The grant will be used to support the construction of a multi-media facility in the downtown core of Honolulu on the Aloha Tower Marketplace Campus of Hawai'i Pacific University. The facility will be designed to support the media needs of the O'ahu population, targeting in particular Honolulu residents and community groups in the downtown Honolulu core. At the new facility, Hawai'i Pacific University will partner with 'Ōlelo Community Media, O'ahu's nonprofit community Public, Education and Government (PEG) access provider, to expand community access to media production through the new facility. The new amenity will increase the current number of publicly accessible media facilities on O'ahu. Expanded community access to media will also be supported by this facilty through its location in an underserved area of O'ahu as well as by providing broader access hours to media production facilities through weekend access and extended weekday access hours. Staffed by 'Ōlelo and Hawai'i Pacific University, the facility will promote interaction and collaboration between community members and the HPU community, increasing the exploration of local issues and concerns. The facility will expand professional training options for community members and through its small studio and video and sound editing facilities as well as equipment loan services, enable O'ahu community members to tell their stories.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Hawai'i Pacific University (HPU) is a private, not-for-profit, independent, coeducational, comprehensive university, with 5,200 undergraduate and graduate students. Chartered in 1965 as Hawai'i Pacific College, the University received accreditation from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges Senior College and University Commission (WSCUC) in 1973 and has remained fully accredited ever since. The mission of the

university is to create an international learning community rooted in an American education and built upon a liberal arts foundation. The university mission is built around three core, Hawaiian values: *pono*, *kuleana*, and *aloha*. The institution is governed by an independent Board of Trustees comprised of community and business leaders. HPU provides access to education on three major campuses across Oahu: an urban core campus, a rural campus in Kaneohe, and Makapu'u Campus on the windward coast of Oʻahu. In addition, HPU delivers courses on seven military installations and serves military service members, their families, and Veterans. Over the next two years, HPU will be expanding its footprint with its "Ninth Island Program" to serve students in Las Vegas and the Pacific Northwest.

HPU offers undergraduate degrees from Associates level, through Bachelors, Masters, and Doctoral Level. It offers innovative programs through a variety of mediums to serve its diverse population of local, mainland, international, traditional and adult learners. The student population originates from all 50 states and approximately 80 countries and the university was recently designated the most diverse university in the U.S. In 2021, HPU was designated as a federal Minority Serving Institution. In addition, the university has multiple partnerships with high schools on Oʻahu which provide dual credit courses leading to associates degrees allowing students in Hawaiʻi to kick start their degrees while still attending high school.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Hawai'i Pacific University proposes the creation of a modern multi-media facility equipped with a small production studio and video and editing labs, and featuring media equipment loan capabilities to serve both HPU students and Honolulu residents. Honolulu residents will be served through a partnership with 'Ōlelo who will use the space to expand their services in media training and production training, fulfilling their mission to assisting community organizations and individuals in the production and distribution of their own media.

Specifically our goals are to create a shared access multi-media facility which will:

- Increase community access to video production facilities
- o Increase community access to training in media and video production
- o Provide media and program distribution services to community partners
- Provide opportunities for upskilling in media technology for community members, current HPU students, and alumni
- Increase the number of community media facilities
- Expand the network of media production access points in the downtown Honolulu area—where such access points are currently limited—and serve an underserved downtown Honolulu community
- Promote interaction and collaboration between student and community members on media projects, increasing student understanding of local issues and concerns, and fulfilling HPU's mission to be a community partner

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

'Ōlelo is a private non-profit corporation promoting free-speech by providing access to media training, production facilities and programming distribution services on O'ahu. Currently, 'Ōlelo provides production and distribution facilities for users from the public, education, and government (PEG) sectors in Mapunanpuna, Nanakuli, Kaimuki, Kane'ohe, Wahiawa and Waipahu. The partnership with Hawai'i Pacific University in a facility at its Aloha Tower Marketplace Campus (ATM) will provide access in the unserved downtown Honolulu area. Current partnerships with DOE sites at Nanakuli Intermediate and High School; Kaimuki High School; King Intermediate School; Leilehua High School; Waipahu Intermediate School have restricted access and are open only be appointment, after school hours, and are unavailable for use on weekends. The facility at HPU ATM will offer weekend and evening access with increased access during summer terms.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Target population consists of individuals from the Public, Educational and Government (PEG) communities across Oahu, HPU students, staff and faculty, and HPU community members. Particular targets are community members located in the downtown Honolulu area who are underserved by other public access media labs.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The geographic coverage is island wide on O'ahu.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

Phase One of the project will entail the conversion of an existing space at the Aloha Tower Market campus of Hawai'i Pacific University to a usable video production space. Conversion will involve structural alterations which increase the height of the ceiling to accommodate studio dimensions and equipment; HVAC modification; electrical installation and reinstallation; sound proofing; installation of editing bays; modification of space for equipment storage; security measure installations to provide easy but secure access for 'Ōlelo partners and community members.

Phase Two of the project involves installation of audio visual equipment including lighting, light controllers, audio booths, studio cameras, control room equipment, lighting truss system.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

The applicant shall demonstrate that it has the necessary skills, abilities, knowledge of, and experience relating to the request.

The construction of the HPU Multimedia Laboratory will be managed by the same internal team (with external oversight) that managed the University's recent comprehensive move and campus consolidation to the downtown Waterfront Plaza location in 2019. The team is headed by Cody Down, HPU's Chief Information Officer, who reports directly to President John Gotanda. Chief Financial Officer David Kostecki, who also reports directly to President John Gotanda will oversee the financial management of this project.

The Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees is responsible for Board oversight of this project. The committee receives quarterly reports that include both financial and operational updates. All reports are also shared with the full Board of Trustees.

