Re: Report to Hawai'i State Legislature Pursuant to Chapters 487J-4 and 487N-4, Hawai'i Revised Statutes

Pursuant to Chapters 487J and 487N of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes ("HRS"), the County of Hawai'i hereby provides this timely report to the Thirty-First Hawai'i State Legislature, following the discovery of (1) a material occurrence of social security number disclosures under HRS §487J; and (2) a security breach of Personal Information under HRS §487N, both incidents which occurred at the County of Hawai'i ("County").

The County maintains records of all of its County employees and Countycontracted vendors, which include, among other things, their names, social security numbers, and bank account numbers.

On August 15, 2022, the County issued a Request for Proposals ("RFP") for a new enterprise software system and posted the RFP on the Public Purchase system website for electronic procurement. As part of the posted RFP documents, sample reports were included in an effort to assist the prospective vendors with the scope of work under the RFP. These sample reports included names, social security numbers, and/or bank account information (i.e., Personal Information¹ as defined by HRS §487N-1) of County employees and County-contracted vendors

¹ Under HRS §487N-1, "Personal Information" is defined as "an individual's first name or first initial and last name in combination with any one or more of the following data elements, when either the name or the data elements are

that was either unredacted or not redacted in a permanent manner². It should be noted that vendors interested in submitting a proposal must have first properly registered as a user of the Public Purchase system in order to access and view the posted RFP and related documents.

On the evening of September 1, 2022, the County discovered the inadvertent disclosure, and on September 2, 2022, the County removed all documents from the Public Purchase system website that contained Personal Information, which eliminated any further ability for a prospective proposer to obtain the sample reports. On that same day, the County identified the prospective proposers that downloaded the sample reports containing Personal Information, which was a total of forty (40) entities. The County has contacted, or attempted to contact, all of the forty (40) entities by telephone and/or email, on September 6, 2022 and received acknowledgement from twenty-three (23) entities as of the date of this letter, that the entities have or will discard the sample reports that contained the Personal Information. The County has sent additional written correspondence to each of the forty (40) entities requesting each entity to acknowledge the disposal and discarding of the sample reports from its systems. The County continues to work diligently to obtain confirmation that these entities have taken the necessary steps to remove the sample reports from their possession.

The total number of individuals affected by this social security number disclosure and security breach of Personal Information is 125 (109 of which are County employees and 16 of which are County-contracted vendors/entities). Written notice of the social security number disclosures and security breach of Personal Information was mailed on September 13, 2022 to the 125 individuals and vendors/entities. Copies of the notices are attached as Attachment "A" – "E". The issuance of the notices was not delayed due to any law enforcement considerations.

Finally, the County has taken the following actions and implemented the following procedures to prevent similar incidents and breaches from reoccurring: The County will ensure that increased care is taken in the future to avoid any improper disclosures of Personal Information. Additionally, the Department of Finance will be reviewing its internal procedures on the handling of Personal Information and make appropriate changes as necessary.
