A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to require the
 department of education to provide grants for the planning and
 implementation of community schools through a five-year pilot
 program to:

5	(1)	Ensure high-quality educational opportunities and
6		improved educational outcomes for all students through
7		investment in full-service community schools;
8	(2)	Support and fund the planning, development,
9		implementation, and evaluation of community schools;
10	(3)	Elevate community schools as a comprehensive solution
11		to problems facing public schools, especially in low-
12		income, rural, and Native Hawaiian communities;
13	(4)	Document and evaluate lessons learned from community
14		school programs to develop a set of best practices to
15		be shared locally, statewide, and nationwide;
16	(5)	Elevate community schools as an important component of
17		a viable long-term equity strategy that accelerates

1 propose to work with one another to plan or implement, or both, 2 community school programming. 3 "Community school coordinator" means an individual who is 4 responsible for aligning programming with the needs of the school community identified in the baseline analysis. 5 "Community school programming" means the services, 6 activities, and opportunities as described under section 5(f)(3) 7 8 of this Act. 9 "Consortium" means a group consisting of one or more 10 schools. (4) A public school that has been identified for
 comprehensive support and improvement, targeted
 support and improvement, or otherwise has been
 identified by the State as a school in need of
 additional support.

6 "Lead partner agency" means the organization that joins a 7 school to manage and lead the work of developing and sustaining 8 the community school.

9 "Pillars of community schools" means all of the following:
10 (1) Integrated student supports for the students of a
11 community school that address out-of-school barriers
12 to learning through partnerships with social and
13 health service agencies and providers and coordinated
14 by a community school coordinator;

15 (2) Expanded and enriched learning time and opportunities,
16 including evidence-based strategies including before17 school, after-school, during-school, weekend, and
18 summer programs that provide additional academic
19 instruction, individualized academic support,
20 enrichment activities, or learning opportunities, for
21 students of a community school;

Active family and community engagement that brings

11		this Act, awarded up to \$88,000 for each eligible
12		school to be served under the grant; or
13	(2)	Implementation grants, as described in section 5 of
14		this Act, awarded up to \$200,000 per year for each
15		eligible school to be served under the grant.

17	planning.	(a) The department shall establish a five-year
18	community	school pilot program and make grants available to plan
19	for commu	nity schools. The pilot program shall terminate on
20	June 30,	2027.

14		physical and mental health, or additional information
15		connected to the pillars of community schools;

1 (e) Community school planning grants may be awarded of up 2 to \$88,000. Grantees unready to implement programming 3 immediately shall use their grant funds for up to one year of 4 planning. Once the plan is complete or at the end of the one-5 year period, the grantee shall submit a community school plan to the department as described in subsection (f) of section 5 of 6 7 this Act. If the grantee decides not to use planning funds, the 8 community school plan shall be submitted with the application.

9 (f) A grantee shall establish a school leadership team 10 responsible for developing school-specific programming goals, 11 baseline analyses, assessing program needs, and overseeing the 12 process of implementing expanded programming at each covered 13 school site.

(g) The school leadership team shall have ongoing responsibility for monitoring the development and implementation of community school operations and programming at the school site and shall issue recommendations on a quarterly basis and summarized in an annual report to the department. The reports shall also be made available to the public at the school site and on school and district websites.

1 (h) Upon award of a community school implementation grant, 2 the lead partner agency shall hire a full-time community school 3 coordinator to coordinate services at each covered school site. If proposing to serve three or more school sites, the lead 4 partner agency shall also hire a program director to coordinate 5 6 activities across covered school sites. Program directors and 7 community school coordinators shall work collaboratively with 8 school leadership and school leadership teams to provide the 9 services and programs that meet school and community needs and 10 priorities.

SECTION 5. Community school pilot program; grants;
implementation. (a) The department shall make community
schools implementation grants of up to \$200,000 a year available
to implement a community school's strategy, subject to the
availability of funding.

(b) An application process shall be used in awarding grants. Proposals shall be evaluated on the basis of criteria consistent with this section and other factors adopted by the department. Grants shall be made for a term of up to five years and shall be renewable at the discretion of the department and subject to the availability of funding. Before using grant

Before using grant funding awarded pursuant to this 13 (f) 14 section, the grantee shall provide to the department a community school plan. For schools that apply for the planning grant, the 15 16 community school plan shall be submitted no later than the end of the first year. The community school plan shall detail the 17 18 steps the grantee and partners shall take to integrate community 19 school programing at the school site and include plans for: (1) A baseline analysis of community assets; 20
