# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, in the current job 2 market, nearly sixty-five per cent of available positions 3 require post-secondary credentials. Industry-recognized 4 credentials are important because they teach the specific 5 knowledge and skills that are required for an occupation or industry. Full-time employees with industry credentials earn 6 7 more than their uncredentialed counterparts, and, in some cases, the salaries of credential holders who do not hold college 8 9 degrees are similar to the salaries of college graduates.

10 The legislature also finds that the State has critical 11 shortages of gualified and credentialed workers in sectors 12 including health, education, air travel, agriculture, and technology. Given the recent downturn in the State's economy 13 14 and the rise in unemployment, it is especially important for 15 Hawaii to equip its students for the existing job market. То this end, the Promising Credentials project, a collaborative 16 17 effort aimed at using Hawaii labor market data and local



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employer insights to identify high-value industry credentials in the State, was launched. This information will enable local career readiness programs to better tailor their offerings to Hawaii's job market and to deliver more effective services to both students and employers.

Act 163, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, which requires, in part, a statewide longitudinal data system, will better enable the department of education and employers to align offerings and opportunities based on data. The legislature believes that students and employers in Hawaii both benefit when career readiness programs at school prepare students based on regional needs.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to create a career development success program to provide financial incentives for participating public high schools and charter schools to encourage pupils enrolled in grades nine through twelve to enroll in and successfully complete qualified industrycredential programs.

19 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20 amended by adding a new section to subpart C of part II to be
21 appropriately designated and to read as follows:

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1	"§302A- Industry-recognized credentials; career
2	development success program. (a) There is established within
3	the department a career development success program to provide
4	financial incentives for participating high schools to encourage
5	students enrolled in grades nine through twelve in public high
6	schools to enroll in and successfully complete qualified
7	industry-credential programs.
8	(b) Beginning with the 2022-2023 fiscal year, each
9	participating school may receive up to \$ for each
10	pupil who, in the preceding fiscal year, successfully completes
11	a qualified industry-credential program.
12	(c) Each participating school may decide annually whether
13	to participate in the career development success program.
14	(d) The department shall create a process with a deadline
15	for participating schools to report student credential
16	attainment.
17	(e) For each fiscal year, the department shall distribute
18	to each participating school an amount equal to \$
19	multiplied by the number of pupils reported by the participating
20	school as successfully earning an industry certificate by
21	completing a qualified industry-credential program; provided



1	that a pa	rticipating school shall not receive a distribution for
2	more than	ten per cent of the total number of completed industry
3	<u>certifica</u>	tes reported by the schools.
4	(f)	For each fiscal year, the department shall distribute
5	funds in	the following order until all funds are disbursed:
6	(1)	Based on the order received by the department, funds
7		shall be distributed first to participating schools
8		for all who attained Advanced Credentials on the
9		Promising Credentials list;
10	(2)	Based on the order received by the department, funds
11		shall be distributed to participating schools for all
12		who attained Door Opener Credentials on the Promising
13		Credentials list;
14	(3)	Based on the order received by the department, funds
15		shall be distributed to participating schools for all
16		who attained Springboard Credentials on the Promising
17		Credentials list;
18	(4)	Based on the order received by the department, funds
19		shall be distributed to participating schools for all
20		who attained Foundational Credentials on the Promising
21		Credentials list; and



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1	(5) Any remaining funds shall be deposited into the
2	general fund.
3	(g) Each participating school shall regularly communicate
4	to all high school students the availability of qualified
5	industry-credential programs and the benefits a student receives
6	as a result of successfully completing one of the programs or
7	courses. The participating school shall design the
8	communications with students with the goal of increasing
9	participation in the qualified industry-credential programs and
10	courses across all student subgroups.
11	(h) As used in this section:
12	"Advanced Credentials" means credentials that signal
13	proficiency in industry-specific skills for priority occupations
14	that may also require a bachelor's degree or as otherwise
15	defined by the department.
16	"Door Opener Credentials" means credentials that signal
17	proficiency in industry-specific skills for priority occupations
18	that require some post-secondary education, including
19	certificates and associate degrees, or as otherwise defined by
20	the department.



