A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that safety on our
- 2 streets is the top transportation priority. Ensuring safe
- 3 routes to school for every keiki will protect Hawaii's most
- 4 vulnerable road users and serve as a long-term investment in the
- 5 future of transportation in the State. Decades of
- 6 automobile-centric planning and development have created
- 7 formidable barriers to safety for keiki and kupuna on our roads.
- 8 These barriers include a lack of complete, safe, and comfortable
- 9 bicycle and pedestrian networks; burdensome and complicated
- 10 funding mechanisms for safe routes to school programs and
- 11 community engagement; a lack of a state safe routes to school
- 12 plan that creates performance measures, goals, strategies, and
- 13 accountability; and a lack of coordinated safe routes to school
- 14 promotion among state and county agencies and community-based
- 15 organizations.
- 16 The legislature further finds that the state department of
- 17 transportation's safe routes to school program was initially



- 1 created by section 219C-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, in response
- 2 to the passage of the federal Safe, Accountable, Flexible,
- 3 Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users, also
- 4 known as the SAFETEA-LU Act, and attendant funding. The
- 5 SAFETEA-LU Act funding expired in 2012, and similar federal
- 6 funds for this purpose have since ceased to be distributed to
- 7 the states. The legislature finds that section 291C-2, Hawaii
- 8 Revised Statutes, should be amended because the expiration of
- 9 federal funds means that the conformance to onerous and
- 10 complicated federal requirements is no longer needed, and,
- 11 accordingly, the program can be simplified.
- 12 The legislature further finds that the primary source of
- 13 funding for the safe routes to schools program currently comes
- 14 from surcharges on citations collected from traffic moving
- 15 violations, which are deposited into the safe routes to school
- 16 special fund. However, in 2021, the legislature enacted Act 9,
- 17 Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, which transferred the
- 18 responsibility of allocating moneys to county safe routes to
- 19 school programs from the state department of transportation to
- 20 the legislature. However, it has not been practical for the
- 21 legislature to distribute safe routes to schools special funds

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- 1 for program objectives on an annual basis because the safe
- 2 routes to school program is a year-round program that requires
- 3 regular collaboration between the State, counties, and community
- 4 stakeholders to develop and implement programming and projects
- 5 year-round. The lack of a regular process and procedure has led
- 6 to safe routes to school program special fund moneys not being
- 7 distributed since 2020, disrupting a previously reliable source
- 8 of funding that communities and counties relied on for safe
- 9 routes to school programming and project development.
- 10 Since then, traffic fatalities have increased to record
- 11 levels, with 2022 seeing a record high one hundred seventeen
- 12 traffic fatalities and five hundred seventy-two serious
- 13 injuries, with many in and around schools. In 2023, two deaths
- 14 immediately outside Kaelepulu elementary school and McKinley
- 15 high school have illustrated the need for immediate action to
- 16 help create safer routes to schools.
- Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to prioritize the
- 18 safety of keiki by fixing and simplifying the safe routes to
- 19 schools program, re-engaging community stakeholders, and
- 20 appropriating funds to move priority projects and save lives by:

1	(1)	Enhancing the sale routes to school program by
2		developing strategies and facilitating
3		transportation-related projects that will ensure that
4		keiki are able to safely walk, bike, or roll to common
5		destinations through the Vision Zero policy adopted by
6		the department of transportation and county
7		transportation departments pursuant to
8		section 286-7.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes; the ground
9		transportation facilities plans developed and
10		implemented by the department of transportation and
11		counties pursuant to section 264-142, Hawaii Revised
12		Statutes; and the safe routes to school program under
13		section 291C-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes;
14	(2)	Establishing a safe routes to school advisory
15		committee of government and community stakeholders to
16		advise the State in carrying out the purposes of the
17		safe to schools program;
18	(3)	Authorizing the safe routes to school advisory
19		committee to develop an application process for
20		projects under the safe routes to school program and
21		determine awards for selected projects; and

1	(4) Ap	propriating funds for priority projects that will
2	in	aprove safety and allow keiki and their families to
3	Sã	afely walk, bike, or roll to school.
4	SECTION	I 2. Chapter 291C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended by a	adding a new section to part I to be appropriately
6	designated a	and to read as follows:
7	" <u>§291C-</u>	Safe routes to school advisory committee. (a)
8	There is est	ablished within the planning branch of the highways
9	division of	the department of transportation for administrative
10	purposes a s	safe routes to school advisory committee to advise
11	the State or	strategies to ensure that each child in the State
12	is able to s	safely bike, walk, or roll to school.
13	(b) Th	e safe routes to school advisory committee shall:
14	<u>(1)</u> De	evelop a comprehensive, statewide safe routes to
15	<u>sc</u>	chool plan that shall include:
16	<u>(</u> A	Goals, strategies, and performance metrics that
17		ensure accountability for improving safety,
18		active transportation mode share, community
19		investment in supportive programming, and
20		infrastructure quality, pursuant to
21		sections 286-7.5 and 264-142;

