A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII PUBLIC PROCUREMENT CODE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that state and county
- 2 agencies charged with natural resource management are
- 3 underfunded, understaffed, and unable to fully address
- 4 management, restoration, and climate resiliency needs associated
- 5 with the State's stressed natural resources, and in particular,
- 6 the State's watersheds and nearshore waters. The inability to
- 7 adequately manage those resources jeopardizes the State's food
- 8 and water security.
- 9 The legislature recognizes that article 11, section 1, of
- 10 the Hawaii State Constitution provides:
- 11 For the benefit of present and future
- 12 generations, the State and its political subdivisions
- shall conserve and protect Hawaii's natural beauty and
- 14 all natural resources, including land, water, air,
- 15 minerals and energy sources, and shall promote the
- 16 development and utilization of these resources in a

1	manner consistent with their conservation and in
2	furtherance of the self-sufficiency of the State.
3	All public natural resources are held in trust by
4	the State for the benefit of the people.
5	The legislature further finds that the State has not
6	successfully developed collaborative public-private partnerships
7	or governmental practices that increase the capacity urgently
8	needed to fulfill the State's natural resource stewardship
9	mandate. Collaborative approaches to natural resource
10	management that embrace community non-profits and their related
11	networks have proven to be effective in their capacity to
12	restore watersheds, increase food supplies, address systemic
13	inequities, develop green jobs, and enhance the State's economy.
14	The legislature acknowledges that collaborative networks
15	are eligible to pursue significant federal funding streams,
16	including grants through the department of land and natural
17	resources and United States Fish and Wildlife Service National
18	Coastal Wetlands Conservation Grant Program. However, the
19	legislature also finds that there have been instances where non-
20	profits have been informed that the state procurement system did

- 1 not allow for the distribution of funds to non-profits, even
- 2 though the grant had been approved.
- 3 The legislature finds that the state procurement system is
- 4 outdated, with limited options for providing funds to non-profit
- 5 organizations collaborating with governmental agencies on
- 6 projects, including those projects mandated by the Hawaii State
- 7 Constitution to meet the State's natural resource management
- 8 responsibilities.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to convene a working group
- 10 within the department of accounting and general services to
- 11 study and recommend improvements to the management of the state
- 12 procurement office and methods of procurement, particularly in
- 13 the area of natural resource management.
- 14 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a working group
- 15 within the department of accounting and general services for
- 16 administrative purposes. The working group shall consist of the
- 17 following members:
- 18 (1) The state comptroller or the comptroller's designee,
- 19 who shall serve as the chairperson of the working
- 20 group;

1	(2)	The administrator of the state procurement office or
2		the administrator's designee;
3	(3)	The chairperson of the state procurement policy board
4	(4)	The chairperson of the board of land and natural
5		resources or the chairperson's designee;
6	(5)	The attorney general or the attorney general's
7		designee; and
8	(6)	A member of the commission on water resource
9		management, excluding its chairperson, to be selected
10		by the commission.
11	(d)	The working group shall also invite:
12	(1)	A member of the non-profit community with a specialty
13		in natural resource management, designated by the
14		chairperson of the board of land and natural
15		resources; and
16	(2)	Any other entity, agency, or designee deemed
17		appropriate by the members of the working group.
18	(c)	The working group shall serve until it has
19	accomplis	hed the objectives of this Act or twenty days prior to
20	the conve	ning of the regular session of 2023, whichever occurs
21	first.	

1	(a)	The working group shall investigate improvements to
2	the manag	ement of the state procurement office and methods of
3	procureme	nt, particularly in the area of natural resource
4	managemen	t. The investigation shall also include but not be
5	limited t	o an examination of the following:
6	(1)	Ways to enhance procurement practices and policies
7		that include collaboration with non-profit
8		organizations with expertise and experience in natural
9		resource management;
10	(2)	Ways to reduce timeframes for review of proposals
11		targeting natural resource management, including water
12		restoration, food security, and climate resiliency;
13	(3)	Changes necessary in Hawaii law to streamline these
14		processes while maintaining high standards of ethical
15		procurement;
16	(4)	Expected benefits, financial or otherwise, that may
17		accrue to the State, as a result of such policy and
18		practice changes;
19	(5)	Identification and separation of pertinent issues for
20		purposes of drafting statutes and rules; and

1	(6) Any other objective deemed necessary by the state
2	comptroller or the comptroller's designee, or the
3	working group.
4	SECTION 3. The state comptroller or the comptroller's
5	designee, in consultation with the working group, shall submit
6	report to the legislature, including findings, recommendations,

 ${f 7}$ and proposed legislation no later than twenty days prior to the

8 convening of the regular session of 2023.

9 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
