HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO STUDY PROVIDING CERTAIN HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR ALL CHILDREN AND PREGNANT PERSONS WHO WOULD OTHERWISE QUALIFY FOR COVERAGE IF NOT FOR THEIR IMMIGRATION STATUS.

1 WHEREAS, it is in the public interest that all pregnant 2 persons and children receive high quality health care that is 3 accessible, affordable, and equitable; and 4 5 WHEREAS, limitation of access to health care based solely on immigration status results in many immigrants and their 6 families being unable to obtain affordable health care coverage 7 through Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program 8 9 (CHIP), and health insurance exchanges established under part II of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act 10 11 (PPACA); and 12 WHEREAS, low-income immigrants without prenatal care are 13 seven times more likely to give birth prematurely and five times 14 15 more likely to experience neonatal death; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the average cost of medical care for health problems resulting from premature birth is \$79,000, compared to 18 19 \$1,000 for a healthy birth; and 20 WHEREAS, the cost of hospitalizations during a severely 21 22 premature newborn's first year of life can exceed \$500,000, and 23 the cost of intensive care can exceed \$1,000,000; and 24 25 WHEREAS, lack of prenatal care results in health care costs 26 being passed on to taxpayers; and 27 28 WHEREAS, low-income immigrant children without access to 29 health insurance face persistent inequities in the prevention, 30 diagnosis, and treatment of health conditions, including routine



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1 health problems and those commonly addressed with necessary 2 specialty care and mental health, substance abuse, and oral 3 health services; and 4 5 WHEREAS, children with special needs, including difficulties with hearing, vision, mobility, self-care, 6 7 cognitive function, and work limitations may qualify for 8 Medicaid through various disability related pathways; and 9 10 WHEREAS, a 2021 study published in Academic Pediatrics found that for each dollar spent on children through Medicaid, 11 the government saved \$4 on future costs, including 12 13 hospitalizations and emergency visits, and when the benefits to children themselves are included, each dollar spent on Medicaid 14 15 coverage generates at least \$12.66; and 16 WHEREAS, state and federal laws deny access to Medicaid, 17 CHIP, and health insurance exchanges established under part II 18 of PPACA to all Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) 19 recipients; undocumented persons; and applicants without work 20 21 authorization attached to the applicant's request for registry. order of supervision, cancellation of removal or suspension of 22 23 deportation, legalization under the Immigration Reform and 24 Control Act, legalization under the Legal Immigration Family 25 Equity Act, and asylum, except asylee children under fourteen 26 years old; and 27 28 WHEREAS, the State is home to an estimated 41,246 undocumented persons; and 29 30 31 WHEREAS, the State's undocumented and DACA-eligible 32 .residents were born in the Philippines (54.6 percent); Japan (9.3 percent); China (8.8 percent); Korea (6.2 percent); Mexico 33 (4.6 percent); and Europe, Canada, and other countries (16.5 34 35 percent) and paid an estimated \$66,000,000 in federal income taxes and nearly \$45,000,000 in state and local taxes in 2018; 36 37 and 38 39 WHEREAS, approximately eleven thousand of the State's undocumented persons are uninsured, and many who are insured 40 41 receive individual and family health insurance through the 42 Prepaid Health Care Act; and 43



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WHEREAS, twenty-five states provide or will soon provide 1 2 health care coverage for prenatal care for all persons, regardless of immigration status, and eleven states provide or 3 will soon provide CHIP benefits or coverage similar to Medicaid 4 5 to all children, regardless of immigration status; now, 6 therefore, 7 8 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 9 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 10 11 Human Services is requested to study providing Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program, or similar health insurance 12 13 coverage for all children and pregnant persons who would otherwise qualify for coverage under these programs if not for 14 15 their immigration status; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study include the health care opportunities, resources, and costs relating to providing 18 19 the described coverages; and 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Human 22 Services is requested to engage applicable stakeholders in the study, including immigrant health care providers, social service 23 24 providers, and advocacy groups; and 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Human 26 Services is requested to submit a report regarding the findings 27 of the study, including any proposed legislation, to the 28 29 Legislature no later than December 15, 2023; and 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 31 32 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Attorney General, Director of Human Services, and President of the Inter-33

34 Agency Council for Immigrant and Refugee Services.
