A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PURCHASES OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to amend the 2 procurement laws relating to the purchase of health and human 3 services to promote procurement efficiency, program success, and government accountability. This Act increases the efficiency of 4 5 short-term treatment purchase of services and increases the 6 small purchase threshold for health and human services from less 7 than \$25,000 to less than \$100,000. 8 SECTION 2. Section 103F-404, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended to read as follows: 10 "[+] §103F-404[+] Treatment purchase of services. (a) 11 Treatment services may be purchased in accordance with this 12 section if [either or both of] the following circumstances [are 13 applicable: 14 (1) Such services may become necessary from time to time, 15 but cannot be anticipated accurately on an annual or

21 Negotiations shall be conducted confidentially.