1		<u>(B)</u>	Methods to ensure stability and consistency of
2			the safe routes to school program special fund,
3			which shall provide for infrastructure projects
4			and continuity of existing programmatic
5			<pre>(non-infrastructure) work;</pre>
6		<u>(C)</u>	Recommendations to streamline and facilitate
7			efforts by communities to apply for and implement
8			projects pursuant to sections 286-7.5, 264-142,
9			and 291C-3; and
10		(D)	Identification of, and recommendations for,
11			additional funding, planning, and programming
12			that are inclusive and equitable pursuant to
13			sections 286-7.5 and 264-142;
14	(2)	Ensu	re distribution of moneys accrued in the safe
15		rout	es to school special fund, prioritizing continuity
16		of e	xisting programming;
17	(3)	Revi	ew project proposals and select priority projects
18		with	in one mile of any school or place of learning

8	(c)	The safe routes to school advisory committee shall
9	consist o	f the following members or their designees:
10	(1)	One member to be appointed by the president of the
11		senate and one member to be appointed by the speaker
12		of the house of representatives, who shall chair the
13		advisory committee annually on a rotating basis;
14	(2)	The department of transportation's safe routes to
15		school program coordinator;
16	<u>(3)</u>	The deputy director of the department of
17		transportation's highways division;
18	(4)	One member representing the physical activity and
19		nutrition section of the department of health's
20		chronic disease prevention and health promotion
21		division;

1	<u>(5)</u>	The superintendent of education;
2	(6)	The co-chairs of the Hawaii climate change mitigation
3		and adaptation commission;
4	<u>(7)</u>	One member representing the Hawaii state energy
5		office;
6	(8)	One member representing the Hawaii state council on
7		developmental disabilities;
8	(9)	One member representing each county agency with
9		jurisdiction over transportation;
10	(10)	One member representing an organization with a focus
11		on bicycling to be appointed by the governor, pursuant
12		to section 26-34, for a three-year term;
13	(11)	One member representing an organization with a focus
14		on senior citizens and their families to be appointed
15		by the governor, pursuant to section 26-34, for a
16		three-year term;
17	(12)	One member representing an organization that
18		understands the ways families with young children
19	-	navigate through the State to be appointed by the
20		governor, pursuant to section 26-34, for a three-year
21		term;

1	(13)	One member representing an organization with a focus
2		on public health and mobility to be appointed by the
3		governor, pursuant to section 26-34, for a three-year
4		term;
5	(14)	One member representing an organization with a focus
6		on transportation equity and mobility to be appointed
7		by the governor, pursuant to section 26-34, for a
. 8		three-year term; and
9	(15)	The chairs of the house of representatives standing
10		committee and the senate standing committee with
11		primary jurisdiction over transportation, who shall
12		serve as non-voting, ex-officio members.
13	The chair	of the committee may request the participation or
14	input of m	members of the public; experts in the field; and
15	county, st	tate, or federal officials or others as necessary.
16	<u>(d)</u>	Members of the safe routes to school advisory
17	committee	shall serve without compensation but shall be
18	reimburse	d for expenses, including travel expenses, necessary
19	for the pe	erformance of their duties.

1 (e) No member of the safe routes to school advisory 2 committee shall be subject to chapter 84 solely because of the 3 member's service on the committee." 4 SECTION 3. Section 291C-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended to read as follows: 6 "\$291C-3 State and county safe routes to school programs; 7 coordinators; grants; reports. (a) There is established, 8 within the department of transportation, a safe routes to school 9 program that shall, among other things, enhance traffic safety 10 around Hawaii's schools, enable and encourage children to walk and bicycle to school, and make bicycling and walking to school 11 12 a safer and more appealing transportation alternative. program shall be responsible for developing and publishing goals 13 14 and performance measures in coordination with the safe routes to 15 school advisory committee and providing technical assistance to 16 counties and community organizations in support of projects and 17 programs that advance state and county goals. 18 (b) There is created, within the department of 19 transportation, the position of safe routes to school program 20 coordinator. The safe routes to school program coordinator

