Pali Momi Medical Center offers the only Level III Trauma Center and Primary Stroke Center serving Central & West Oʻahu. With more than 500 physicians on its medical staff, Pali Momi has delivered many medical firsts, including the only interventional cardiac catheterization units in Central and West Oʻahu and the first comprehensive cancer center on the island. Pali Momi

admits nearly 6,000 patients, has over 35,000 emergency visits, and handles almost 400 traumas per year.

Pali Momi Foundation was established in 2011 as the philanthropic arm of Pali Momi Medical Center. Our mission is to create a healthier Hawai'i.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Pali Momi Foundation seeks support for a state-of-the-art radiography system for the Emergency Department at Pali Momi Medical Center. Funding will be used for new x-ray equipment and facility upgrades to support the system. This project will bring the highest level of imaging technology available to support the Trauma Center and other specialty areas.

The proposed Shimadzu RadSpeed Pro Radiography System will bring key benefits to patients at Pali Momi:

- <u>Increased patient comfort</u>, as its dynamic design allows for the durable x-ray tube to be positioned at any angle. Additionally, the table is designed to support bariatrics cases and can accommodate up to 650 pounds.
- <u>Improved efficiency and accuracy of diagnostics</u>. The equipment enables higher image quality, so physicians will identify hairline fractures or small fractures in larger patients, which may have been missed otherwise.
- · <u>Improved safety</u>, due to lower levels of radiation transmitted during x-ray procedures. The system has unique features for different uses that follow the ALARA rule (As Low As Reasonably Achievable) for radiation exposure.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Pali Momi Emergency Department provides emergency care for all people, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. This is the only Level III Trauma Center serving the Central and West Oahu areas. The Emergency Department has demonstrated its ability to provide prompt assessment, resuscitation, surgery, intensive care and stabilization of injured patients and emergency operations.

In addition to the benefits for patients, the proposed improvements to the Emergency Services Department will have a larger ripple effect to our community. Health care organizations must keep pace with advanced technology and training methodologies in order to provide excellent care and be competitive in attracting medical professionals. As all medical centers grapple with the national shortage of healthcare clinicians, Pali Momi is especially challenged due to its location outside of the urban core of Honolulu. The proposed project is part of an institutional commitment to excellence for this community.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

This project will improve the patient experience and quality of care for children and adults who come to Pali Momi Medical Center for emergency care and other needs. The facility conducts 32,000 x-ray procedures each year or an average 2,671 x-rays per month. Patients requiring an x-ray include those who have suffered a traumatic injury or those experiencing health issues related to bones and organs. X-rays are used to assess bone fractures, fluid or internal bleeding, lung health, and other problems. Physicians use radiographic examination for patient diagnosis and to direct the treatment plan.

Pali Momi admits over 6,000 patients, has over 35,000 emergency visits, and handles nearly 400 traumas per year. Approximately 63% of Pali Momi patients are over the age of 65. About 14% of Pali Momi patients are uninsured or underinsured.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Pali Momi Medical Center is located at 98-1079 Moanalua Road, 'Aiea. It is the only Level III Trauma Center serving the Central and West O'ahu areas, providing life-saving emergency and trauma services for this area.

The project will be managed by David Yamaguchi, HPH Project Manager. He will oversee the design, planning, permitting, construction, and inspection processes. Mr. Yamaguchi will monitor and evaluate the progress of the project and provide progress reports and necessary feedback to the project stakeholders and executive leadership. The Capital Allocations Committee and Finance Committee will review and approve the project budget. A team of design and construction professionals, under the management of Mr. Yamaguchi, will be responsible for review of construction proposals, material and equipment specifications, vendor selections, periodic progress inspections, and final inspection upon completion.

Founded in 1989, Pali Momi Medical Center is part of Hawaii Pacific Health (HPH), one of the largest health care systems in the state. Pali Momi is bringing a higher level of care to this community by improving facilities and establishing specialized care centers.

Pali Momi Medical Center provides specialty healthcare, emergency services, public health education and outreach, training, and research. Located in 'Aiea, Pali Momi serves Central and West O'ahu with life-saving specialty care including a nationally-accredited stroke center, level III trauma center, and interventional cardiac catheterization unit.

2. Facilities

The Emergency Department of Pali Momi Medical Center is a 1,005 square foot facility with indoor and outdoor waiting areas, registration area, and a triage room. The space accommodates 35,000 emergency visits and 400 traumas annually. It is fully compliant with ADA regulations and meets specification for a Level III Trauma facility.

