II. Background and Summary

Founded in 2006, Mālama Kaua'i (MK) is a community-based, nonprofit that focuses on increasing local food production and access for Kaua'i, with a diverse array of responsive programs over the past 16 years. With equity and resilience at its core, MK:

 Grows community capacity by leveraging workforce and economic development efforts; public-private partnerships and innovative community-based programming.

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- Spearheads increased food access for our island's most vulnerable, leads community food system development and provides technical assistance and resources to food producers.
- Alleviates inequities by prioritizing the needs of small and minority farmers and food insecure residents.
- Supports farmers and our community through many programs and projects including farm to school, farmer support programs, workforce development initiatives, and emergency response.
- Increases local food access for low-income residents through farm to school, gleaning (harvesting and redistributing unwanted/extra produce), keiki summer meal programs, food box distributions, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance (SNAP) / DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks incentives, and more.

MK has been the Food Access Coordinator for Kaua'i through a contract with the State of Hawai'i Dept. of Health since 2018, working on a Food Access Plan for the island.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of the Kaua'i Food Access Project is to begin the implementation of the Kaua'i Food Access Plan developed by the community of Kaua'i, including:

- 1. Onboarding a Grant Writer and Project Manager to obtain funding to implement collaborative projects to support the plan
- Continuing support for critical summer feeding via Kaukau 4 Keiki local meal box delivery for high-need children on Kaua'i
- 3. Implementing Kaua'i Food Access Plan Objectives that are finalized during February 2023 in a community voting process

Examples of potential 2030 Kaua'i Food Access Plan Objectives based upon meetings thus far include:

- Creation of a community garden in each moku on Kaua'i
- Development of community kitchens in each moku on Kaua'i
- Young and new farmer support i.e education resources, funding, health insurance
- Increasing the awareness and outreach of food access and gleaning programs

Finalization of objectives and community voting for the final selected Food Access Plan objectives is occurring in February 2023.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The Kaua'i Food Access Plan has been in the planning phase for the past few years and to date has included seven quarterly meetings with food access network partners to identify inefficiencies and duplications in programming across the island. As well as,

foster communication channels between our partner agencies to improve services and outreach methods. The meetings are attended by a number of agencies including food pantries and food banks, low-income property managers, elderly housing managers Agency of Elderly Affairs, Catholic Charities, Wilcox Health, Lili'uokalani Trust, Kamehameha Schools, Get Fit Kaua'i and many more. While not all of these agencies work directly with food or food access, they do work closely with our community members, specifically those who are most vulnerable, which are our keiki, kūpuna, and low-income and houseless residents.

During the second phase of our Food Access Plan development MK conducted a Food Insecurity Survey between January and May of 2022. With 177 participants representing 472 food insecure individuals (290 adults and 182 keiki), the survey results offer a snapshot of the hardships Kaua'i's food insecure are experiencing firsthand. 46% of survey participants were unable to access healthy foods (ex. fresh produce) weekly while 54% experienced hunger pains at least monthly. Three in four cut portion sizes monthly to ensure everyone could eat and two in three had to decide between buying food or paving bills monthly. Α report of the data (https://malamakauai.org/kauai-food-access-plan) has been shared publicly malamakauai.org and distributed to our network partners, which also outlines recommendations from this most-affected audience on how to increase food access such as increasing community gardens, increasing marketing of DA BUX program availability, and increasing food pantry procurement of produce.

Survey data has also been a guiding piece in our present work and shared at each of our seven food access micro-summits, which is the third phase of our plan development. Between October 2022 and January 2023, we'll have hosted two food access network meetings, two farmer and rancher meetings, and four community meetings. To address the prevalent transportation barriers our residents experience on a daily basis each of our farmer/rancher and community meetings are hosted in a different moku. These district meetings are also site specific to identify the differences and similarities in strengths and needs occurring within each region. Our aim is to address the unique challenges within each moku and develop key objectives and strategies with the residents of that moku. A heavy emphasis is also being placed on community priority and personal commitment – MK would like to support the community in completing these key objectives as opposed to MK solely developing, coordinating, and advocating for buy-in.

Supporting Food Access

The overall purpose of our food access plan is to increase local food access for the people of Kaua'i, while lifting our local food system. Hawai'i is among ten states with the highest food insecurity rate as of 2021 at 15%, jumping about 4 percentage points from 2019 (Feeding America). For children specifically, Hawaii had the second highest projected food insecurity rate in the nation in 2021, at about 25% (Feeding America/Civil Beat). The state is also one of the most food import dependent states in the U.S., importing a minimum of 85% of its food each year. The combined energy and food

import dependence increases the cost of living for consumers significantly, with monthly costs averaging over \$9,800/month on Kaua'i for a family of four (Economic Policy Institute). Hawai'i also experienced one of the steepest drops in average daily participation in the school lunch program between the 2018-19 and 2020-21 school years. Roughly 100,000 kids took advantage of school lunches just before the pandemic, dropping to 39,400 by 2020-21, a 61% decrease (Food Research & Action Center).

