## H.C.R. NO. 19

## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO CONDUCT A STUDY TO RECOMMEND APPROPRIATE LABELING REQUIREMENTS FOR HAWAII-GROWN TEA.

1 2	WHEREAS, locally-grown tea is a relatively new crop for the agricultural industry in Hawaii; and

4	WHEREAS, in 2015, there were approximately two dozen tea
5	farms in Hawaii, a small fraction of which operated as steady
6	businesses consistently producing high-quality tea; and
7 8	WHEREAS, most locally-grown tea comes from the east side of
o 9	Hawaii Island, which is populated with small tea gardens that
10	grow and process one hundred percent Hawaii teas; and
11	
12	WHEREAS, since all tea in the State is essentially grown on
13	volcanic soil, the leaves take on a distinct flavor-generally
14 15	bright and clear, with elements of citrus and a subtle honey- esque sweetness; and
16	
17	WHEREAS, Hawaii-grown tea has the potential to become a
18	premium agricultural commodity like Kona coffee; and
19 20	WUEDEAC to protoct and promote the michility of the
20 21	WHEREAS, to protect and promote the viability of the budding tea industry in Hawaii, labeling requirements should be
22	implemented; and
23	
24	WHEREAS, the Department of Agriculture is best suited to
25 26	study and recommend appropriate labeling requirements for Hawaii-grown tea; now, therefore,

28	BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
29	Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular
30	Session of 2023, the Senate concurring, that the Department of

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Agriculture is requested to conduct a study to recommend 1 2 appropriate labeling requirements for Hawaii-grown tea; and 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that when conducting the study, the 4 5 Department of Agriculture is requested to make the following recommendations: 6 7 8 Labeling requirements, including: (1)9 10 (A) The identity statements for tea that contains one 11 hundred percent Hawaii-grown tea by weight; 12 13 (B) The identity statements for tea consisting of a blend of one or more Hawaii-grown teas and tea 14 not grown in Hawaii; and 15 16 Specific details for the identity statement, 17 (C) 18 including type size and location on packages; 19 (2)Penalties for violations of the labeling requirements; 20 and 21 22 (3) Recordkeeping requirements for growers, manufacturers, 23 or other persons who package tea or tea leaves, 24 including records on the volume and geographic origin 25 or regional origin of teas purchased and sold; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in conducting the study, the 28 Department of Agriculture is also requested to: 29 30 (1)Estimate the increased trade value of Hawaii-grown tea 31 32 that could result from requiring geographic origin disclosures on packages containing one hundred percent 33 34 Hawaii-grown tea and packages containing a blend of one or more Hawaii-grown teas and tea not grown in 35 Hawaii; and 36 37 (2) Perform a cost analysis of implementing the labeling 38 and recordkeeping requirements for Hawaii-grown tea; 39 40 and 41

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture 1 is requested to submit its study, including any findings, 2 recommendations, and proposed legislation, to the Legislature no 3 later than twenty days before the convening of the Regular 4 5 Session of 2024; and 6

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this 8 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture. 9
