A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii businesses and residents pay among the highest electricity rates in the 2 3 nation, which exacerbates the State's already high cost of 4 living and increases the monthly financial burdens on businesses 5 and residents. The legislature further finds that the high cost of living in Hawaii reinforces the importance of adopting 6 policies that promote and encourage energy efficiency, which can 7 provide relief for families and businesses faced with high 8 9 utility bills.

Since 1980, the Federal Trade Commission has administered 10 11 the EnergyGuide labeling program aimed at assisting consumers in 12 understanding how much energy a given household appliance uses 13 and the ongoing energy costs associated with operating the appliance. However, the EnergyGuide labels do not accurately 14 15 reflect the energy costs of appliances in Hawaii because the labels are based on national average energy prices and national 16 average usage of appliances. Since electricity rates in Hawaii 17

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1 are nearly triple the national average, the current in-store 2 labeling system does not accurately convey the costs and 3 potential savings associated with certain appliances when 4 operated in Hawaii. The legislature finds that by displaying 5 information in retail stores about available rebates and Hawaii-6 specific operating costs of certain appliances, consumers can 7 make informed decisions about which models most align with their 8 economic situation and preferences.

9 The purpose of this Act is to require retailers of certain
10 household appliances to display signage with available rebates
11 and Hawaii-specific operating costs.

SECTION 2. Chapter 196, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to part V to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

15 "§196- Signage for household appliances; retailers;

16 rebates. (a) All retailers of household appliances specified

17 in subsection (b) doing business in the State shall

18 conspicuously display signage or text that informs consumers of

19 the following:

20 (1) Available energy efficiency rebates funded by the
21 public utilities fee; and

6	(b)	Subsection (a) shall apply only to household		
7	appliance	s that appear on a retailer's showroom floor and the		
8	categorie	s of household appliances that are required, as of July		
9	1, 2021,	to be packaged with a Federal Trade Commission		
10	EnergyGuide label.			
11	(c)	The public benefits fee administrator shall create a		
12	template	for the display signage or text required in this		
13	section.	The template shall be made available to retailers no		
14	later tha	n January 1, 2022. Retailers shall display the		
15	required	signage or text no later than July 1, 2022.		
16	(d)	The public benefits fee administrator shall update the		
17	template	for the display signage or text required in this		
18	<u>section</u> e	very three years, at a minimum. New household		
19	appliance	s entering the Hawaii market between update cycles		
20	shall be appropriately labeled pursuant to this section upon			
21	appearance on the showroom floor.			



1	(e)	The Hawaii state energy office, in collaboration with
2	the public	c benefits fee administrator, shall notify all
3	retailers	subject to this section of the requirements
4	establishe	ed by this section."
5	SECT	ION 3. Section 269-123, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended by	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
7	"(b)	The public benefits fee administrator's duties and
8	responsib	ilities shall be established by the public utilities
9	commission	n by rule or order, and may include:
10	(1)	Identifying, developing, administering, promoting,
11		implementing, and evaluating programs, methods, and
12		technologies that support energy-efficiency and
13		demand-side management programs;
14	(2)	Encouraging the continuance or improvement of
15		efficiencies made in the production, delivery, and use
16		of energy-efficiency and demand-side management
17		programs and services;
18	(3)	Using the energy-efficiency expertise and capabilities
19		that have developed or may develop in the State and
20		consulting with state agency experts;

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1	(4)	Promoting program initiatives, incentives, and market
2		strategies that address the needs of persons facing
3		the most significant barriers to participation;
4	(5)	Promoting coordinated program delivery, including
5		coordination with electric public utilities regarding
6		the delivery of low-income home energy assistance,
7		other demand-side management or energy-efficiency
8		programs, and any utility programs;
9	(6)	Consideration of innovative approaches to delivering
10		demand-side management and energy-efficiency services,
11		including strategies to encourage third-party
12		financing and customer contributions to the cost of
13		demand-side management and energy-efficiency services;
14	(7)	Submitting, to the public utilities commission for
15		review and approval, a multi-year budget and planning
16		cycle that promotes program improvement, program
17		stability, and maturation of programs and delivery
18		resources; and
19	(8)	Educating and training appliance manufacturers,
20		distributors, and retailers of appliances [covered] <u>:</u>



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1	(A)	<u>Covered</u> under part VI of chapter 196 about the
2		appliance efficiency standards established under
3		that part; and
4	<u>(B)</u>	Covered under section 196- about the energy
5		efficiency and energy cost information required
6		to be displayed under that section; provided that
7		the public benefits fee administrator shall
8		create and update a template for the display
9		signage or text as required by section 196- (b)
10		and (c),
11	to in	mprove compliance."
12	SECTION 4	. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
13	and stricken.	New statutory material is underscored.
14	SECTION 5	. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2021.

Report Title:

Retailers; Household Appliances; Energy Efficiency Rebates; Energy Costs; Signage

Description:

Requires retailers of household appliances to conspicuously display available energy efficiency rebates funded by the public benefits fee and state-specific energy operation costs. Requires the public benefits fee administrator to create and update the template to be used by retailers. Requires the Hawaii state energy office and administrator to give notice to retailers.
