# HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO CONVENE AN ORAL HEALTH TASK FORCE TO REVIEW INFORMATION ON THE STATUS OF ORAL HEALTH IN THE STATE AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO IMPROVE ORAL HEALTH INFRASTRUCTURE IN HAWAII.

1	WHEREAS, the State is unable to meet the dental public				
2 3	health needs of its residents; and				
4	WHEREAS, the adult Medicaid population in the State has				
5	limited access to dental care; and

7 8	WHEREAS, statewide emergency department data analyzed from calendar years 2016-2020 shows that a significant number of the				
9	State's adult Medicaid population use emergency facilities as				
10	their "dental care home", which is an ineffective method of				
11	dental care and a misuse of resources; and				
12 13	WHEREAS, in 2021, approximately 42,000 people of all ages				
14	and all types of health insurance were served by federally				
15	qualified health centers for dental care needs; and				
16 17	WHEREAS, while the Department of Health operates five small				
17 18	dental clinics that serve individuals who are elderly, blind,				
19	intellectually disabled, developmentally disabled, and mentally				
20	ill, the clinics are all located in the City and County of				
21 22	Honolulu; and				
23	WHEREAS, the State does not operate dental clinics to serve				
24	similar populations on the neighbor islands; and				
25	MUEDERC, while there are snow 200,000 shilts with Madisaid				
26 27	WHEREAS, while there are over 288,000 adults with Medicaid dental benefits, there is a lack of dental providers for this				
28	population, with only three hundred thirty-nine dentists who				
29	currently accept and treat adults on Medicaid; and				



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1 2 WHEREAS, only eleven percent of the State's dental 3 providers serve one hundred or more persons who receive Medicaid assistance; and 4 5 WHEREAS, while the Legislature allocated over \$25,000,000 6 in 2022 to reinstate adult Medicaid dental benefits, there is a 7 concern that the current oral health infrastructure is 8 9 insufficient to deliver oral health services to those most in 10 need; now, therefore, 11 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 12 13 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 14 15 Health is requested to convene an Oral Health Task Force to 16 review information on the status of oral health in the State and make recommendations to improve oral health infrastructure in 17 18 Hawaii; and 19 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to 21 comprise the following members: 22 23 (1)One representative of the Family Health Services 24 Division of the Department of Health, to be appointed by the Director of Health; 25 26 27 (2) One representative of the Developmental Disabilities Division of the Department Of Health, to be appointed 28 29 by the Director of Health; 30 31 (3) One representative of the Med-QUEST Division of the Department of Human Services, to be appointed by the 32 33 Director of Human Services; 34 35 (4) One representative of the Student Services Branch of the Department of Education, to be appointed by the 36 37 Superintendent of Education; 38 39 (5) One representative of the Hawaii Oral Health 40 Coalition, to be appointed by the President of the Senate; 41 42

Burns School of Medicine, to be appointed by the 27 28 President of the Senate; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to 31 include the following in its study: 32 33 A review of all existing information and data relating (1)34 to oral health status in Hawaii, including the Hawaii Oral Health Coalition 2022-2023 environmental scan, 35 36 for evidence of key oral health issues and evident areas for action; 37 38 A review of all existing information and data relating 39 (2) 40 to the Department of Health public dental health 41 functions and program processes and recommendations regarding organizational structure, personnel needs, 42 43 contracted service needs, required resources, and 44 potential additional funding and support;