1	"Foundational Credentials" means credentials that prepare
2	learners with essential knowledge and skills for a range of
3	priority occupations, including workplace safety, or as
4	otherwise defined by the department.
5	"Participating school" means a public high school that
6	chooses to participate in the career development success program
7	established pursuant to this section.
8	"Qualified industry-credential program" means a program
9	where a student attains a credential that is included in the
10	most current version of the Promising Credentials and
11	Occupations in Hawaii list.
12	"Springboard Credentials" means credentials that signal
13	proficiency in industry-specific skills for priority occupations
14	that often do not require a postsecondary certificate or degree,
15	or as otherwise defined by the department."
16	SECTION 3. Chapter 302D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
18	and to read as follows:
19	" <u>§302D-</u> Industry-recognized credentials; career
20	development success program. (a) There is established by the
21	commission a career development success program to provide



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1	financial incentives for participating public charter schools to
2	encourage students enrolled in grades nine through twelve in
3	public charter schools to enroll in and successfully complete
4	qualified industry-credential programs.
5	(b) Beginning with the 2022-2023 fiscal year, each
6	participating school may receive up to \$ for each
7	pupil who, in the preceding fiscal year, successfully completes
8	a qualified industry-credential program.
9	(c) Each participating school may decide annually whether
10	to participate in the career development success program.
11	(d) The commission shall create a process with a deadline
12	for participating schools to report student credential
13	attainment.
14	(e) For each fiscal year, the commission shall distribute
15	to each participating school an amount equal to \$
16	multiplied by the number of pupils reported by the participating
17	school as successfully earning an industry certificate by
18	completing a qualified industry-credential program; provided
19	that a participating school shall not receive a distribution for
20	more than ten per cent of the total number of completed industry

21 certificates reported by the schools.



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1	(f)	For each fiscal year, the commission shall distribute
2	funds in	the following order until all funds are disbursed:
3	(1)	Based on the order received by the commission, funds
4		shall be distributed first to participating schools
5		for all who attained Advanced Credentials on the
6		Promising Credentials list;
7	(2)	Based on the order received by the commission, funds
8		shall be distributed to participating schools for all
9		who attained Door Opener Credentials on the Promising
10		Credentials list;
11	(3)	Based on the order received by the commission, funds
12		shall be distributed to participating schools for all
13		who attained Springboard Credentials on the Promising
14		Credentials list;
15	(4)	Based on the order received by the commission, funds
16		shall be distributed to participating schools for all
17		who attained Foundational Credentials on the Promising
18		Credentials list; and
19	(5)	Any remaining funds shall be deposited into the
20		general fund.



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1	(g) Each participating school shall regularly communicate
2	to all students in grades nine through twelve the availability
3	of qualified industry-credential programs and the benefits a
4	student receives as a result of successfully completing one of
5	the programs or courses. The participating school shall design
6	the communications with students with the goal of increasing
7	participation in the qualified industry-credential programs and
8	courses across all student subgroups.
9	(h) As used in this section:
10	"Advanced Credentials" means credentials that signal
11	proficiency in industry-specific skills for priority occupations
12	that may also require a bachelor's degree or as otherwise
13	defined by the department.
14	"Door Opener Credentials" means credentials that signal
15	proficiency in industry-specific skills for priority occupations
16	that require some post-secondary education, including
17	certificates and associate degrees, or as otherwise defined by
18	the department.
19	"Foundational Credentials" means credentials that prepare
20	learners with essential knowledge and skills for a range of



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1	priority occupations, including workplace safety, or as
2	otherwise defined by the department.
3	"Participating school" means a public high school that
4	chooses to participate in the career development success program
5	established pursuant to this section.
6	"Qualified industry-credential program" means a program
7	where a student attains a credential that is included in the
8	most current version of the Promising Credentials and
9	Occupations in Hawaii list.
10	"Springboard Credentials" means credentials that signal
11	proficiency in industry-specific skills for priority occupations
12	that often do not require a postsecondary certificate or degree,
13	or as otherwise defined by the department."
14	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
15	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
16	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for
17	the career development success program established pursuant to
18	section 2 of this Act.
19	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
20	education for the purposes of this Act.

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1 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 2 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for 3 the career development success program established pursuant to 4 5 section 3 of this Act. 6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the state public 7 charter school commission for the purposes of this Act. 8 SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored. 9 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval; 10 provided that sections 4 and 5 shall take effect on July 1, 11 2022.