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Although our food access programs serve many, the majority of our beneficiaries are low-income families and our food producers.

Supporting Food Access for High-Need Audiences

Food access and hunger are ongoing issues centrally addressed by this program. In Kaua'i county, 12.2% of residents now receive SNAP/EBT benefits, up from 10.2% in 2020 (<u>HI Dept. of Human Services</u>) and 75% reported food insecurity in the past year (survey period December 2021 through March 2022). SNAP recipients on Kaua'i are up 8% over the three year period from February 2019 to February 2022 (<u>State of Hawaii Department of Human Services</u>), and new SNAP applications are up 60% across the state from pre-pandemic levels (<u>State of Hawaii Department of Human Services</u>).

Low-income audiences and those that serve them have been deeply involved in the development of the Kaua'i Food Access Plan.

Supporting Farmers

MK works with over 100 farmers, ranchers, and food producers across Kaua'i on a weekly basis, and they have been a key audience involved in the development of the food access plan. Throughout our two farmer meetings, held in October and November of 2022, a number of similar strengths emerged. Many of Kaua'i's food producers are highly knowledgeable in their field and have a number of well-established agencies who work to support their efforts. They offer a diverse array of quality products including proteins and seafoods and strive to keep the majority of produce here on Kaua'i. Similar strengths also surfaced to the top with access to grant funding and equipment and supply bulk buying/sharing being voted as the two top priorities. Processing facilities and cold storage were also identified as common needs along with farmworker housing and support for the next generation of food producers.

This project primarily serves the County of Kaua'i, but also contributes and interacts with the statewide food system.

MK anticipates applying for federal direct payment of 30% of solar system installation costs for our food hub in April 2024 for approximately \$84,000.

\$672,268.04. These funds are primarily the result of our fundraising efforts for our food hub capital construction project and will be spent in 2023 on these expenditures; they also include fixed assets such as equipment/vehicles and our building under construction. Final total with depreciation will be available in February 2023.

MK has led islandwide food access and production programming on Kaua'i for over 16 years, and has held an annual contract with the State of Hawai'i Dept. of Health as the Food Access Coordinator for the County of Kaua'i since 2018 to develop Kaua'i's 2030 Food Access Plan. This request is to utilize a State investment to create resources to jumpstart implementation of this community-developed plan.

Kaukau 4 Keiki was launched in 2021 through a collaboration of food access coordinators and First Lady Dawn Ige in 2021. During this first year, our Kaua'i based program provided seven weeks of home delivery meal boxes for keiki across the island during summer months to address food insecurity, in partnership with the Department. of Education. Over 1,200 keiki were served islandwide with 6,350 CSA bags and 87,450 meals. Our purchases and distribution included 63,500 pounds of local produce, 3,130 pounds of local beef, and 1,121 loaves of local bread. In 2022 we offered a Kaukau 4 Keiki Afterschool Pilot which delivered 2,660 CSA bags from January through April, a summer meals program that served 400 keiki, as well as a weekly kūpuna program currently delivering 25 to 75 CSA bags per week.

In the development of the Food Access Plan, both our Food Access Stakeholders and our Farmer/Rancher/Food Producer Groups have requested a grant writer as one of their top priorities so that resources are available to apply for (and manage) foundation and Federal level funding that help to support islandwide collaborative projects. These groups identified this area as one where no one organization currently has enough resources or capacity to meet these needs, including MK currently. This will enable the totality of the food access plan to secure resources for its execution.

MK is currently in the final phase of building Kaua'i's first food hub, the Moloa'a 'AINA Center. This 2,448 square foot two-story building with the packing and processing facility on the first floor and the technical assistance hub on the second floor is scheduled for completion on June 30, 2023 and will be the base of our operations prior to the start of this award. We also currently lease an office and mini hub space in Lihue. Either space may be used as office space to conduct the activities of this proposed project.

She has been with MK since 2014, and was promoted to Executive Director in 2017. She holds a BS in Management and Public Policy with a Human Resources minor. Fox will oversee the overall project, its programs, and partnerships.

Food Access Manager, Stormy Soza has worked in food and agriculture on Kaua'i for over a decade, the last two years of which has been focused on managing Federally funded projects for local food systems with MK. Soza is currently overseeing the development of the Kaua'i Food Access Plan, and will continue in overseeing its implementation by supervising and directing the work of the Project Manager and Grant Writer.