It should be noted that the University's recent campus consolidation was accomplished on time and on budget.

As the facility enters the operations phase, the following staff will be responsible for oversight, management, and day to day running and support of the facility and in operationalizing public access to the site:

<u>Mark Nitta</u> – Director of Educational Technology and Client Services, Hawai'i Pacific University

Mark has been with HPU for 25 years. He started as the Manager of the Communication Video Lab at HPU and was formative in developing, and instructing within, the Multimedia Program. Prior to his employment at HPU, he built a Multimedia Center at the Rehabilitation Hospital of the Pacific. With over 40 years of experience in video production, he has continued to be involved in multiple projects within the state and abroad.

Greg Davis - Multimedia Technical Analyst, Hawai'i Pacific University

Greg has been with HPU for 5 years, and is responsible for supporting classroom technology and providing audio/video support to internal and external HPU clients.

Previous experience includes all aspects of video operations and includes:

- PBS Hawaii (studio cameraman)
 - Participated in live and live-to-tape production of numerous programs
- Oceanic Cable (now Spectrum) (Director of Video Operations)
 - Oversaw design and operations of on-air and production facilities

 - Overall responsibility for all aspects of direct services to clients and coverage of community events, including:
 - Operations of Community Media Centers (CMCs)
 - Executive Production services
 - Managing staff of Associate Directors, Production Coordinators, Outreach Managers, CMC Managers Community Media Associates
 - Producer of Kupuna Power series, Prince Lot Hula Festival, Goodwill Goes Glam!, as well as numerous special projects

Wes Akamine – Director of Operations and Project Management, "Ōlelo Community Media

Wes has been with "Ōlelo for over 20 years. He is currently responsible for all community engagement initiatives including media training and mentoring that enable the public to access "Ōlelo television channels and resources, including equipment rental. In addition, Wes oversees "Ōlelo's media production and post-production services, Executive Productions, internships and volunteer services.



2. Facilities

The applicant shall provide a description of its facilities and demonstrate its adequacy in relation to the request. If facilities are not presently available, describe plans to secure facilities.

The new multi-media facility will be constructed in existing space at the Aloha Tower Marketplace Campus of HPU. A 1221 square foot office will be converted to studio, office, and edit bay space. The space will accommodate a studio in addition to an office and storage space for equipment checkout. Two video.sound editing bays will also be installed. Please see the schematic on the following page.



The Multimedia Laboratory will complement other laboratory facilities to provide students with a comprehensive learning and research experience. These include:

Engineering Lab (Waterfront Plaza, Building 4-200-H)

This space houses six 12' lab benches that can accommodate up to 24 students. The benches are used by students to conduct electronic lab experiments using measurement equipment, to participate in classroom activities, and to study in groups on their homework assignments. An ultimate plan is to divide this large lab space further into two or three small spaces using moveable partitions. These small lab spaces will provide working areas for faculty and student projects.

Robotics/Cybersecurity Lab (Waterfront Plaza, Building 4-200-J)

This is a small lab room that accommodates robotics equipment and cybersecurity lab equipment. The robotics portion includes land, sea, and air robot project kits. The cybersecurity portion of the lab includes a cluster of PCs.

Makerspace and Measurement Lab (Waterfront Plaza, Building 4-200-K)

This is a small lab room that includes faculty and student projects and related equipment. The space is equipped with a 3-D printer and soldering station, and serves as a makerspace for students and faculty to fabricate Printed Circuit Boards (PCB). It also includes research-grade measurement equipment such as a DC power source, precision multimeter, digital oscilloscope, and arbitrary function generator.

Nursing Simulation Laboratory (Waterfront Plaza, Building 1)

This technology-enhanced Simulation Center includes two large skills laboratories with equipment (i.e., mannequins, IVs) and medical supplies necessary for the simulation of nursing, social work, and public health practices; five simulation rooms with adjacent control rooms for teaching and learning skills; and four examination rooms for discussion and briefing.

Graduate Center for Health Sciences Laboratory (Waterfront Plaza, Building 6)

This laboratory houses the patient examination tables, physical therapy equipment, simulated observation rooms, and faculty offices for the Doctor of Physical Therapy program, and the developing Occupational Therapy and Physician Assistant programs. It can accommodate up to 100 students at any one time.

The Office of Sponsored Projects, currently led by Interim Manager Mark Yabui, will ensure that procurement and compliance requirements of the project are met. In addition, Ms. Lynne Wooddell, Associate Vice President, Principal Gifts, within the Office of University Advancement, are involved in ongoing solicitation of private donations and foundation funding to support ongoing project activities.

Multimedia Administration Team

The Multimedia Administration Team will be responsible for the build out, general oversight and day-to-day functioning and support of the multi-media facility. The team consists of Mr. Cody Down, MSIS, HPU Associate Vice President and Chief Information Officer, who has managerial oversight for all technology facilities and staff on HPU campuses and will oversee the build out and equipping of the facility. Mr. Mark Nitta, the Director of Instructional Technology and Client Services at HPU, will have direct oversight of the facility in build-out and in operation. Once the build out is completed, a new Multi-Media Facility Manager will be responsible for the day to day running of the facility, including maintenance, scheduling of use by faculty, students and 'Ōlelo, equipment check out, maintenance and repair, and additional staffing if any is required. The Multi-Media Manager will be assisted by part-time student workers.


Assessment Team

The Assessment Team will be responsible for monitoring the outcomes of the project once the facility is built and is in use. The team will be drawn from the Multimedia Administration Team, representatives from 'Ōlelo, faculty from the Multimedia Cinematic Arts Program at HPU, and the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, Allison Gough, who oversees academic programs in the multimedia area.