The proposed project will establish a new state-of-the-art radiography system to support the Emergency Department and other specialty areas. This Shimadzu RadSpeed Pro Radiography System will bring the highest level of imaging technology to meet the diagnostic needs of patients accurately and efficiently.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

This project will be overseen by David Yamaguchi, Project Manager for Hawai'i Pacific Health. Mr. Yamaguchi has over 30 years of experience in the building industry and has diverse experience in a wide range of projects including commercial/retail, military facilities, residential housing, utilities upgrades, and roadway/heavy construction. His background as a Construction Manager, Owner's Representative, and General Contractor gives him an excellent overall perspective of project management and delivery.

In his current position, Mr. Yamaguchi has managed over 80 projects representing over \$100M and currently manages \$27M in projects between Pali Momi, Wilcox Medical Center and Kaua'i Medical Clinic. Mr. Yamaguchi reports directly to Warren Chaiko, who has been with Hawai'i Pacific Health for fifteen years. Mr. Chaiko is a Senior Vice President with system-wide responsibility for the company's design, construction, leasing, real estate and facility master planning activities.

Other key staff members contributing to this project are:

· Gloria Brooks, Chief Operating Officer. Gloria has more than 30 years of experience in the healthcare industry. She has a bachelor's degree from the University of Tennessee at Memphis and a master's degree in business administration from Loma Linda University School of Public Health.

- · Elizabeth (Lisa) M. Noyes, Director of Diagnostic Imaging. In this role, Lisa oversees imaging, interventional radiology, cath lab, echocardiology, and the Comprehensive Women's Center. She has an MBA in healthcare administration from the University of Phoenix.
- · Courtney Wagner, Development Officer. Courtney is responsible for raising funding to support the clinical, research, and educational goals of Pali Momi Medical Center. She has an MBA from the University of Hawai'i.

The chief compensated staff member at Pali Momi Foundation is the Senior Vice President of Philanthropy, Hawai'i Pacific Health. The compensation and benefits package for this position is budgeted through Hawai'i Pacific Health Shared Services. No salary or staffing costs are incurred by the Foundation. One hundred percent of restricted contributions to Pali Momi Foundation are directed to their intended program or need.

Pali Momi Foundation has one full-time and five shared employees, along with ten volunteer foundation board members. Pali Momi Medical Center has 1,115 staff members and 53 active volunteers.

VII. Other

2. Licensure or Accreditation

The Pali Momi Emergency Department is a Level III Trauma Center, which means it has demonstrated an ability to provide prompt assessment, resuscitation, surgery, intensive care and stabilization of injured patients and emergency operations. Elements of Level III Trauma Centers include: 24-hour immediate coverage by emergency medicine physicians and the prompt availability of general surgeons and anesthesiologists; incorporates a comprehensive quality assessment program; has developed transfer agreements for patients requiring more comprehensive care at a Level I or Level II Trauma Center; provides back-up care for rural and community hospitals; offers continued education of the nursing and allied health personnel or the trauma team; involved with prevention efforts and must have an active outreach program for its referring communities.

The Emergency Department team of doctors, nurses and clinical support staff are specially trained in emergency services, combining clinical expertise with expert triage services. Patients benefit from access to board-certified emergency physicians.

Pali Momi is accredited as an American Heart Association/American Stroke Association Primary Stroke Center and achieved distinction of American Heart Association/American Stroke Association 2022 Get With the Guidelines – Stroke Gold Plus.

The x-ray equipment will require a State of Hawai'i radiation license to ensure regulatory compliance. Additionally, the radiology department complies with the Joint Commission's "image gently and image wisely" regulatory guideline. This guideline is to provide less radiation to pediatric and adult patients through increased technology and quality imaging.

As a not-for-profit organization, donations to the Pali Momi Foundation are invested in purchasing advanced technology for the Cancer Center, recruiting physicians, supporting clinicians and developing programs.

Pali Momi Foundation anticipates that the benefits of improved quality of care, improved efficiencies, and improved patient safety will validate this investment. The improvements will enable this facility to keep pace with the latest technology and protocols in emergency care. Thus, Pali Momi will be competitive in attracting high-level physicians and nurses and meeting the needs of this community.

By improving the Emergency Department at Pali Momi Medical Center, we reaffirm our commitment providing the highest level of emergency and trauma services for Central and West O'ahu.
