II. Background and Summary

Hamakua Health Center, Inc. dba Hamakua-Kohala Health is a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) that provides comprehensive primary and preventive healthcare to persons of all ages, regardless of ability to pay. Rooted in the rich history of sugar plantations, Hamakua-Kohala Health was initially established as Hamakua Infirmary in 1966 when plantation dispensaries along Hamakua Coast were consolidated into one hospital. In 1993, the Infirmary was given new life as Hamakua Health Center after

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closure of Hamakua Sugar, but was renamed Hamakua-Kohala Health in 2014 after acquiring Kohala Family Health Center in 2006 at the request of Kohala residents when healthcare services were reduced in North Kohala.

With the mission of providing quality healthcare responsive to our patients' and communities' needs, we serve nearly 12,000 residents annually, representing over 20,000 patient visits at four locations on Hawaii Island, including Honoka'a on the Hamakua Coast, Laupahoehoe, Waimea and Kapa'au. As the only provider of primary care services in three of the county districts served, we offer primary medical care, behavioral health, patient/family education, family planning, women's health, support groups and transition services.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

With the goal of establishing the new Kohala Health and Wellness Clinic, we plan to accomplish the following objectives:

- 1. Construct a Facility to accommodate patients at the new Kohala Health and Wellness Center;
- 2. Serve over 2,800 low-to-moderate income patients each year and;
- 3. Increase access to healthcare by 10% 20% for low-to-moderate income patients per year.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Our over 66-year-old current healthcare facility in Kapa'au that is rented on a month-tomonth lease is in disrepair due to mold and severe termite damage. Beyond renovation, this current facility can be sold at any time, which would leave the Kohala community without a healthcare safety net.

Hawaii County has limited access to medical care based on the State of Hawaii Community Health Needs Assessment. Hawaii Island's geography exacerbates this issue, underscoring the need to provide low-to-moderate income individuals with access to high quality heathcare services effectively coordinated within a strong public health system. Without a suitable permanent clinic home for Kohala residents and contiguous communities, patients would be required to travel over 60 minutes each way to access services at the nearest healthcare facility.

With nearly 25% of Hawaii Island residents filing for unemployment due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the reality of thousands losing their healthcare insurance is a grim reality. Unfortunately, none of the private practice physicians in the Kohala community accept Medicare, Medicaid or Med-QUEST patients. Upon completion of the new Kohala Health and Wellness Center, we will be able to help lift the anxiety and uncertainty for residents in Kohala by ensuring access to healthcare for children and adults, regardless of insurance or ability to pay for services. The new Center will enable Hamakua-Kohala Health to continue providing access to quality healthcare in Kohala to over 2,800 low-to-

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moderate income patients each year, as well as facilitate the expansion of programs and services.

Once established, the new Kohala Health and Wellness Center will be the only health center within a 60-minute drive one way that provides access to quality healthcare for low-to-moderate income individuals, regardless of ability to pay whether uninsured or insured by Medicare, Medicaid or Med-QUEST. The expanded programs and services of the new Center are anticipated to result in a 10% - 20% increase in the number of low-to-moderate income patients served each year. In the future, the new Center will become part of a plan for a Rural Healthcare Delivery Hub in partnership with the John A. Burns School of Medicine to develop culturally sensitive rural healthcare tools and programs that will be validated with research and address access to care to improve healthcare for rural communities.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Hamakua-Kohala Health is committed to providing comprehensive, culturally competent, quality primary healthcare to medically underserved communities and vulnerable populations. Home to individuals who face barriers due to poverty, language or cultural differences, these medically underserved communities have insufficient health professionals or resources to adequately serve the population. Healthcare utilization rates are low among our target population, with nearly 1 in 5 residents without a primary care doctor and over 1 in 10 delaying healthcare because they believed the cost and/or copay to be unaffordable. Chronic disease indicators for North Hawaii Island exceed statewide rates, with a high prevalence of diabetes, obesity, childhood asthma, respiratory conditions, cancer, high blood pressure and heart disease. As a FQHC, we promote access to healthcare and help our target population overcome these barriers by offering supportive services, such as health education, translation services and transportation.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

We serve residents at four locations on Hawaii Island, including Honoka'a on the Hamakua Coast, Laupahoehoe, Waimea and Kapa'au and are the only provider of primary care services in three of the county districts served.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

In January 2021, we purchased the former Kohala Club Hotel, which will become the permanent home for our new clinic in Kapa'au. The property encompasses 5.68 acres

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of land in a beautiful outdoor space well-suited for wellness programs. As part of this project, we will construct a new clinic structure on the land, as well as purchase and install new furnishings, fixtures and equipment (FF&E). Success of the capital project will be evidenced by receipt of the Certificate of Occupancy upon completion of construction.