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- 1 shall provide a central point of contact for the [federal] safe
- 2 routes to school program.
- 3 (c) A county designated office, through the county safe
- 4 routes to school program coordinator, and in consultation with
- 5 the department of education, department of health, and Hawaii
- 6 Association of Independent Schools, shall provide safe routes to
- 7 school funds for school-based and community-based workshops and
- 8 infrastructure and non-infrastructure projects that will reduce
- 9 vehicular traffic and congestion, encourage walking and
- 10 bicycling, and promote health and safety around Hawaii's
- 11 schools.
- 12 (d) The legislature shall appropriate funds from the safe
- 13 routes to school program special fund to the counties to be used
- 14 for the implementation of county safe routes to school program
- 15 plans and projects. No later than twenty days prior to the
- 16 convening of each regular session, each county shall submit to
- **17** the legislature an annual report on the status and progress of
- 18 its county safe routes to school program, including an
- 19 accounting of all grants provided through the program and a
- 20 timeline for future grant awards.

2	program s	hall take into consideration the need to:
3	(1)	Fill a permanent, full-time position of safe routes to
4		school coordinator within the county designated
5		office;
6	(2)	Maximize the participation of school officials and
7		stakeholder groups in the community;
8	(3)	Work in conjunction with county designated safe routes
9		to school stakeholders and train volunteer
10		facilitators for school-based workshops and
11		community-based projects, including flexible training
12		schedules;
13	(4)	Train potential grant requestors and stakeholder
14		groups in federal and state requirements necessary for
15		procurement, contracts, design, and construction; and
16	(5)	Allocate not less than ten per cent and not more than
17		thirty per cent of safe routes to school funds for
18		non-infrastructure-related activities or activities to
19		encourage walking and bicycling to school, public
20		awareness campaigns, student sessions on bicycle and
21		nodostrian safatu en ethen non infrastructure

1		activities (as prescribed under section 1404 of the
2		2005 Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient
3		Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users, Public
4		Law No. 109-59].
5	[(f)	Each grant proposal in the county safe routes to
6	school pro	ogram shall:
7	(1)	Identify the modes of travel used by students to get
8		to school;
9	(2)	Determine the number of students using each mode of
10		travel;
11	(3)	Survey the parents of each student to gather
12		information regarding the factors involved in the
13		choice of transportation mode for the student and,
14		where the student travels by automobile or bus,
15		conditions that would need to change for the parent to
16		permit the student to walk or ride a bicycle to
17		school, and obstacles to walking and biking; and
18	(4)	Identify traffic infrastructure elements in the
19		immediate vicinity of each school, including multi-
20		lane roadways, speed limits, and traffic calming
21		features that, either by their presence or absence,

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1	contribute to the use of automobiles as a student's
2	mode of travel to school.
3	(g) (f) The [director of transportation, in
4	consultation with organizations that have received non-
5	infrastructure and pending infrastructure grants, safe routes to
6	school advisory committee established pursuant to
7	section 291C- shall develop a streamlined process for the safe
8	routes to school program that meets federal and state
9	requirements, simplifies the grant proposal application process,
10	and expedites release of funding after completion of school-based
11	and community-based projects for infrastructure and
12	non-infrastructure.
13	[(h)] <u>(g)</u> The [director of transportation] safe routes to
14	school advisory committee established pursuant to
15	section 291C- shall submit to the legislature an annual
16	report of the status and progress of the safe routes to school
17	program, including an accounting of all grants provided through
18	the program and a timeline for future grant awards, no later
19	than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session.
20	[(i) Nothing in this section shall be construed as
21	requiring pations or emissions that would render the State

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- 1 ineligible to receive funds for the safe routes to school
- 2 program under the 2005 Safe, Accountable, Flexible,
- 3 Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users, Public
- 4 Law No. 109-59.]"
- 5 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the state highway
- $\mathbf{6}$ fund the sum of \$10,000,000 or so much thereof as may be
- 7 necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much
- 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be
- 9 deposited into the safe routes to school program special fund.
- 10 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the safe routes to
- 11 school program special fund the sum of \$10,000,000 or so much
- 12 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the
- 13 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- **14** 2024-2025 to:
- 15 (1) Support and facilitate the safe routes to school
- 16 program, projects, and advisory committee; and
- 17 (2) Match any federal funds received by the State for
- 18 costs related to sidewalk and other infrastructure
- 19 planning, development, and construction.
- The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 21 of transportation for the purposes of this Act.

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- 1 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
