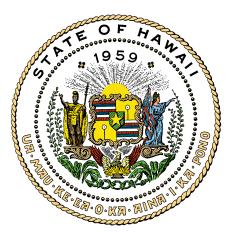

State Grant-in-Aid funding would be used for a public purpose as explained below in **Section II. Background and Summary**, by enabling Manoa Heritage Center (MHC) to renovate Kualii, the former Manoa Valley residence of late founders Sam and Mary Cooke. Phase I renovations will enable MHC to share this cultural treasure as a community resource, along with its private historical collection of rare books and unique paintings, drawings and prints of the Hawaiian Islands.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Established in 1996, MHC is a 3.5-acre "living classroom" with one-of-a-kind resources and a qualified staff that are leveraged to promote a deep understanding of Hawaii's cultural and natural heritage.

These resources include Kukaoo Heiau, gardens of rare Native and Polynesianintroduced plants, the LEED-certified Harry & Jeanette Weinberg Visitor Education Hale, and, in the future, the historic Kualii home with its collection of Hawaiian art and rare books. Kukaoo Heiau is thought to be an agricultural temple that has guarded the valley for hundreds of years from its prominent position with views of the Koolau Range to Waikiki's shoreline. Surrounding the heiau is a Native Hawaiian garden featuring endemic and indigenous plants, as well as Polynesian introductions, many which are on the US Fish & Wildlife List of Endangered Species and the IUCN Red List of Endangered Species.

For over two decades, we have expanded programs to incorporate the latest cultural, historical and archeological research, with well-trained docents who use this knowledge to bring the site to life for students and educators. Our collaborations with experts in Hawaiian culture, history and language enable us to ensure the MHC site will be stewarded and accessible to vulnerable populations for generations. Over the past few years, we have been working to create healing spaces at MHC where students from diverse cultures and backgrounds can embrace interconnectedness and collectively develop solutions that support environmental sustainability and protection of our precious island resources. As agents of change, MHC is leading the way in applying an equity lens to programs using a Racial Healing Model that can be replicated throughout communities across Oahu.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Goal: To prepare Kualii to transition from a private residence to a community resource that will eventually be open to the public.

Objectives: As part of Phase I renovations, MHC will make essential interior/exterior renovations to Kualii, including but not limited to infrastructure upgrades to ensure ADA compliance and security throughout the facility.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

MHC's deliberate stewardship of an over 800-year-old archeological site and one of the largest collections of indigenous and endemic plants on Oahu, has enabled the organization to offer place-based educational programs for over 30 years. In Spring of 2019, MHC's Board of Directors began a strategic planning process to develop an interpretive plan for the historic Cooke family home, Kualii. While the inside of the home is not open to the public yet, the home occupies a prominent position within MHC's 3.5-acre campus and plays a central role in our existing tour program.

The Tudor-Revival style residence was designed by Honolulu architects Emory and Webb and built with stone quarried on site. Monte passed away in 1948 and Lila lived at Kualii until her death in 1970. Sam and Mary Cooke purchased the home in 1970 and assembled a cultural treasure rarely found outside of institutions. Their collection of paintings, drawings, and prints of the Hawaiian Islands uniquely reflects the multilayered kamaaina who have heartfelt connections to a specific place by long residence and/or long association with the people, geographical features, legends, and historical uses of that place.

For the past 6.5 years, MHC staff has worked alongside its remaining founder, Mary Cooke, to understand the heart and soul of Sam and Mary Cooke's vision for this historic and cultural property, which includes their Manoa Valley residence, Kualii. Over the past few years, MHC's Cultural Site Manager has been cataloguing the Cooke family's vast collection of rare books and collections of paintings, drawings and prints. With the passing of Mary in 2022, MHC has the opportunity to renovate the Cooke's historic tudor style home in preparation for sharing this cultural treasure as a community resource to benefit generations of students, educators, residents and visitors to the islands.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

This project will benefit visitors of all ages, including residents, community organizations, cultural practitioners and international guests, as well as students and educators from public, private and charter schools from thoughout the state. School programs target schools in underserved communities throughout Oahu in the Waikiki Ahupuaa, whether they have a high percentage of students qualifying for free or reduced-price lunch, have a high transiency rate, serve large proportions of English Language Learners or support a large number of immigrant students from Pacific Island entities. MHC also welomes U.S. Army service personnel coping with effects of service-related trauma who are selected to participate in programs by counselors at the U.S. Army Health Clinic's Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) on Oahu.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

MHC serves visitors from all parts of Oahu, the Neighbor Islands, the mainland, and from other countries. MHC programs particularly focus on communities throughout the Waikiki Ahupuaa on Oahu, particularly those surrounding Manoa and K-12 schools located in the area of the Ala Wai Watershed, which is 19 square miles, 40% of which is zoned as Conservation District in the upper watershed. The middle and lower watershed is home to approximately 200,000 residents, comprising 20% of Oahu's population with more than 30 K-12 campuses and encompassing the University of Hawaii at Manoa campus. The area is heavily urbanized, including single-family residences, condominiums, hotels, and businesses. The heart of Hawaii's economy, Waikiki, is located at the base of the watershed, between the Ala Wai Canal and the ocean.

Grant-in-aid funds would be used toward Phase I renovations to Kualii and all related costs, including but not limited to ADA compliance and security, as well as interior/exterior renovations and upgrades. MHC's staff and planning team will work with the general contractor to establish milestones, and regularly report progress to the Board to ensure that the renovations to Kualii are constructed according to specifications, timeline and budget.