HKH Business Development Director Sharon Cariaga-Alfonso serves as the Project Manager.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service:

Applications for the various permits needed have been submitted. Construction is scheduled to begin in early 2024 and be completed within 6-9 months. Hamakua-Kohala Health anticipates moving operations from the current location to the new Center by summer-fall 2024.

The Project Manager will work alongside the contractor, vendors and management team to ensure Hamakua-Kohala Health is receiving the best value for services it is contracted to receive. The Executive Director will report progress to the Capital Campaign Committee, who will provide oversight to ensure that the project is completed on time and within budget. The Executive Director will have overall responsibility for operations planning, pre-opening and start-up of the Kohala Health and Wellness Center.

Effectiveness of the capital project will be tracked through general milestones established throughout the renovation process that accompany contractor payment requests to ensure the capital campaign is completed on time and remains within budget.

Hamakua-Kohala Health continues to adhere to rigorous performance and accountability standards, including administrative, clinical and financial operations. In 2018, Hamakua-Kohala Health received National Recognition as a Patient-Centered Medical Home by the National Committee for Quality Assurance for placing patients at the center of the healthcare system. In response to COVID-19 in 2020, we implemented rigorous infection control measures to ensure our facilities remain safe places for individuals and families to confidently receive care. Throughout the pandemic, we pivoted to Telehealth care depending on healthcare needs while continuing to provide in-person visits and scheduled procedures as safely and conveniently as possible.

Hamakua-Kohala Health was one of only 18 healthcare groups nationwide to be named a Hypertension Control Champion by Million Hearts and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in 2015 for our outstanding healthcare teams who work together toward the goal of preventing a million heart attacks and strokes within a 5-year period. In 2016, two of our providers received recognition for their exemplary service to the healthcare profession: Outstanding Service Provider awarded through Hawaii Public Health Institute and the Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawaii (Coalition) and Hawaii Healthcare Hero awarded by Healthcare Association of Hawaii.

Our healthcare model focuses on four components: direct healthcare services, leadership, outreach and community education and ongoing professional education. A vital component of our services include our Care Coordination Team and the Patient Education Program, which offers private counseling sessions and support groups to patients to learn how to "heal the whole person" and improve their quality of life by reducing chronic disease risk factors.

The Kohala Health and Wellness Center capital campaign committee is chaired by Christine Richardson, who brings a wealth of fundraising and project development experience to the capital project as Executive Director of the North Kohala Community Resource Center. Capital campaign co-chairs have extensive experience representing both public and private sectors, including county government, healthcare, social work, education and information management through the United Nations.

Hamakua-Kohala Health owns the buildings and site on which the new Kohala Health and Wellness Center will be established. The new Center will be ADA compliant.

With over 25 years of experience in health and human services, 11 of which were as founder and Board member of Ko o lau loa Community Health and Wellness Center, CEO Irene Carpenter leads 13 full-time equivalent employees, including clinical staff. Irene serves as president of AHARO Hawaii, a virtual accountable healthcare organization that consists of 5 rural Community Health Centers committed to developing best practices to respond to rural health challenges in Hawaii. Irene also serves on the board of Hawaii Primary Care Association that advocates for health-related issues, such as addressing the social determinants of health or ensuring that patients have necessary information to access local services, regardless of health insurance status. Recognizing that medical insurance can be a large determinant of quality healthcare, Irene also serves on the board of AlohaCare, major providers of Medicaid and Medicare health care across the state.

In tandem with the Project Manager, Executive Director Irene Carpenter works with the Project Manager who oversees the contractor, vendors and management team. The Executive Director reports construction/renovation progress to the Capital Campaign Committee, who has oversight of the capital project, with the Executive Director tasked with overseeing operations planning, pre-opening and start-up of the Kohala Health and Wellness Center.
