SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO UPDATE A STUDY ON THE FEASIBILITY OF UNDERGROUNDING THE STATE'S UTILITY FACILITIES.

WHEREAS, undergrounding entails replacing overhead electric 1 and telecommunication cables and facilities with underground 2 cables and equipment; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, there is widespread community interest in undergrounding the State's utility facilities to enhance scenic 6 7 views, address public health concerns, reduce the risk of wind damage, and increase system reliability, among other benefits; 8 and 9 10 WHEREAS, the advantages of undergrounding were illustrated 11 in 1992, when Hurricane Iniki downed more than five thousand 12 utility lines and poles on the island of Kauai, leaving more 13 than 14,350 homes without power; and 14 15 WHEREAS, there are also disadvantages to undergrounding, 16 and all facets of the issue should be considered; and 17 18 WHEREAS, in 1999, the Legislative Reference Bureau studied 19 the feasibility of undergrounding the State's utility facilities 20 in a report entitled "Undergrounding Public Utility Lines"; and 21 22 WHEREAS, there are now new technologies related to both 23 undergrounding and overhead utility lines, making much of the 24 Bureau's report outdated; now, therefore, 25 26 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 27 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, the 28 House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislative 29 Reference Bureau is requested to update the Bureau's 1999 report 30 on the feasibility of undergrounding the State's utility 31 32 facilities; and