Upon receiving the Notice to Proceed, MHC would begin Phase I renovations, which are anticipated to be completed with 12 months.

If awarded State Grant-in-Aid, MHC anticipates drawing down on funds immediately upon receiving the Notice to Proceed. Working in tandem with the General Contractor, MHC's staff and planning team will develop milestones to ensure renovations to Kualii are on progressing on schedule and within the preestablished budget.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

MHC is leveraging knowledge gained from successful completion of a \$4 million capital campaign in 2018 to construct the Visitor Education Hale. As a result of this capital project, 2019 was a year of growth, with more than 6,610 people participating in MHC's place-based programs, 73% comprising students and educators, a 212% increase since 2015. Over the past two years, we have also become a thriving resource for public school educators via professional development (PD) workshops and ongoing partnerships with universities and schools. Since 2017, the number of educators served by PD workshops increased by 345%.

Residents of all ages need access to cultural spaces like MHC's gardens of Native and Polynesian-introduced plants as these sites strengthen cultural identity and foster multigenerational wisdom. Sadly, 92% of Hawaii is urbanized, leaving adults of all ages and families with limited access to spaces grounded in the rich history of Hawaii. Shared spaces such as MHC are an essential element to emboldening communities by creating a sense of belonging and place, building relationships between Indigenous people and the land and enhancing cross-cultural exchanges for people of all ages.

Despite another challenging year of dealing with the consequences of COVID, we connected nearly 3,000 students of all ages with Hawaii's cultural and natural heritage in 2022, inspiring them to act in their own communities. MHC also continued to serve as a thriving resource for public school educators via professional development and ongoing partnerships with universities and schools, reaching 45 educators through workshops in 2022. We continue to serve as an educational hub for kupuna, families, neighbors, cultural practitioners and community organizations, welcoming close to 700 people to participate in community workshops and programs in 2022. We also experienced more than 804 volunteer hand-to-aina hours supporting the native and polynesian-introduced gardens (compared to 487 hours in 2021), an increase of 65%!

The historic Kualii home, once fully renovated and opened to the public, will be used to not only place the MHC site within a modern and societal context, but to explore the last half of the 19th century - a time of rapid change for Hawaii.

MHC is a culturally unique 3.5-acre site in Manoa Valley that comprises distinct resources spanning two sections of its master campus:

Upper Campus

- Kukaoo Heiau;
- Gardens of Native Hawaiian and Polynesian-introduced plants; and
- Named in honor of the last chief of Oahu before the unification of the islands, Kualii is Sam and Mary Cooke's historic tudor-style home in Manoa that is on the

National Register of Historic Places. As part of Phase I renovations, MHC is preparing the home and its vast collection of art and rare books to transition from a private residence to a treasured community resource for generations of keiki and kupuna to learn from and enjoy.

Lower Campus

 In 2018, MHC completed construction of a 4,125 sf, LEED-certified, energy selfsufficient, ADA-compliant Visitor Education Hale, 1,208 sf 2-story caretaker's residence/maintenance workroom, Hawaiian star compass driveway for wayfinding and celestial navigation and additional landscaping of Native Hawaiian plants.

Director of Education, Jenny Engle

With a full-time professional staff, MHC relies heavily on its team of educators to develop and implement education programs. With more than 20 years' experience designing school programs that meet the needs of teachers and students, MHC's Director of Education, Jenny Engle, collaborates with stakeholders to activate MHC's mission. As Teacher Liaison at the Honolulu Museum of Art, Jenny focused on developing relationships with Title 1 schools, conducting teacher workshops and expanding access to school tour programs. She holds an M.Ed. from Harvard Graduate School of Education and a B.A. in Art History from Kenyon College, OH.

Cultural Steward and Education Assistant, Ke'ala Wong

MHC's Cultural Steward and Education Assistant, Ke'ala Wong, works in tandem with Jenny Engle to integrate a Hawaiian cultural-based perspective throughout each of our programs. Ke'ala is a graduate from Kamehameha Kapalama (2009) and University of Hawaii at Manoa (2014) where she received a BA in Hawaiian Studies/Hawaiian Language and a Masters in Curriculum Studies STEMS².

Cultural Site Manager, Jenny Leung

Jenny Leung is responsible for the preservation of and access to MHC's cultural, historical, natural and physical resources. With experience working as a Program Assistant with University of Hawaii Historic Preservation Program and as a Collections Assistant at the Honolulu Museum of Art, Jenny Leung is an expert in collections management. When she is not cataloguing the Cooke family collection located at Kualii, she does independent historic research and consulting. Jenny sits on the board of the Hawaiian Quilt Research Project and the Association of Hawaii Archivists.

Our multi-year operating budget prioritizes initiatives that align with strategic goals while keeping costs at a minimum. MHC supports programs through a financial model that includes revenues generated by annual fundraising efforts targeting individuals, foundations and corporations. Recognizing that annual fundraising alone cannot sustain programs in perpetuity, MHC established the Sam Cooke Endowed Fund in 2018, which, when fully funded, will provide a reliable source of income to preserve cultural assets and ensure programs continue, regardless of future unanticipated financial challenges.

Through diversified revenues, sound fiscal management and an endowment campaign, we are confident the work generated from this project will continue beyond the grant. This one-time request to the State is for Grant-in-Aid funds to complete Phase I renovations to Kualii in preparation to transition the property and related rare books and art to a resource that can be enjoyed by the community for generations.
