A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that safety on our 2 streets is the top transportation priority. Ensuring safe 3 routes to school for every keiki will protect Hawaii's most 4 vulnerable road users and serve as a long-term investment in the 5 future of transportation in the State. Decades of 6 automobile-centric planning and development have created formidable barriers to safety for keiki and kupuna on our roads. 7 8 These barriers include a lack of complete, safe, and comfortable 9 bicycle and pedestrian networks; burdensome and complicated 10 funding mechanisms for safe routes to school programs and 11 community engagement; a lack of a state safe routes to school 12 plan that creates performance measures, goals, strategies, and 13 accountability; and a lack of coordinated safe routes to school 14 promotion among state and county agencies and community-based 15 organizations.

16 The legislature further finds that the state department of 17 transportation's safe routes to school program was initially



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1 created by section 219C-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, in response 2 to the passage of the federal Safe, Accountable, Flexible, 3 Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users, also 4 known as the SAFETEA-LU Act, and attendant funding. The SAFETEA-LU Act funding expired in 2012, and similar federal 5 6 funds for this purpose have since ceased to be distributed to 7 the states. The legislature finds that section 291C-2, Hawaii 8 Revised Statutes, should be amended because the expiration of 9 federal funds means that the conformance to onerous and 10 complicated federal requirements is no longer needed, and, 11 accordingly, the program can be simplified.

12 The legislature further finds that the primary source of 13 funding for the safe routes to schools program currently comes 14 from surcharges on citations collected from traffic moving 15 violations, which are deposited into the safe routes to school 16 special fund. However, in 2021, the legislature enacted Act 9, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, which transferred the 17 18 responsibility of allocating moneys to county safe routes to 19 school programs from the state department of transportation to 20 the legislature. However, it has not been practical for the 21 legislature to distribute safe routes to schools special funds 22 for program objectives on an annual basis because the safe HB600 SD2 LRB 23-2074.docx



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1 routes to school program is a year-round program that requires 2 regular collaboration between the State, counties, and community 3 stakeholders to develop and implement programming and projects 4 year-round. The lack of a regular process and procedure has led 5 to safe routes to school program special fund moneys not being 6 distributed since 2020, disrupting a previously reliable source 7 of funding that communities and counties relied on for safe 8 routes to school programming and project development.

9 Since then, traffic fatalities have increased to record
10 levels, with 2022 seeing a record high one hundred seventeen
11 traffic fatalities and five hundred seventy-two serious
12 injuries, with many in and around schools. In 2023, two deaths
13 immediately outside Kaelepulu elementary school and McKinley
14 high school have illustrated the need for immediate action to
15 help create safer routes to schools.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to prioritize the safety of keiki by fixing and simplifying the safe routes to schools program, re-engaging community stakeholders, and appropriating funds to move priority projects and save lives by: (1) Enhancing the safe routes to school program by

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developing strategies and facilitating

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a safer and more appealing transportation alternative. 1 The program shall be responsible for developing and publishing goals 2 3 and performance measures and providing technical assistance to 4 counties and community organizations in support of projects and 5 programs that advance state and county goals. 6 There is created, within the department of (b) 7 transportation, the position of safe routes to school program 8 coordinator. The safe routes to school program coordinator shall provide a central point of contact for the [federal] safe 9 10 routes to school program. (c) A county designated office, through the county safe 11 12 routes to school program coordinator, and in consultation with the department of education, department of health, and Hawaii 13 Association of Independent Schools, shall provide safe routes to 14 school funds for school-based and community-based workshops and 15 16 infrastructure and non-infrastructure projects that will reduce 17 vehicular traffic and congestion, encourage walking and

18 bicycling, and promote health and safety around Hawaii's

19 schools.

20 (d) The legislature shall appropriate funds from the safe
21 routes to school program special fund to the counties to be used
22 for the implementation of county safe routes to school program

19	[(h)] <u>(g)</u> The [director of transportation] safe routes to
20	school advisory committee established pursuant to
21	section 291C- shall submit to the legislature an annual
22	report of the status and progress of the safe routes to school
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1 program, including an accounting of all grants provided through 2 the program and a timeline for future grant awards, no later 3 than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session. 4 [(i) Nothing in this section shall be construed as 5 requiring actions or omissions that would render the State 6 incligible to receive funds for the safe routes to school 7 program-under the 2005 Safe, Accountable, Flexible, 8 Efficient Transportation Equity-Act: A Legacy for Users, Public 9 Law No. 109-59.]" 10 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the state highway 11 fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be 12 necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much 13 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be 14 deposited into the safe routes to school program special fund. 15 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the safe routes to 16 school program special fund the sum of \$ or so much 17 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the 18 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 19 2024-2025 to:

20 (1) Support and facilitate the safe routes to school
21 program, projects, and advisory committee; and



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1	(2) Match any federal funds received by the State for
2	costs related to sidewalk and other infrastructure
3	planning, development, and construction.
4	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
5	of transportation for the purposes of this Act.
6	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
7	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
8	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
