## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO REPORT ON THE FEASIBILITY OF STOCKING SHORT-ACTING BRONCHODILATORS IN SCHOOLS FOR EMERGENCY USE.

WHEREAS, according to the Department of Health, more than 1 one hundred ten thousand residents are living with asthma and 2 3 approximately one-third of those residents are children; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the chronic respiratory disease occurs most commonly among children eleven years of age and younger; and 6 7 WHEREAS, every year, some five thousand people in Hawaii 8 visit emergency rooms due to asthma and another one thousand 9 five hundred are hospitalized, with infants and very young 10 children making up the majority of asthma-related medical 11 emergencies and hospitalizations; and 12 13 WHEREAS, every year, asthma costs the State approximately 14 \$4,200,000 in emergency room visits and approximately 15 \$14,000,000 in hospitalizations; and 16 17 WHEREAS, asthma attacks can occur at any time and often 18 without warning, and children with asthma should always have 19 access to medication that can quickly reverse the blockages in 20 21 their lungs; and 22 23 WHEREAS, short-acting bronchodilators, commonly referred to as albuterol inhalers, can be life-saving, are easy to 24 administer, inexpensive, and very safe that can be easily 25 administered by non-medical personnel who have adequate training 26 on its use; and 27 28 WHEREAS, when children do not have asthma medication, which 29 can occur for a variety of reasons such as forgetting or not 30

being able to afford the medication, schools have few options, 1 which include calling the parents or 911 to be transported to an 2 emergency room; however, these options require parents to incur 3 4 the costs of emergency services, tie up emergency room resources, and take children out of the classroom for days at a 5 time and further impedes their learning; and 6 7 WHEREAS, ensuring access to rescue medication is part of 8 9 guidelines-based response to asthma emergencies based on the Managing Asthma: A Guide for Schools from the National 10 Institutes of Health; and 11 12 13 WHEREAS, as of 2022, fifteen states have already passed 14 legislation that allows stock albuterol in schools for emergency 15 situations; now, therefore, 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 17 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 18 Session of 2023, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 19 Education is requested to report on the feasibility of stocking 20 21 bronchodilators for emergency use during respiratory distress and authorizing Department of Education employees to volunteer 22 23 to administer bronchodilators; and 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the report is requested to 25 include information on the fifteen states that have already 26 passed legislation allowing schools to stock bronchodilators and 27 28 how these programs have been implemented; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education work in partnership with community organizations, such as the 31 American Lung Association, Hawaii State Center for Nursing, and 32 33 Hawaii Medical Association to develop the report; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education is requested to submit a report of its findings and 36 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 37 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 38 the Regular Session of 2024; and 39 40 41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Superintendent of
