II. Background and Summary

The Bicycle Education project is managed by PATH~People for Active Transportation Hawai'i a 501(c) 3 non-profit active transportation organization incorporated on June 5th, 1986. Our mission is to safely connect people and places on Hawai'i Island with pathways and bikeways. PATH believes that a sustainable island and a healthy population require safe places to walk and bike, to and from school, to the shoreline and mountains, to work and to play. PATH's focus is on traffic safety education and creating a safe environment on roadways and trails for recreation, fitness and alternative modes of transportation. PATH has created multiple first-in-the-state in-school bike and pedestrian safety programs.

3. The goals and objectives related to the request;

PATH has provided a youth development program called Bike Ed (bike education) program for over 25 years on Hawai'i Island, which is one of the oldest programs of its kind in the country. This program serves Hawai'i Island 4th grade elementary school students (7-10 years old) teaching them about bicycle safety and handling skills. Taught by certified bike instructors and trained assistant instructors, the curriculum focuses on four layers of bicycle safety: control, rules, avoidance and passive safety. In the 2020-2021 school year, this bike education program saw 225.5 hours of donated volunteer time, 7 volunteers, 3 bike education staff members, and reached 777 students. We plan to reach 1,600 Hawai'i Island 4th grade elementary school students as we build capacity to move forward from the COVID-19 lockdowns.

Through donor support, PATH offers the program free-of-charge to any interested elementary school on the Island of Hawai'i. With the support of the County of Hawai'i Dept. of Parks and Recreation, matching funding from local foundations, funds from individual giving, and hopefully funding from the Hawai'i Community Foundation PATH will continue to offer the program free of charge to any interested school on the Big Island of Hawai'i.

The van and trailer that PATH uses to transport our instructors, 32 bicycles and helmets (given for free to each participant) were purchased in 2009. Even with excellent maintenance, the van and trailer have more than outlived their usefulness.

Should our application be awarded, PATH would use the grant-in-aid of \$89,135.00 to replace the van and trailer and to cover the cost of one school year's helmets to give to each participant.

4. The public purpose and need to be served;

Since physical education is a course that cannot always be offered in schools, there are a number of issues this lack of services can create, which our bike education program aims to address. The Keiki Bike Education program's purpose is to address three critical health and safety concerns among children, as well as positively impact child development and address broader environmental issues. These are: HEALTH - A recent study by the Department of Health reports that 20% of Hawai'i's 4th graders are overweight and another 15.7% are at risk for being so. In the same report, nearly one third of students in Hawai'i County (31.5%) enter school overweight. The Bike Education program provides skills to enjoy cycling as a safe, non-weight bearing physical activity that can be enjoyed for life.

SAFETY - The Federal Highway Administration reports that childhood bicycle and pedestrian related injuries and deaths involve a "limited set of basic errors and that these errors can be addressed through education." Among the top three goals in the Hawai'i State Department of Health's Strategic Plan is reducing traffic-related injuries and deaths by educating school-aged children about appropriate traffic safety behavior. Additionally, research from the EMS Division of the Department of Health shows that only 14% of youth aged 5 to 14 wear helmets, even though the law states all children under the age of 16 should be wearing bike helmets. Bike Education covers key bike laws of Hawai'i, including how to properly fit and wear a helmet.

CHARACTER BUILDING - Sadly, the fun and freedom we adults experienced in our youth through bike riding and walking in our neighborhoods has almost vanished for today's children. A community that is safe for a child to walk or bike to school is a place where that child's world opens exponentially. Keiki Bike Education provides children with the fundamental safety skills necessary for them to enjoy bicycling in their neighborhood; they learn responsibility, develop a sense of independence and socialize with friends.

Since its inception PATH has provided the bike ed program free-of-charge to any school that requests it, which meets the priority of equitable and inclusive access to services. This program will contribute to strengthening the long-term capacity of individuals and organizations to become healthy, vibrant, and sustainable by giving students basic and necessary skills to operate a bicycle confidently, which can provide opportunities for students' families to integrate biking into their exercise or transportation plans. It will also provide recreational opportunities with an emphasis on family and/or intergenerational activities, by equipping students with the education that the program offers and with their very own helmet to use when they operate a bicycle.

5. Describe the target population to be served; and

The goal of PATH's Keiki Bike Education program is to provide bike education classes and free helmets for at least 1,600 Hawai'i Island 4th graders at 22 schools during the 2023-2024 school year as we build capacity to move forward from the COVID-19 lockdowns.

6. Describe the geographic coverage.

We offer both Bicycle and Pedestrian Education at all elementary schools on Hawaii Island that are included in the Hawaii Department of Education Hawaii District.

Currently, our schedule of schools for the 2023-2024 school year is filled and we have requests still coming in for our program to be brought to more campuses across the island. We hope to have the capacity to accommodate all the requests for bike education that we receive. This is our listing of schools we plan to teach at in the coming school year.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

Our Bicycle Education Program Director works throughout the year to recruit elementary schools that wish to partake in our education program. He schedules two schools per month to receive the 3-day program. During those 3 days, our team will teach up to five 4th grade classes in a day, depending on the size of the school.

Our team of trained volunteers travel to the schools and administer this bike education program. PATH schedules three days for these classes, 45 minutes per day per class, consisting of classroom-based instruction on bicycle fit, helmet fit, visibility, bicycle laws and bike drills. Our van and trailer filled with thirty-two 20" and 24" bicycles arrive at the school for Day 2 and 3. Taught by certified bike instructors and trained assistant instructors, the curriculum focuses on four layers of bicycle safety: control, rules, avoidance and passive safety. For the 25+ years that PATH has administered this service, we have found this method to be the most effective in providing ample space and time for students to retain the content of the bike safety training, practice and implement bike safety skills, and grow in their confidence to operate a bicycle. Our organization provides all of the instruction and equipment necessary for students to participate, and gifts each student a helmet.

At the end of the program, PATH collects program evaluations from each of the classroom teachers.

For the purpose of this grant-in-aid requests, if awarded and funds are made available, PATH will purchase the new van and trailer in the 3rd quarter of 2023. This new van and trailer will be used beginning in the 2023/2024 school year and beyond.

PATH provides a written final report measuring the number of students that were served through the program, the number of volunteer hours that were given, the number of helmets that were gifted to students, the number of schools that benefited from the program, the number of miles that were traveled by the PATH van for the program. This report will be created and submitted to the State agency to be reviewed and accepted as a reasonable measure of success for the program's impact.

Bicycle Education Program Director

Responsible for the day-to-day functions of our Bicycle and Pedestrian Education Programs. This includes program, staff and volunteer management.

The Program Director, Paul Burke, currently reports to the President of the Board of Directors.

Paul joined the PATH team in 2014, has an Advanced League Cycling Instructor Certification, through the League of American Bicyclists (LAB). As part of the PATH team for the Bicycle and Pedestrian Education programs, he managed all aspects of the programs, program development, recruitment of and scheduling of schools, instructor and volunteer management for 6 instructors. For this project, Paul will support the Board President with this project by making sure this program's goals and objectives Applicant


including their timelines are being met, overseeing staff and all volunteer training and management. Should this grant be funded, Paul will take the lead in purchasing the van and trailer and will be in charge of regular maintenance and services needed.

PATH Executive Director

This position will be under recruitment and is expected to be filled in the 2nd quarter of 2023.

We do not anticipate needing a new van and trailer for at the least the next 6 years. We have already begun soliciting sponsors for helmets for the 2024/2025 school year.
