SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE STATE AND EACH COUNTY TO ADOPT THE GLOBAL PACT FOR THE ENVIRONMENT TO ACHIEVE THE UNITED NATIONS PARIS AGREEMENT AND THE 2030 DEVELOPMENT AGENDA, AND TO SPECIFICALLY ADOPT THE UNITED NATIONS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS, NUMBERS 13 THROUGH 17.

1 WHEREAS, the State is recognized as a global partner and local leader in promotion of human rights and protection of the 2 earth through its consistent acceptance of global standards that 3 better serve our islands and the world; and 4 5 WHEREAS, Hawai'i is guided by traditional Kanaka Maoli 6 values and emerging international human rights principles to 7 generate positive policy encouraging prevention and precaution 8 regarding the planet; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in September 2015, the United Nations General 11 Assembly adopted the historic "Transforming our world: the 2030 12 Agenda for Sustainable Development" (2030 Development Agenda), 13 which is a comprehensive, compassionate, creative, and 14 courageous plan of action to end poverty, protect the planet, 15 and ensure that all people enjoy peace and prosperity; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the 2030 Development Agenda includes seventeen 18 sustainable development goals, one hundred sixty-nine targets, 19 and two hundred thirty indicators upon which general agreement 20 has been reached to measure, monitor, and mobilize to achieve 21 22 these goals and targets; and 23 24 WHEREAS, goals 13 through 17 of the United Nations sustainable development goals are vital to protecting the 25 State's land and people and should be adopted as local policy 26 27 and governing principles for local government entities and other 28 organizations; and 29 30 WHEREAS, goals 13 through 17 of the United Nations sustainable development goals are the following, respectively: 31

international environmental law by enumerating fundamental 1 climate change principles in one legally binding framework for 2 current and future generations for equity and equality; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Global Pact will serve as a cornerstone in 5 international human rights and environmental law and create a 6 more coherent global environmental governance; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, the Global Pact addresses the challenges posed by environmental degradation in the context of sustainable 10 development and induces a greater degree of uniformity for 11 12 environmental laws in all states; and 13 WHEREAS, the Global Pact consists of over two dozen 14 15 articles that cover a variety of topics and ideas to consider for implementation, including: 16 17 The right to an ecologically sound environment; 18 (1)19 20 (2)The duty to take care of the environment; 21 (3) Integration and sustainable development; 22 23 (4) Intergenerational equity; 24 25 26 (5) Prevention; 27 (6) Precaution; 28 29 (7) Environmental damages; 30 31 (8) 32 Polluter-pays; 33 (9) Access to information; 34 35 (10) Public participation; 36 37 Access to environmental justice; (11)38 39 40 (12) Education and training; 41 Research and innovation; 42 (13)

1 and participating in the United Nations Environment Programme; 2 and 3 WHEREAS, in Hawai'i, college, community, and capitol 4 dialogues on the Paris Agreement and the 2030 Development 5 Agenda, among other climate change topics, continue to generate 6 genuine insight that contributes to Voluntary Local Reviews, 7 8 which are voluntary reports to the United Nations on local progress on implementing the United Nations sustainable 9 development goals; and 10 11 WHEREAS, local opportunities for the State's youth to learn 12 about and participate in climate change initiatives include 13 opportunities at colleges and universities that provide input on 14 achieving the Global Pact, with a focus on research and 15 16 innovation, and participation in a Hawai'i human rights and resilience process; now, therefore, 17 18 19 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 20 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2022, 21 that the State and each county are urged to adopt the Global Pact to achieve the United Nations Paris Agreement and the 2030 22 23 Development Agenda, and to specifically adopt the United Nations 24 sustainable development goals, numbers 13 through 17; and 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Global Pact should be 26 27 embraced and that protection of nature should be the centerpiece of the State's policies and practices; and 28 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 31 Resolution be transmitted to the United Nations Secretary 32 General and High Commissioner for Human Rights, President and Vice President of the United States, President Pro Tempore of 33 the United States Senate, Majority and Minority Leaders of the 34 United States Senate, Speaker and Minority Leader of the United 35 36 States House of Representatives, each member of Hawai'i's congressional delegation, Governor, and mayors of each county of 37 Hawaiʻi. 38 39 40 OFFERED BY: 41



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
