SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO ASSESS THE SOCIAL AND FINANCIAL EFFECTS OF MANDATING HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR ANNUAL MENTAL HEALTH WELLNESS EXAMINATIONS.

WHEREAS, according to the National Institute of Mental 1 Health, approximately one in five Americans experience a mental 2 illness or disorder each year; and 3 4 WHEREAS, less than half of those experiencing a mental 5 illness or disorder receive mental health services, such as 6 counseling or prescription medication; and 7 8 WHEREAS, health insurers are currently not required to 9 10 cover annual mental health wellness examinations; and 11 WHEREAS, S.B. No. 728, introduced during the Regular 12 Session of 2021, and S.B. No. 2467, S.D. 2, introduced during 13 the Regular Session of 2022, require health insurers, mutual 14 benefit societies, and health maintenance organizations that 15 provide coverage for health care to provide coverage for annual 16 mental health wellness examinations; and 17 18 WHEREAS, pursuant to section 23-51, Hawaii Revised 19 Statutes, before any legislative measures that mandate health 20 insurance coverage for specific health services, specific 21 diseases, or certain providers of health care services as part 22 of individual or group health insurance policies can be 23 considered, there shall be concurrent resolutions passed that 24 designate a specific legislative bill for the Auditor to review 25 and on which to prepare a report for submission to the 26 Legislature that assesses both the social and financial effects 27 of the proposed mandated coverage, and S.B. No. 728, Regular 28 Session of 2021, and S.B. No. 2467, S.D. 2, Regular Session of 29 2022, are such measures; now, therefore, 30 31

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 1 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, the 2 House of Representatives concurring, that the Auditor is 3 requested to conduct an assessment, pursuant to sections 23-51 4 and 23-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, of the social and financial 5 effects of mandating health insurance coverage for annual mental 6 health wellness examinations, as proposed in S.B. No. 728, 7 Regular Session of 2021, and S.B. No. 2467, S.D. 2, Regular 8 9 Session of 2022; and 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 11 define "mental health wellness examination", similar to the 12 manner by which annual physical examinations administered by 13 14 primary care providers are established, to allow health insurers to determine coverage requirements; and 15 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to include in the impact assessment report a survey of other states 18 in the United States that have implemented a mandate for annual 19 mental health wellness examination benefits and to examine the 20 resulting social and financial impact in those states; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 23 submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including 24 any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than 25 twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 26 27 2023; and 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 29 30 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Auditor and

31 Insurance Commissioner.
