## HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A PROGRAM TO RECRUIT AND EMPLOY QUALIFIED BLIND PERSONS TO SERVE AS ORIENTATION AND MOBILITY INSTRUCTORS, AND IN OTHER POSITIONS, AS TEACHERS OF VISUALLY IMPAIRED STUDENTS.

WHEREAS, the National Orientation and Mobility Certification (NOMC) is a credentialing process administered by the National Blindness Professional Certification Board and includes training in teaching Structured Discovery Cane Travel; and

7 WHEREAS, for decades, Structured Discovery Cane Travel has 8 empowered blind children and adults across the United States, 9 helping them build confidence and feelings of self-respect as 10 they move safely from place to place; and

WHEREAS, the methods and principles of Structured Discovery 12 Cane Travel come from the lived experiences of blind men and 13 women who have shared their experiences, attitudes, and 14 techniques with each other since 1940, leading to techniques, 15 problem solving strategies, experiential learning, confidence 16 building exercises, and the role modeling of non-visual 17 techniques, which demonstrates the effectiveness of the 18 19 structured discovery approach and helps correct misconceptions 20 about blindness; and

WHEREAS, historically, the Department of Education has not employed NOMC credentialed professionals to teach matters of orientation and mobility to blind students, and until recently, only accepted the Certified Orientation and Mobility Specialist (COMS) credentialing from the Academy for Certification of Vision Rehabilitation and Education Professionals; and

29 WHEREAS, the COMS certification focuses on vision-centered 30 orientation and mobility services, but does not focus on the 31 structured discovery approach; and

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WHEREAS, the structured discovery approach emphasizes the 1 employment of blind instructors, whereas the vision-centered 2 orientation and mobility approach emphasizes the employment of 3 4 non-blind instructors, resulting in diminished employment 5 opportunities for qualified blind persons as instructors in 6 Department of Education programs; and 7 WHEREAS, while the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board now 8 9 accepts the NOMC credentialed professionals to serve in certain 10 positions for which they are qualified to teach visually impaired students, this change has not significantly increased 11 12 employment of blind instructors in the Department of Education; 13 now, therefore, 14 15 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 16 17 of 2022, that the Department of Education is urged to develop 18 and implement an affirmative action program, to the extent 19 permitted by law, designed to recruit and employ qualified blind professionals to serve as orientation and mobility instructors 20 21 and in other positions, as teachers of visually impaired students; and 22 23 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent of the 25 Department of Education is urged to prepare a report of findings and recommendations regarding the recruitment and employment of 26 27 blind persons in instructional positions with the Department of Education for which they are qualified, with the goal of 28 29 increasing such employment, and include in this report actions taken, progress made, and any proposed legislation, and submit 30 the report to this body at least thirty days prior to the 31 32 convening of the Regular Session of 2023; and 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 35 Resolution be transmitted to the Department of Education, Chairperson of the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board, Administrator 36 37 of the Department of Human Services' Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services for the Blind Branch (Ho'opono), 38 President of the National Blindness Professional Certification 39 40

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Board, President of the National Federation of the Blind of
Hawaii, and the President of the Hawaii Association of the
Blind.
