### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii businesses 2 and residents pay among the highest electricity rates in the 3 nation, which exacerbates the State's already high cost of 4 living and increases the monthly financial burdens on businesses and residents. The legislature further finds that the high cost 5 of living in Hawaii reinforces the importance of adopting 6 7 policies that promote and encourage energy efficiency, which can 8 provide relief for families and businesses faced with high 9 utility bills. 10 Since 1980, the Federal Trade Commission has administered 11 the EnergyGuide labeling program aimed at assisting consumers in 12 understanding how much energy a given household appliance uses 13 and the ongoing energy costs associated with operating the 14 appliance. However, the EnergyGuide labels do not accurately 15 reflect the energy costs of appliances in Hawaii because the

labels are based on national average energy prices and national

average usage of appliances. Since electricity rates in Hawaii

- 1 are nearly triple the national average, the current in-store
- 2 labeling system does not accurately convey the costs and
- 3 potential savings associated with certain appliances when
- 4 operated in Hawaii. The legislature further finds that by
- 5 displaying information in retail stores about available rebates
- 6 and Hawaii-specific operating costs of certain appliances,
- 7 consumers can make informed decisions about which models most
- 8 align with their economic situation and preferences.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to require retailers of certain
- 10 household appliances to display signage with available rebates
- 11 and Hawaii-specific operating costs.
- 12 SECTION 2. Chapter 196, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended by adding a new section to part V to be appropriately
- 14 designated and to read as follows:
- 15 "§196- Signage for household appliances; retailers;
- 16 rebates. (a) All retailers of household appliances specified
- 17 in subsection (b) doing business in the State shall
- 18 conspicuously display signage or text that informs consumers of
- 19 the following:
- 20 (1) Available energy efficiency rebates funded by the
- 21 public utilities fee; and

16	(d)	The public benefits fee administrator shall update the

2		that have developed or may develop in the State and
3		consulting with state agency experts;
4	(4)	Promoting program initiatives, incentives, and market
5		strategies that address the needs of persons facing
6		the most significant barriers to participation;
7	(5)	Promoting coordinated program delivery, including
8		coordination with electric public utilities regarding
9		the delivery of low-income home energy assistance,
10		other demand-side management or energy-efficiency
11		programs, and any utility programs;
12	(6)	Consideration of innovative approaches to delivering
13		demand-side management and energy-efficiency services,
14		including strategies to encourage third-party
15		financing and customer contributions to the cost of
16		demand-side management and energy-efficiency services;

#### Report Title:

Retailers; Household Appliances; Energy Efficiency Rebates; Energy Costs; Signage

### Description:

Requires retailers of household appliances to conspicuously display available energy efficiency rebates funded by the public benefits fee and state-specific energy operation costs. Requires the public benefits fee administrator to create and update the template to be used by retailers. Requires the Hawaii state energy office to publish signage requirements for household appliances on its website and provide a draft notification letter to the administrator to be distributed to retailers. Effective 7/1/2050. (HD1)
