SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS TO COLLECT DATA RELATING TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF AN INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY WORKFORCE IN HAWAII, EVALUATE THE COLLECTED DATA, AND DEVELOP A STRATEGY TO PROVIDE BETTER INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY TRAINING.

WHEREAS, information technology has become a significant 1 component of Hawaii's economy that propels the prosperity of the 2 3 State as an economic driver that covers a wide range of industries; and 4 5 WHEREAS, according to a report titled "Hawai'i IT Workforce 6 7 Needs Report" published in November 2021 by SMS Research and Marketing Services, Inc. ("SMS Report"), the information 8 technology industry contributed \$2,037,000,000 or 2.2 percent to 9 Hawaii's total nominal gross domestic products (GDP) in 2018; 10 11 and 12 WHEREAS, despite not contributing as much nominal GDP as 13 the real estate, accommodation, and retail industries, the 14 information technology industry had the highest annual real GDP 15 growth rate among all sectors between 2001 and 2018 at 4.9 16 percent; and 17 18 WHEREAS, in 2020, the information technology sector in 19 Hawaii encompassed 12,740 jobs, 3,834 hires, and 894 average 20 21 annual job openings; and 22 WHEREAS, the average hourly wage for Hawaii's technology 23 industry is \$39.92, which is more than double the \$15.53 24 survival level hourly wage for individuals in the State as 25 reported in the 2020 ALICE Report for Hawaii; and 26 27 WHEREAS, the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics data 28 29 shows that the projected increase in computer and technology occupations between 2020 to 2030 is thirteen percent nationally, 30



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however, the projected employment increase in the computer and 1 mathematics occupation group in Hawaii between 2018 and 2028 is 2 limited to seven percent; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, the demand for employees in the information technology field in Hawaii exceeds the number of available 6 individuals seeking jobs in the industry; and 7 8 WHEREAS, ensuring that the State's workforce has an 9 adequate and efficient education in information technology is 10 essential for the continued growth of Hawaii's economy; and 11 12 WHEREAS, to develop a thriving information technology 13 workforce, the State must improve various aspects of its 14 15 workforce development programs; and 16 17 WHEREAS, one of the fundamental components of building a robust qualified workforce is the collection of relevant data 18 19 that will enable better evaluation of available programs and 20 contribute to better planning for the future; now, therefore, 21 22 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, the 23 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 24 Labor and Industrial Relations is requested to: 25 26 27 (1) Collect data relating to the development of an information technology workforce in Hawaii, which 28 should include but not be limited to: 29 30 31 (A) Courses, trainings, and programs currently being offered in Hawaii relating to information 32 33 technology; 34 35 Information technology internship programs (B) 36 offered by public and private organizations in 37 Hawaii; 38 39 (C) Certifications and licenses relating to information technology issued in Hawaii, 40 including: 41 42
