## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE AND CONSUMER AFFAIRS, IN CONSULTATION WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXATION, TO CONDUCT A STUDY ON THE SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC IMPACTS OF PERMITTING THE SALE OF AERIAL FIREWORKS AND IMPOSING A TAX ON THE SALE OF AERIAL FIREWORKS.

WHEREAS, illegal aerial fireworks are prevalent and an 1 2 ongoing problem throughout the State; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the use of illegal aerial fireworks in 5 neighborhoods has substantially increased in recent years, resulting in serious injuries, property damage, and fatalities; 6 7 and 8 WHEREAS, despite strict penalties, the drastic increase in 9 the illegal use of aerial fireworks continues due to the 10 longstanding traditions and cultural practices in the State of 11 setting off aerial fireworks to mark important occasions; and 12 13 WHEREAS, in the Report of the Illegal Fireworks Task Force 14 to the Legislature for the Regular Session of 2011, submitted by 15 the Illegal Fireworks Task Force (Task Force) established by Act 16 170, Session Laws of Hawaii 2010, the Task Force recommended 17 increasing fines to discourage illicit firework activities, 18 including the illegal import, possession, sale, and use of 19 fireworks; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the Task Force additionally recommended 22 decriminalizing firework offenses in favor of civil fines; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, the recommendations of the Task Force have not 26 seemed to make the positive impact that was expected; and 27

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WHEREAS, the imposition of tax on the sale of consumer 1 fireworks would be a new idea that could potentially serve as a 2 deterrent and raise additional revenue for the State; now, 3 therefore, 4 5 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 6 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 7 8 Session of 2023, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 9 Commerce and Consumer Affairs, in consultation with the Department of Taxation, is requested to conduct a study on the 10 social and economic impacts of permitting the sale of aerial 11 fireworks and imposing a tax on the sale of aerial fireworks; 12 13 and 14 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the study, the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and Department of Taxation are 16 17 requested to consider: 18 19 (1)The potential revenue that could be raised by imposing a tax on the sale of aerial fireworks; 20 21 22 (2) If permitting the sale and imposing a tax on the sale of aerial fireworks would discourage illegal firework 23 activities; 24 25 (3) If the potential revenue raised by imposing a tax 26 could be used to curb the illegal use of fireworks; 27 and 28 29 30 (4) If a mandatory liability insurance policy should be 31 implemented for persons who purchase a permit for 32 aerial fireworks; and 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Commerce and 34 Consumer Affairs is further requested to submit a report of its 35 findings and recommendations, including any proposed 36 legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior 37 to the convening of the Regular Session of 2024; and 38 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Commerce 41 and Consumer Affairs and Director of Taxation. 42

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
