
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the 2020 outbreak of
2 the novel coronavirus, SARS-CoV-2, has brought renewed scrutiny
3 to the state's emergency management laws. The rapid worldwide
4 expansion of the coronavirus triggered its characterization as a
5 pandemic by the World Health Organization on March 11, 2020.
6 The State's emergency management laws require updating to
7 explicitly include pandemics and the related preparedness,
8 response, and mitigation of the social and economic
9 consequences.

10 Additionally, the legislature finds that the pandemic has
11 given rise to a multitude of essential workers in various job
12 sectors who, through the course of their work are required to
13 relay and impose emergency rules and orders that have been
14 enacted by the appropriate governmental authority. Emergency
15 response measures to reduce the spread of SARS-CoV-2 through,
16 for example, the use of face coverings or masks has placed great
17 responsibility and risk on essential workers who have



1 experienced harassment, intimidation, verbal abuse, and physical
2 assault from members of the public who disagree with the
3 government's order. While emergency workers are offered some
4 statutory protections, essential workers are generally not
5 protected under these provisions and specific statutory
6 protection for this category of worker needs to be included in
7 the State's emergency management laws.

8 The purpose of this Act is to:

- 9 (1) Establish the offense of harassment against an
10 essential worker during an emergency; and
11 (2) Amend various definitions in the emergency management
12 laws to address pandemics.

13 SECTION 2. Chapter 711, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
15 and to read as follows:

16 "§711- Harassment against an essential worker during an
17 emergency. (1) A person commits the offense of harassment
18 against an essential worker during an emergency if, during an
19 emergency proclaimed by the governor or mayor pursuant to
20 chapter 127A, a person has the intent to harass, annoy, or alarm
21 any essential worker, and that person:



- 1 (a) Strikes, shoves, kicks, or otherwise touches another
2 person in an offensive manner or subjects the other
3 person to offensive physical contact;
- 4 (b) Insults, taunts, or challenges another person in a
5 manner likely to provoke an immediate violent response
6 or that would cause the other person to reasonably
7 believe that the actor intends to cause bodily injury
8 to the recipient or another or damage to the property
9 of the recipient or another;
- 10 (c) Repeatedly makes telephone calls, facsimile
11 transmissions, or any form of electronic communication
12 as defined in section 711-1111(2), including
13 electronic mail transmissions, without purpose of
14 legitimate communication;
- 15 (d) Repeatedly makes a communication anonymously or at an
16 extremely inconvenient hour;
- 17 (e) Repeatedly makes communications, after being advised
18 by the person to whom the communication is directed
19 that further communication is unwelcome; or
- 20 (f) Makes a communication using offensively coarse
21 language that would cause the recipient to reasonably



1 believe that the actor intends to cause bodily injury
2 to the recipient or another or damage to the property
3 of the recipient or another.

4 (2) Harassment against an essential worker during an
5 emergency is a misdemeanor.

6 (3) For purposes of this section, "essential worker" means
7 any person employed by a business or service in the air and
8 ground transportation, construction, defense and law
9 enforcement, energy, food and agriculture, grocery, healthcare,
10 hospitality, information technology systems, telecommunications,
11 retail, or water sectors. "Essential worker" includes any other
12 person deemed essential by the governor or mayor during an
13 emergency period."

14 SECTION 3. Section 127A-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15 amended as follows:

16 1. By amending the definition of "disaster relief" to
17 read:

18 "Disaster relief" means any physical or financial
19 assistance provided to individuals or areas in the aftermath of
20 an emergency or disaster[-] and includes efforts to mitigate the
21 social and economic consequences of the disaster."



1 2. By amending the definition to "emergency" to read:
2 ""Emergency" means any occurrence, or imminent threat
3 thereof, which results or may likely result in substantial
4 injury or harm to the population or substantial damage to or
5 loss of property[+] and includes a pandemic."
6 3. By amending the definition of "hazard" to read:
7 ""Hazard" means an event or condition of the physical
8 environment, including a pandemic, that results or may likely
9 result in damage to property or injuries or death to individuals
10 and which may result in an emergency or disaster."
11 4. By amending the definition of "materials" to read:
12 ""Materials" includes medicines, supplies, personal
13 protective equipment, products, commodities, articles,
14 equipment, machinery, and component parts."
15 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
17 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
