent requirements for a REAL 13 ID-compliant identification card. These residents are therefore 14 unable to access state-issued identification.

15 The legislature further finds that the coronavirus disease
16 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic has exacerbated the already difficult,
17 but necessary, process of proving one's identity. Restaurants,



theaters, public libraries, and other public venues now require
 valid proof of vaccination and identity for entry. Before the
 COVID-19 pandemic, state office buildings, including the Queen
 Liliuokalani and Princess Ruth Keelikolani buildings, required
 valid proof of identity for entry.

6 The legislature notes that pursuant to Act 172, Session 7 Laws of Hawaii 2015, the limited purpose driver's license, 8 limited purpose provisional driver's license, and limited 9 purpose instruction permit were made available to individuals 10 who otherwise satisfy the requirements for a driver's license, 11 provisional driver's license, or instruction permit except for 12 the individual's inability or refusal to provide satisfactory 13 proof of authorized presence in the United States under federal The legislature believes that a similar limited purpose 14 law. 15 identification card would benefit the residents of the State by: 16 (1)Helping emergency personnel, including police and 17 emergency response teams, to better identify persons in distress and other persons that these emergency 18 19 personnel encounter; 20 (2) Providing access to public services to individuals

21 previously unable to obtain a government-issued

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1		identification card, including having prescriptions
2		filled; picking up packages at post offices; and
3		enjoying kamaaina discounts at museums, hotels, and
4		public parks, including Hanauma Bay;
5	(3)	Promoting public safety by easing many undocumented
6		immigrants' fears of interacting with law enforcement
7		while lacking valid identification; and
8	(4)	Providing access to financial services offered by, and
9		allowing more residents to open accounts at, banks
10		that honor state identification cards, which will, in
11		turn:
12		(A) Increase the personal safety of these residents
13		as they will no longer have to personally carry
14		large amounts of cash; and
15		(B) Make these residents less reliant on
16		check-cashing businesses that may charge fees of
17		up to five per cent or \$5 per transaction.
18	Ассо	rdingly, the purpose of this Act is to authorize the
19	issuance	of limited purpose identification cards for individuals
20	who other	wise satisfy the requirements for a government-issued
21	identific	ation card except for the individual's inability or

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1 refusal to provide satisfactory proof of authorized presence in 2 the United States under federal law. 3 SECTION 2. Chapter 286, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended by adding a new section to part XVI to be appropriately 5 designated and to read as follows: 6 "§286- Limited purpose identification cards. (a) 7 Every person who submits an application for an identification 8 card that satisfies the requirements of this part except for the 9 applicant's inability or refusal to provide satisfactory proof 10 of authorized presence in the United States under federal law 11 shall be issued a limited purpose identification card that is 12 uniquely identified as being not in compliance with the REAL ID 13 Act of 2005. The examiner of drivers shall accept various types 14 of documentation for the purpose of establishing the applicant's 15 identity and residency in the State, which may be established by 16 more than one document. Acceptable documentation includes: 17 (1) A valid, unexpired consular identification document 18 issued by a consulate from the applicant's country of 19 citizenship or a valid, unexpired passport from the 20 applicant's country of citizenship;

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1	(2)	An original birth certificate or other proof of age,
2		as designated by the examiner of drivers;
3	(3)	A current home utility bill, lease, or rental
4		agreement, or deed or title to real property in the
5		State, as designated by the examiner of drivers;
6	(4)	A United States Department of Homeland Security Form
7		I-589, Application for Asylum and for Withholding of
8		Removal;
9	(5)	An official school or college transcript that includes
10		the applicant's date of birth or a foreign school
11		record that is sealed and includes a photograph of the
12		applicant at the age the record was issued;
13	(6)	An official school or college identification card that
14		includes the applicant's full name and a photograph of
15		the applicant at the time the identification was
16		issued;
17	(7)	A United States Department of Homeland Security Form
18		<u>I-20 or Form DS-2019;</u>
19	(8)	A United States Customs and Immigration Services
20		Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival Approval Letter;
21	(9)	A valid identification card for health benefits;

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1	(10)	A valid identification card for an assistance or
2		social services program;
3	(11)	A current voter registration card issued by the State;
4	(12)	A wage stub issued in the last six months;
5	(13)	An income tax return filed in the last two years;
6	(14)	A social security card;
7	(15)	One of the following documents which, if in a language
8		other than English, shall be accompanied by a
9		certified translation or an affidavit of translation
10		into English:
11		(A) Marriage license or divorce certificate;
12		(B) Foreign federal electoral photo card issued on or
13		after January 1, 1991;
14		(C) Foreign student identification card; or
15		(D) Foreign driver's license; or
16	(16)	Other proof of Hawaii residency as designated by the
17		director.
18	(b)	Every application under this section shall be made
19	upon the	form and in the manner required by section 286-303 and
20	shall be	accompanied by the fee established for non-limited

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1	purpose i	identification cards pursuant to section 286-309. The
2	examiner	of drivers shall not:
3	(1)	Require any applicant under this section to furnish
4		information regarding the applicant's eligibility or
5		ineligibility for a social security number; or
6	(2)	Disclose the identity of any applicant who does not
7		provide a social security card or social security
8		number.
9	(c)	Every limited purpose identification card issued
10	pursuant	to this section shall on its face and in a machine
11	readable	zone bear the phrase, "Not acceptable for official
12	federal p	purposes", and be of a unique design or color indication
13	that clea	arly distinguishes the limited purpose identification
14	card from	n the State's federally compliant identification cards.
15	If the Ur	nited States Department of Homeland Security determines
16	that any	limited purpose identification card issued pursuant to
17	this sect	tion do not satisfy the requirements of title 6 Code of
18	Federal H	Regulations section 37.71, the examiner of drivers,
19	under the	e direction of the department of transportation, shall
20	modify th	ne limited purpose identification card issued pursuant
21	to this s	section; provided that the limited purpose



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1	identification card shall only be modified to the extent
T	Identification card shall only be modified to the extent
2	necessary to satisfy the requirements of the federal law.
3	(d) Every limited purpose identification card shall expire
4	in accordance with section 286-306.
5	(e) A limited purpose identification card may be renewed
6	in accordance with section 286-306.
7	(f) It shall be a violation of law to discriminate against
8	a person because the person applied for, was denied, was issued,
9	holds, or presents a limited purpose identification card.
10	(g) A limited purpose identification card issued pursuant
11	to this section shall not be used to consider a person's
12	citizenship or immigration status as a basis for a criminal
13	investigation, arrest, or detention.
14	(h) Documents and information collected pursuant to an
15	application for, denial of, or issuance of a limited purpose
16	identification card shall be confidential and shall not be
17	disclosed by the examiner of drivers or the department of
18	transportation except as required by law.
19	(i) The director shall adopt rules in accordance with
20	chapter 91 to implement this section."
21	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
