A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE COMMERCIAL SEXUAL EXPLOITATION OF CHILDREN.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that children in the 2 State are vulnerable to sex trafficking and commercial sexual 3 exploitation. Foster children and runaways with histories of abuse and neglect are at particularly high risk. LGBTQ+ youth, 4 5 immigrants, undocumented workers, and young people suffering 6 from mental illnesses and substance abuse issues are also highly 7 vulnerable. Victims are often lured into sex trafficking 8 through emotional manipulation and control, force, fraud, or 9 threats. Sexually exploited children most often do not have the 10 ability or resources to escape their traffickers and start new 11 lives. 12 The legislature recognizes that, over the past decade, the 13 commercial sexual exploitation of children has garnered greater 14 attention in Hawaii and throughout the United States. Due to 15 reporting requirements under federal and state law, the 16 department of human services has received an increasing number 17 of hotline calls from witnesses or victims of child sex

- 1 trafficking. However, because child sex trafficking is covert,
- 2 it is difficult to accurately measure the scope of the problem,
- 3 and exploited youth may not identify themselves as victims.
- 4 The legislature believes that the statewide human
- 5 trafficking coordinator, a position established within the
- 6 department of the attorney general in May 2020, plays a vital
- 7 function in the department's multidisciplinary approach to
- 8 improving the State's anti-trafficking response.
- 9 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require the
- 10 department of the attorney general to provide annual reports to
- 11 the legislature on specified data pertaining to the commercial
- 12 sexual exploitation of children.
- 13 SECTION 2. Chapter 28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 14 by adding a new section to part I to be appropriately designated
- 15 and to read as follows:
- 16 "\$28- Commercial sexual exploitation of children;
- 17 annual report. (a) No later than twenty days prior to the
- 18 convening of each regular session, the department shall submit a
- 19 report to the legislature containing data specific to the
- 20 commercial sexual exploitation of children that covers the
- 21 immediately preceding fiscal year, including the following:

1	(6)	The identification of any gaps in the State's ability
2		to collect relevant data; and
3	<u>(7)</u>	Recommendations for improving data collection and data
4		sharing among service providers, non-governmental
5		organizations, and government agencies, including law
6		enforcement agencies.
7	(b)	Every public official and every state and county
8	departmen	t or agency, as applicable, shall:
9	(1)	Share information with and provide all necessary
10		assistance and cooperation to the department within
11		the jurisdictional authority of the respective
12		official, department, or agency; and
13	(2)	Assist the department in carrying out its duties under
14		this section.
15	<u>(c)</u>	As used in this section:
16	<u>"Chi</u>	ld" means a person under eighteen years of age.
17	"Com	mercial sexual exploitation of children" means any
18	sexual ac	tivity involving a child for the exchange or promise of
19	anything	of value by any person.
20	"Con	firmed victim" means a child who has been identified by
21	a state-a	pproved validated assessment tool as a victim of sex

1	trafficking or severe forms of trafficking in persons as defined
2	in section 350-1.
3	"Department" means the department of the attorney general.
4	"Suspected victim" means a child who is reasonably believed
5	to be a victim of sex trafficking or severe forms of trafficking
6	in persons as defined under section 350-1, but who has not been
7	identified as a confirmed victim."
8	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
9	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
10	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for
11	the department of the attorney general to fulfill the annual
12	reporting requirements of this Act.
13	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
14	the attorney general for the purposes of this Act.
15	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
16	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.
